Dear Friends,

Your gifts will carry us through a 15-month time frame that (finally) puts our fundraising calendar in alignment with our fiscal year.

Now, believe it or not, our fundraising cycle is about to begin again. Our campaign team is in place, cochaired by **Cynthia Ellis** and **Jonathan Hurd**, along with other great talents, and they are working to make the pledge process even easier this year. Celebration Sunday is scheduled for midwinter — February 12 — and we hope you will plan ahead to join us as we celebrate the culmination — the success — of our annual pledge drive.

One of our goals this year (in addition to a financial goal, of course) will be to accomplish 100 percent participation from our membership, in gifts of all sizes. It is significant if we can say that each one of us made a gift, that together we are all stewards of the future of First Parish.

This year, we want to become even more comfortable talking about money because raising money is what we must do each year. Your participation and generosity provides the financial resources we need to offer the programs and services we make available to each of you. A full two-thirds of your gift goes toward providing salaries and benefits to the ministers and staff.

We hope you will respond to the appeal this season. We still face some major financial issues. We have hired **Lisa Cole**, our new Business Manager, to ensure that we use your gifts in the most professional manner to support the ongoing work of the church. And if we make our 2006-2007 Annual Campaign goals, we hope to reinstate staff positions, we will take care of the maintenance work that is now urgent for our beautiful building and we will resume our previous fair-share level of financial giving to the wider Unitarian Universalist Association. Fall in Szekelykeresztur took everyone out into their gardens and their neighbors' gardens to pick the fruits and vegetables that had been growing all summer. I spent one day with Jozsef, Anna and many of their family members, picking grapes and pressing them for homemade wine. For Thanksgiving Sunday, on September 25, I joined the women's group to deliver packages of food to people in need. We drove all over Keresztur to give the packages to these people in person. Sunday School has started for the youth, and one Sunday Ildiko, one of two new assistant ministers, and I spent the morning with the kids, singing songs and making collages with colorful leaves. Along with teaching my own English classes, I help out in the high school where the kids are always eager to ask me questions about America. This past weekend I was fortunate to sit in on a meeting of all the ministers from Keresztur. They shared their thoughts and stories and ate a delicious meal prepared by Anna, with a little help from me. I am still having a great time and, so happy to be here, experiencing a Transylvanian autumn. —Rachel Holt

#### Pastoral Care News

Oak branches stripped against November sky Recall the canopies of June, and wild October blaze, Glory hallelujahs swept into the compost pile. I think of all I have lost, and know how much I've had. I remember all the gifts of years, and realize how much I have to give. I open my hands to the branches and the sky.

November is — an odd month, perhaps, for gratitude. In this month, which for me has always been the bleakest, when the land is reduced to essentials, unsoftened by the snows that will come later; we light lights, build fires, give thanks and recall gratitude. I read recently that of responses to having and receiving, thanks is theological and gratitude is mystical. "Thank you, God, for all this food," I was taught when I was little. To open our hands because our hearts overflow expresses unthought gratitude. Some years ago I began keeping a "gratitude journal" in November, and each November I go back to it, to remember occasions for gratitude in the past and add this year's. It is a practice I commend to you. Especially if this time of year seems bleak or difficult for you.

Right now I'm grateful to **Polly Peterson** for her work with the Pastoral Care Library, and to **Mike Kittross** for recently giving us a large number of books from his wife **Sally**'s library as he prepared to move to the West Coast. Sally was a beloved member and Parish Visitor, who gave deeply of herself despite living with a painful condition that could prove fatal at any time — and did, three years ago. Her loss was hard for many of us. Soon Sally's books will enlarge our resources considerably.

For those of you who are caregivers, you may want to check out an article from a recent issue of *Parade* magazine, "What Every Caregiver Needs to Know." It is down-to-earth and practical and will help you take care of yourself as you take care of your loved one. Copies have been made and are in the Pastoral Care Library (left of the Parlor fireplace). If we run out, tell the church office, and more will be made.

May you find in this reflective month of paring down, much for which to be grateful. May you find your hands more often open than clenched closed.

And may the glory hallelujahs of summer and fall beauty echo through your winter.

### **MUSings**

Last May, on the Sunday when the Adult Choir presented Malcolm Dalglish's *Hymnody of Earth*, we had two special musical guests: Sally McKnight, our won-

derful hammered dulcimer player, and Matt Meyer, a gifted young

percussionist and lifelong UU. To me, Matt's presence in our service that morning was especially memorable for the way he connected with the children in the service and talked about the way drumming was part of his spiritual path.

Matt will return to First Parish several times this year to present drumming and spirituality workshops through the Wright Tavern Center. The first workshop will be Thursday night, November 3 at 7:00 p.m. He will be back for a more comprehensive, four-week workshop series in January and February. Watch the Wright Tavern brochure for more information about these workshops.

I had the privilege of attending one of Matt's workshops at the UUMN summer conference in Denver this past August. In just over an hour, Matt skillfully taught us some basic rhythm and drumming techniques and provided interesting background on various types of drums. But even more significantly, he allowed us to experience the power of this medium to build community and led us to a dawning realization of the rich cultural diversity in this practice and the need to honor that diversity. What we were able to create together with Matt's guidance was marvelous. That one hour and fifteen minute session left me hungry for more. I plan to be at his First Parish workshops.

I encourage anyone with even the slightest interest in drumming to attend Matt's session on November 3. You don't need to have musical background or experience — just an open heart and spirit. Yet, in Massachusetts, during 2006, 20,000 children will experience homelessness. And there is something we can do. #### FIRST PARISH KATRINA RESPONSE TASK FORCE REPORT

The Katrina Response Task Force of First Parish is focusing on three projects to provide relief to those affected by the Gulf Coast tragedies. Help is needed on all projects. All are welcome to join the task force meetings on Thursday mornings at 8 a.m.

#### 1. Interfaith Partnership to Support Back Bay Mission in Biloxi

We are creating an Interfaith Partnership (with Tri-Con and potentially other faiths) to support Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, Mississippi. Back Bay Mission (BBM) is a multi-social service agency that has provided services of all kinds for Biloxi residents. Affiliated as a UCC ministry, Biloxi residents, including local UU's, attest to the organization's integrity and care for all. Their building was devastated by Katrina, as were the homes of most of the people who work at BBM providing services. The needs of BBM are great; the leadership of BBM is well-known to a First Parish member, and the reputation of BBM as a central source of support for Biloxi residents is undisputed. The Interfaith Partnership will involve coordination with other faith groups, the raising of funds for BBM, the supplying of work teams to build and repair, and potential work camps for teens and adults (either through First Parish or potentially through UUSC). #### 2. Partnership with Spindletop UU Church in Beaumont, Texas

Spindletop is a congregation with around 50 members and a half time UU minister, Tom Capo, who is in preliminary fellowship. They have sustained damage from Hurricane Rita including structural damage to their shed, sign, and sanctuary. We have become the managing partner church for Spindletop, and we will be the conduit for resources of all types, including funds. A First Parish committee will be formed to support Spindletop, and we will serve as a nexus for other congregations, offering resources to support this small but important UU church. #### 3. Partnership to Provide Direct Local Support to One Family

Through the Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries and the Black Ministerial Alliance of Boston, First Parish is partnering with one family who was evacuated from the Gulf area because of Katrina and has voluntarily come to Massachusetts. We are the "point person" for the family, which consists of a mother and her six-year-old daughter. They are living in Worcester, where the mom has found a job and the daughter is enrolled in school. They came with almost nothing and have needs for specific clothing, furniture and other goods.
