Pastoral Care News

Check out the Pastoral Care bulletin board, renovated in December by **Jiffy Read**, with new photos of our caregiver groups. It really is beautiful! You'll also find there thankyou notes received by the church and our various caregiver groups for support and outreach, offered at times of transition or difficulty in people's lives, as well as notices of special events and articles of interest about life issues.

Thinking about the Rest of Your Life, and the End of It I was only forty-three and in excellent health, divorced, with two children, when a lawyer put together my will, a living will and durable power of attorney document, so that my children would not have to face the unknown without guidance in case I died suddenly or became ill and incapacitated. It was Valentine's Day (and I had no valentine or prospects) when I signed my documents in the presence of a notary public, who said to me, "This is a perfect gift of love for your children on Valentine's Day!" It probably was the best Valentine I ever gave anyone.

It's so important to plan for the end of our lives, even at a young age, that Pastoral Care and the Wright Tavern are offering this program of five sessions on living your life intentionally, as well as end-of-life planning. Come to as many sessions as you wish, and please call the church office/Wright Tavern to register so we know how many people to plan for for each session.

THE REST OF YOUR LIFE AND BEYOND

Tuesday evenings, January 10, 17, 24, 31 and February 7, at 7:30 p.m.

January 10: The Rest of Your Life — Make It What You Want It To Be! I'll help you look intentionally at your hopes and dreams and plan for what you want to happen in your life.

January 17: Five Wishes — Sue Dobbie leads us through this document, legal in Massachusetts, with advance directives, and addresses how to have end-of-life planning conversations with your loved ones. The document will be available for you.

January 24: Hospice 101 — **Sue Dobbie** explains hospice care and how/when to look into it, from her extensive experience with hospice.

January 31: Preparing Your Way — **David Pohl** and I address how to approach getting your affairs in order, advance directives, memorial and funeral planning, from a ministerial perspective.

February 7: Your Ethical Will — What Do You Want to Leave Behind? — Jenny Rankin introduces how to write a "living will", the nonmaterial aspect of what you want to leave those you love.

What a thoughtful way to begin the new year, for yourself, for those you love — at any age!

Money Matters

Pledge.2006, First Parish's annual fundraising campaign, begins January 2 and will continue for five weeks, culminating on Celebration Sunday, February 12. The first week of January we will all (First Parish members and

friends alike) receive a mailing that includes a letter, a pledge form (showing your 12-month pledge for last year's 2005 campaign), a new "fair share" giving table (please see the insert in this newsletter), and financial information on how your pledge money will be used.

All of our pledges go to support the operating budget for July 2006 to June 2007.

PLEDGE EARLY THIS YEAR

This year, we encourage you to pledge early and generously. You can mail your pledge into the church office, pledge on the First Parish website (firstparish.org) or bring your pledge form to the service on February 12. No matter which way you choose to pledge, we hope everyone will come to Celebration Sunday when we will worship and celebrate together as a faith community.

If everyone pledges, if everyone is generous, we will reach our financial goal of \$940,000 — a 7.3 percent increase in giving from last year to cover the increased costs of day-to-day operations.

HOW YOU WILL BE CONTACTED

Approximately one quarter of the congregation will be contacted by a canvasser. If you are a member of the choir or RE Council, you will be contacted by an affinity group canvasser. All other parishioners will receive a mailing with information about the pledge process.

Our vision is to increase financial support for First Parish by encouraging 100 percent participation in Pledge.2006. Each one of us is connected to First Parish in our own meaningful way, through our ministers and worship and through the many programs and activities of this vibrant, historic UU church. MUSings

Several years ago, the First Parish Music Committee sponsored a wonderful night of Gospel singing by an inspiring choir from Cambridge. The Sanctuary was packed with parishioners and guests and when the choir invited us to join in the singing, dancing and clapping (on the offbeat!) I was moved and

amazed at the abandon and enthusiasm with which many in that audience joined the choir. I will always remember the beaming parishioner who came up to me after the concert

and said, "I just love this music — but I can't relate to the words."

This is common dilemma for UU's in relation to Gospel music. And yet so many of us are drawn to this uniquely American musical tradition, defying the old joke that UU's sing hymns poorly because "they are always reading ahead to see if they agree with the words." Gospel quickly carries the singer and the listener beyond any specific doctrine to the Christian message of hope and redemption that much of this music conveys. I believe that the core of this music transcends creed and theology. Our own Youth Gospel Choir demonstrates this to us on a regular basis. My advice to those who balk at the words is to let the music take you beyond the words to the essential spirit that it has to offer.

The New Year will bring two opportunities for folks in the wider congregation to sing Gospel music. On January 15, the Sunday of Martin Luther King weekend, **Anderson Manuel** and I will lead an intergenerational Gospel Choir at both services, which is open to singers of all ages (see item to the left). In March, First Parish will host a Gospel Weekend with guest artist Jonathan Singleton, a well-known Boston area Gospel artist. Jonathan will lead a morning workshop on Saturday, March 4, that will be open to singers in the parish and the community. That evening, he'll give a concert with other guest artists, and include the members of the morning workshop. And then on Sunday, March 5, Jonathan will lead the music at both of our worship services, again with the participation of Saturday workshop attendees.

I hope you will consider participating in one of these events, either as a singer or as a listener. This tradition has so much to offer us as people of faith.

Family Homelessness Forum — January 15, 7:00 to 8:45 p.m.

As part of its ongoing work to address the problem of homelessness, SAC is cosponsoring a roundtable discussion with our state legislators, to be held on Sunday evening, January 15, from 7:00 to 8:45 p.m. at First Parish in Concord. The goal of this forum is to inform residents of Concord and surrounding towns about the growing problem of homeless families, and about federal and state policies that can prevent and ameliorate family homelessness. Forum speakers include State Representative Cory Atkins, State Senator Susan Fargo, State Senator Pam Resor, and State Representative James Eldridge. Gary **Smith** will moderate.

REBUILDING AFGHANISTAN — TALK BY SARAH CHAYES

Sarah Chayes, who spoke at First Parish last year about the work she's doing in rebuilding the Afghanistan economy, will be speaking again on January 27 at 7:30 p.m. at the Brooks Middle School in Lincoln. She will discuss her organization's current project, which includes setting up a soap factory in Afghanistan, using the oil of pomegranates and roses, which grow in beautiful profusion near Kandahar. One of the hopes is to use the fields to grow fruits and flowers instead of poppies — making soap instead of heroin. Soap, of course, can be transported much more easily, and with much less spoilage, than roses and pomegranates. SAC is cosponsoring this event. PROCEEDINGS OF A SPECIAL MEETING OF THE FIRST PARISH IN CONCORD, CALLED BY THE STANDING COMMITTEE FOR DECEMBER 4, 2005

Moderator **Loretta Ho Sherblom** called the meeting to order at 12:35 p.m. and established that a quorum was present.

"Article I: To determine whether the Parish will authorize a capital campaign to raise up to \$4,500,000 to be expended under the direction of the Standing Committee for the general capital needs of the Parish, including the following purposes: (i) to perform deferred maintenance on the Meeting House and grounds, including the Sanctuary organ; (ii) to establish in accordance with applicable procedures a capital reserve fund of between \$1,000,000 and \$1,250,000 to be administered by the Trustees of Parish Donations and to be used to fund in perpetuity the maintenance of the Meeting House grounds; (iii) to fund building improvements and expansion to provide for, among other things, code compliant accessibility to the Meeting House and the construction and furnishing of additional multipurpose spaces for the Meeting House; (iv) and to finance design services, project managers and other consultants to prepare architectural and engineering plans, bid specifications, contract documents, cost estimates and other services needed to carry out the foregoing; or take any other action relative thereto.

"In carrying out the provisions of this warrant, the Standing Committee shall do the following: (a) it shall prepare and present to the 2006 Annual Meeting of the Parish a capital spending plan that will provide policies governing the expenditure of funds raised in the capital campaign, including standards for bidding out the work, authorizations required to undertake various types of work and the like; (b) it shall present to the congregation (at an Annual or Special Meeting) a proposed design for the building improvements and expansion referred to in item (iii) above and shall not authorize the preparation of final construction plans and specifications unless such design has been approved by the congregation at such Annual or Special Meeting."

Article I was read, moved and seconded.

The Standing Committee was then recognized to begin their presentation. **Don Dembsey** presented the findings of the Vision 2008 Committee. **Jim Liljestrand** (Chair of the Standing Committee), **Sara Ballard** and **Tim Jacoby** (Treasurer) made introductory comments on behalf of the Standing Committee. **Rev. Jenny Rankin** and **Rev. Gary Smith** made comments on behalf of the staff. The meeting was opened to discussion.

Amendment I, moved by **Alan Whitney**:

(1) In line one, change the sum of \$4,500,000 to \$4,000,000; (2) in line three, change the words "including the Sanctuary organ" to "excluding the Sanctuary organ"; (3) add the following new paragraph three to Article I — "The Standing Committee shall present to a Special Meeting of the Parish to be held within ninety days, a detailed proposal for expenditures related to the Sanctuary organ, specifically reflecting consideration of previous studies, and which will be preceded by open discussions with Parish members."

The motion was seconded. After a lengthy discussion, Amendment I was called to a vote and failed.

Amendment II, moved by **Phil Villers**:

"To guide our decision-makers in capital campaign spending, First Parish indicates the following expenditure priorities: (1) Immediate repairs/improved sound, approximately \$1 million (includes \$100,000 for the sanctuary sound system; (2) Elevator/additional rooms, approximately \$2 million; (3) Full organ restoration, maintenance reserve fund, approximately \$1.5 million."

The motion was seconded. Following discussion, Amendment III was called and failed.

Article I was called and passed.

Article II:

To hear and act upon any other business that may come before the meeting.

There was no further business. The meeting was adjourned at 2:15 p.m.
