Learn the art of Parish Visiting. The Parish Visitors, a group of caring individuals who visit regularly with some of our older members and friends, meet monthly with me for reflection and mutual support and supervision. It is a monthly "meeting" to which I look forward with delight because they are a wonderful group of people, and the conversation is always engaging and thought-provoking. The Visitors report that their visits feel less like "visits" that they "give" someone and more like developing friendships. Which says a lot about the quality of their presence in these relationships.

Most of the Visitors have been doing this for some time and received training before I arrived at First Parish. As we now have a couple of new Parish Visitors, I will give a training session on listening, presence and visiting issues. Current Visitors are invited to participate in this as a "refresher" course. If you've thought about joining our Parish Visitors, either now or sometime in the future, or even if you visit someone in your own life and some learning may be of value to you, I invite you to this training on Saturday, April 8, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Please call the church office (978-369-9602) if you plan to attend so I can have enough handouts and snacks on hand.

"Questioning Faith" — We all do it at some time. Come see and discuss this video on Tuesday, April 11, 7 to 9 p.m. It was created by a seminary student who found his faith shaken when a friend died of AIDS. He interviewed others who experienced losses or anticipated their own deaths, to learn what sustained them in their time of deep need. I found this video powerful and moving.

Money Matters

As spring arrives, we are two thirds of the way through the fiscal year. In February, we collected \$64.1K in subscription income, bringing the fiscal year total to \$693.5K. This represents 76 percent of our budget. Please continue to make contributions toward your pledge. This will help us reach our year-end goal of \$907.9K, which was planned for based on your pledges. On the expense side, we continue to be on track as our YTD expenses through February represent 64 percent of total budged expenses for the year. Although in total we have slightly lower spending YTD than expected at this time, in some areas of the facility and administrative accounts we are working quite hard to stay within budget. At this time, we do not expect any areas to run over budget.

Other financial highlights:

You will receive pledge statements in April with your pledge and contribution amounts for the first 9 months of the pledge year. Please review this carefully and contact **Peg Gallo** or me if you have any questions.

The audit of our 2005 financials is almost complete. **Tim Jacoby** and I will be meeting with the auditors in late March, and the audited financials should be finalized thereafter.

The staff has begun putting together the budget for FY '07. A preliminary version was presented to the Standing Committee in February. We will be able to update this version when the pledge campaign is complete. Your pledges typically represent over 70 percent of the budgeted income, so pledges play a very important role in determining how much money we can spend on our programs, staffing, facilities, UUA contributions, etc.

MUSings

Be sure to give the rest its full value. The silence is as important as the sound.

I regularly say this to the choir as we rehearse together. Musicians focus so much on playing or singing the right notes, concentrating on correctly producing the sound that composers indicate through the written music.

But a musical score also has rests telling us to be silent, and composers use this silence as effectively as they use sound to create their music. Often in our eagerness to get to the next note or chord singers

This is all obvious when one is preparing a musical score. Why is it so hard to acknowledge and incorporate rest and silence into the symphony of our day-to-day life? During this season of Lent I am reading a book that was given to me at Christmas, Sabbath: Finding Rest, Renewal and Delight in our Busy Lives, by Wayne Muller. Muller's book approaches the concept of Sabbath (from the Hebrew shabbath, or "rest") from a variety of religious traditions and cultural perspectives. And he suggests simple practices that help create Sabbath time in the midst of our lives, whether it is just a few minutes, a few breaths, or a whole day of rest and renewal. As I read, I am exploring some of these practices and learning to appreciate and develop the Sabbath practices I have already incorporated into my life's rhythm, but not really acknowledged as such. I recommend this slim volume to anyone who would like to make more space in their lives for rest and renewal.

"Give the rest its full value. The silence is as important as the sound." May we all hear and heed these words as we sing the song of life.

REflections and RE News

Have you noticed? RE is going to look quite a bit different next year. The RE Council members and the RE staff have been working all year to bring several improvements to our RE Program.

For our youngest children (0-3 years), we are creating a mixed age classroom. This way siblings can often be together, and children socialize best in mixed aged settings.

For our 3's and 4's, we are using our "Story Time" curriculum as a precursor to SpiritPlay. We are choosing the best stories, based on parent volunteer feedback forms, and allowing children to explore them based on the Montessori model.

We are combining our Kindergartners and First Graders and expanding the SpiritPlay program we started this year. We have heard very positive comments from teachers, parents and kids with regard to this Montessori approach toward learning and exploring spiritual stories.

Workshop Rotation is becoming a reality through the dedication of over 40 caring adults. We are close to completing the curriculum for next year's RE program and are about to start decorating the room space. Please call me or **Allison Aley** if you would like to get involved in this exciting work. Terrific people are coming forward with their amazing talents and it has been a pleasure working with so many of you.

We are formalizing a rotating "curriculum" for our 6th and 7th-8th Grade youth groups. These groups are primarily social and meet on Sundays in the late afternoon. Adults especially like leading these groups because they are a great group of kids and the adult is still able to participate in worship on Sunday mornings.

For 7th graders, we are embracing **Claudia Nimar**'s concept of the "Young Activist" and bringing it into this grade level's Sunday morning curriculum. This is a hands-on program that enables our kids to put their faith in action.

Neighboring Faiths will be in the second semester for 7th graders. We have an interesting itinerary planned for both kids and leaders. Often we hear adults who lead Neighboring Faiths say that they learn much themselves about the different religious traditions.

8th Graders will be bringing their interpretation of *GodSpell* into worship for next year. These youth will explore the importance of Jesus' message in the world through drama, dance and social action. Their work will culminate in a youth-led worship service on December 3.

Our Whole Lives (OWL) will continue next year, but with a slightly shorter schedule. We hear you — your kids are busy, but we all want them knowledgeable and safe as they move into adulthood.

Coming of Age (COA) will also be a bit less time-consuming, but will still maintain the essential elements of the exploratory process of defining who we are as spiritual beings.

PARENTING SUPPORT

Sometimes parenting can be difficult. There are normal ups and downs with raising children and teens. But sometimes it can be more. Supporting a child with mental illness can be particularly challenging because of its chronic nature. It can be draining for parents who are trying to keep it all together. If you are going through a difficult period with your child and are in need of some support yourself, either through our Pastoral Care program or from other parents who have already gone through something similar, please give **Karen Foley** or me a call. All information will be kept confidential.

Also, if you are a parent who has been through difficulties of this nature and would like to be a resource for other parents who are currently struggling with this issue, let **Karen Foley** or me know. Depression and mental illness are difficult to talk about, but they are serious realities many of us face. First Parish wants to be there for families who are facing this particular challenge.

Mirrors of Masculinity — Modern life often makes it difficult for men to remain in touch with their deeper feelings — whether it be their innate joy, zaniness, tender loving or repressed feelings of anger, anguish, shame, or the fear of being "found out." Between work, family and everyday life, men are finding it rare to have the time for sharing the company of other men and what they feel deeply for and value in their lives. Consciously placing ourselves in the company of other men who are looking at life's larger pictures, and asking important questions about who we are as men, is the framework for this six-week course. As we combine discussion, poetry, and interactive exercises with our connecting to Spirit, each other and nature we will create a caldron for comraderie, change and consciousness.

Blasé Provitola and Ron Kearns have each been involved in working with groups of men for over a decade. They are the founders of Menswork Inc., a nonprofit organization whose purpose includes "birthing the male Spirit." They have been cofacilitators at Rowe Conference Center for the Men's Wisdom Council for the last twelve years and developed a course for incarcerated men named "menswork," which they lead in a number of area prisons.
