Margaret Fuller, Elizabeth Palmer Peabody, Emerson and Alcott: I had so much fun reading about their lives. I love Bob Richardson's biography of Emerson. He called it *Emerson: A Mind on Fire*, and if you want to get started with Emerson, there's no better place to start. To me, all these transcendentalists had minds that were on fire. When we walk into their world, we catch a little of that flame.

We're moving into the summer months. Although the rhythms of First Parish change during the summer, we are a 12-month church. We are not "closed" during the summer. We worship on Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and have invited some wonderful preachers. I am in the office in July while Gary Smith is on vacation. Gary is in the office in August while I am on vacation. We meet with people, plan for next year, respond to pastoral calls and crises. Next fall, we will welcome a number of new staff people and we'll be getting ready for that. Summer is a bit slower than the rest of the year, so if you've thought of coming by to introduce yourself or chat, I encourage you to do so. ### Pastoral Care News

As we said our benediction together at the end of the final worship service of the "regular" church year, I knew it was the last time I was saying it with you as a minister of First Parish. "These words are engraved on my heart," I thought, "and always will be." I'll bet it's like that for a lot of you.

Then came your beautiful send-off at the Annual Meeting, with **Toby Wesselhoeft**'s thoughtful, heartfelt words, and in my gift bag was a beautiful, framed calligraphy version of the benediction! It will be on a wall in our house as soon as our house is built, dear friends! I am grateful, too, for your generous monetary gift. I don't think you will be surprised to learn that the "green" of your gift will turn into "green" and blossoms in our new garden in Maine!

As I've been saying good-bye to you, tying up loose ends of ministry, and packing for our moves to Concord for the summer and then to Maine, my mind has been occupied by too many thoughts and tasks at once — not surprising. It's been hard to come to my daily morning prayer with a steady mind and open heart. One morning as I sat with my mind running around, ticking off to-do lists, I noticed the candle's flame - straight, tall, and absolutely steady. This is unusual. Flames usually flicker and dance a little. Not this one — it was unwavering, and it stayed that way. Even more amazing, it's been the same every morning since. "That," I realized, "is what God's love for me is like ---when I'm unsteady, discombobulated, obsessed with my own little concerns, unable to pay attention to God, God stays present with me anyway, a steady and unwavering presence." It did help me relax a little and trust that sometime in the future my mind will settle down (maybe when the packing is done?).

But then this struck me: Just as God is a steady presence in my life when my life doesn't feel steady at all (even when I don't notice that steady presence, which is often the case), so a caring congregation can be a steady presence in the lives of its members and friends when their lives are anything but steady and reassuring. And I thought of all the times and all the ways you have reached out to each other in difficult times. And all the ways you are present with each other in the ordinary course of things which builds the basis for being there in the hard times. I hope you know you are an amazing congregation. I know you are going to keep letting your lights shine in each other's lives and your congregational light shine as a steady beacon of faith in the wider world.

May blessings abound in your summer and into the year and years ahead.

# MASSACHUSETTS CAMPAIGN FOR A U.S. DEPARTMENT OF PEACE

Sixty-five people, from 11 northeastern states, gathered for a conference in early June. The 9 children created a "Tapestry of Peace" quilt, to be displayed in churches. Perspectives presented, for weaving into our work, included, "Investing in Prevention: Educating Youth about Nonviolence," "Community Mediation" and "The Department of Peace, Military and Police: How Do We Work Together?" This inspiration and strategies from a Peace Alliance Coordinator guide our work. Massachusetts plans candidate forums in October, continued dialogue with police for developing youth mediation programs, and a benefit concert offered by the Aardvark Jazz Orchestra on December 17. ### CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

On June 11, 2006, we were pleased to announce at the Annual Meeting that the church has already raised \$811,275 from 21 leader-ship pledges. The congregation also affirmed its commitment to a



\$4.5 Million Capital Campaign, which allows us to complete deferred maintenance (including the organ), establish a capital reserve fund to finance future maintenance, make the Meeting House accessible to all, and add some multipurpose space. A motion to reduce the size of the campaign was defeated by a vote of 118 to 32, with three abstentions.

Our architects, Taylor & Burns, have begun studying both our needs and the building itself. They will work with the Building Committee during the summer to create multiple design options that will be presented to the full Parish at meetings on September 20 and 23. We expect that a preferred design option will emerge from these meetings. The architects will then expand on that one preferred design and present it in more detail at two all-Parish meetings November 12 and 14. An all-Parish vote on whether to go ahead with the preferred design will take place at a Special Meeting on December 3, 2006. Please mark your calendars now with all these very important dates!

Throughout the summer, leadership fundraising will continue as schedules allow.

#### WORKSHOP ROTATION GRADES 2-6

Have you heard? There is a lot going on in RE this summer.

After years of thorough evaluation and thoughtful consideration by many, we are actually implementing Workshop Rotation this fall on September 17. This did not happen overnight. Many people worked diligently toward this goal for several years. We have been fortunate to have had the assistance of curriculum specialists, educators, actors, musicians, interior designers, seamstresses, painters, builders, potters, artists, plumbers, woodworkers and more. All are working toward making this program a reality for the upcoming fall.

As I write this, our physical classroom spaces are being created. Some of these are big changes. Change is exciting, but it may be a surprise to some. For this reason, we are having an Open House for our Workshop classrooms after both services on September 10. This will give parents and kids an opportunity to visit the spaces and meet the guides for their first rotation. We are so looking forward to inviting you all back for a visit on that day.

#### STAFFING CHANGES COMING TO RE

I am so pleased to announce that **Jane Barnes** has accepted the part-time position of RE Administrator for next year. Jane is a member of First Parish and has two children in our RE program. We are also adding two more staffing positions for RE next year. The first is a part-time position (13 hours per week, Sept.-June), supporting our new workshop rotation model for 2nd to 6th grades. This position would involve developing curriculum for our five pillars, helping with its implementation and working with RE teachers.

The second position is also part-time (13 hours per week, Sept.-June) working with our 7th to 9th grade programming. This position would also involve creating and sustaining strong programming for this important age group.

#### SPIRIT PLAY CONTINUES SUCCESS

Spirit Play, a Montessori-based program for experiencing spiritually moving stories, was very successful in this year's RE preschool program. Next year, it will be the basis for our combined K-1 classroom. Over the summer, we are creating stories based on the Hebrew Scriptures for the fall program. These stories will be told from a UU perspective, relating the difficulties humans faced in Biblical times, while stressing our own UU principles and values.
