The poet Emily Dickinson writes:

A little Madness in the Spring Is wholesome even for the King, But God be with the Clown—

Who ponders this tremendous scene — This whole Experiment of Green — As if it were his own!

Spring Madness. Madness, indeed.

The Sox, even with Dice-K on board, are in with a bang, and out just as quickly with their second game. Oh, we had such hope. Not a good start. For shame, for shame! But we must not give up so quickly to despair. Spring is in the air, and we have only just begun, I say.

But as I write this, frozen rain is making mighty headway against the wavy panes of glass at Wright Tavern. If it held just a bit more force, I think it could actually penetrate it, shattering its place in our history. Who else, I think, has sat looking at this same view, and wondered about the slow descent of spring upon Concord? Who else, sitting here, has wanted to will in the warmth? Who else is tired of the waiting for buds, for color, for a new view?

Other madness, more ominous, has me held in its grasp this week. While outside on our wayside pulpit William Ellery Channing inspires us with, "May your life preach more loudly than your lips," I have been listening to the responses to the hurtful words spoken by Don Imus about the Rutgers women's basketball players. Ugly, damaging, unthinkable and irresponsible. We are too smart to be so dumb, I think. Madness of another type.

I am grateful for the care and respect we give to the importance of words within our Unitarian Universalist tradition. Even though we are criticized for our devotion to reason and thought in our theology, and for the absence of creed, I am proud that even though we falter and make mistakes along the path toward building just and sustainable communities, we keep trying; that we are not afraid to speak up when we err, when we say hurtful things. We are not afraid to try again when we make a mistake.

Madness of a different sort, if we define madness as admitting when we are wrong. If that be the case, I say "Preach on, Reverend Channing! Preach on!"

TAX-EFFICIENT GIVING

This year, if you are over age 70 and have a traditional IRA, you may be able to avoid collateral taxation of your Social Security by having the IRA Administrator transfer your church pledge directly from your IRA account rather than by paying it yourself. This will benefit those whose Social Security is taxed below the maximum 85 percent. Your gift also counts toward the minimum required distribution. Pastoral Care News

May is a month of remembering; we remember our mothers and we remember those who died in the wars this country has fought. As many of you know, the original Mother's Day in the United States occurred in 1870, led by Unitarian social activist Julia Ward Howe, with a call to unite women against war after the American Civil War. Unfortunately Howe failed in her attempt to get formal recognition of a Mother's Day for Peace. It took another woman to start a crusade to found a memorial day for women. Anna Jarvis organized the first Mother's Day, which was celebrated on May 10, 1908. In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson declared the first national Mother's Day as a day for American citizens to show the flag in honor of those mothers whose sons had died in war. Nine years after the first official Mother's Day holiday, commercialization of the U.S. holiday became so rampant that Anna Jarvis herself became a major opponent of what the holiday had become. Mother's Day continues to this day to be one of the most commercially successful U.S. holidays.

Many Unitarian Universalists agree with Anna Jarvis's opposition to what Mother's Day has become, and yet we are not immune to its pervasiveness. Mother's Day and Memorial Day in their call to remember bring memories that can make us cry, laugh and cry and laugh again. When we remember, the question of forgiveness also arises. Can we forgive the human race for its inclination to go to battle? Can we forgive our mothers for the small wars and the large ones that raged within us and between us? Can we celebrate the times that we both grew in the knowledge of love? Can we work toward reconciliation within ourselves, in our relationships with others, and can we work toward world peace? With flower blossoming, the month of May reminds us of renewal. The questions of remembering are also questions, that invite the possibility of renewal.

Money Matters

With one quarter left in the fiscal year, we are monitoring our financials closely and trying to anticipate where we will end the year. On the income side, we have received 83 percent of our budgeted subscription income. This is consistent with how much we had received last year as this point. On the expense side, through March we have spent 72 percent of our budgeted expenses for the year. We are reviewing our financial activity and have found some budget areas that will overrun this year due to unbudgeted expenses. This will be more than offset by budget areas that are now projected to come in below budget at year-end. All this information is scrutinized both in making year-end projections for this year and helping us budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

Although it looks positive that we will end FY'07 with a balanced budget or positive net income, the key to this achievement is subscription income. Please continue to contribute toward your monthly pledge regularly; this will help us in our year-end projections. If you pledge quarterly or yearly, it would be very helpful if you could fulfill this pledge by the end of May. Thank you for your continued commitment, of both your time and money to the operations of First Parish.

The Standing Committee (SC) met on April 9 with Dave Dawson and Tim Jacoby attending as guests. Dave reported that the annual pledge drive is still \$137,000 short of the \$1,020,000 goal, with 100 pledge units still outstanding. Tim and Rob Richardson (Treasurer) reported on the changes that have been made to our financial system as a result of the annual audit, changes that have brought us into better compliance with good accounting practices. On April 30, the SC will meet with the staff to share ideas of our vision for First Parish and to help us with our task under policy governance of setting yearly goals. The SC is also working on revising our Ends Statements and developing a method of evaluating ourselves as well as the ministers as Head of Staff. This evaluation is part of the policy governance process.

We urge everyone to come to church on April 29 to celebrate the launching of the Come Build a Dream campaign. Join us as we celebrate taking the first steps toward a new First Parish.

MUSings

Inevitably, it seems, there are seasonal trends in the performance of musical masterworks. Sometimes they are determined by an anniversary year, such as the Mozart 250th anniversary last year. But sometimes pieces receive multiple performances in a given year or place for some unidentifiable reason.

This is true of the Fauré *Requiem*, the work that the Adult Choir will present with orchestra on May 6. The *Requiem* is performed regularly

by community choirs and church choirs everywhere. But as I have talked to colleagues in this area and around the country, and as I have contacted instrumentalists to play in the First Parish

Festival Orchestra, I have learned that there is an unusual abundance of Fauré *Requiem* performances this spring.

So why have so many conductors turned to this particular choral masterwork this spring? I know that my initial reason for bringing our scores out of the library was simple: It is an absolutely beautiful piece and I love it. I think I was also drawn back to Fauré's masterpiece by the title and the character of the work. *Requiem*. Rest. The text is the Latin service for the dead. It has been set famously and dramatically by many composers — Berlioz, Verdi, Mozart. But Fauré's setting is unique in its emphasis on the promise of rest and comfort for the dead and the living. In his first version of the piece, Fauré chose to set only the *Requiem* texts that emphasized rest and peace. He completely left out all references to a day of judgment — an aspect of the *Requiem* that is memorably and vividly portrayed by other composers. Fauré's musical setting — for organ, strings, harp — also creates a serene and sublime atmosphere, even with the later addition of the *Libera me* and *Dies irae*.

I believe this exceptionally peaceful nature of Fauré's setting provides a clue to why it has been chosen by so many conductors for performance this spring. In these complex and disturbing times, the Fauré *Requiem* is balm for the soul and the spirit. It has sustained and soothed me as I've listened to it and studied the score this winter and spring. We are in need of some rest and peace. I'm hoping that Fauré will provide that for us on Sunday, May 6.
