#### Dear Friends,

These past months of sabbatical leave have been a gift, and I thank you all for this time, thanking especially **Jenny Rankin** who assumed the duties of Head of Staff, thanking the entire staff who assumed additional responsibilities, the hardworking Standing Committee, and all of you who continue to make this institution of First Parish the vibrant place it is. Thanks to Capital Campaign folks who are turning dreams into realities, especially the amazing **Melissa Gallo**. Thanks to our fundraisers, especially **Cynthia Ellis**, who served a second year as a dedicated leader of this important function.

People have asked me, "What did you *do* on sabbatical?" and I have answered that this time has been more about being than doing, though I did plenty. This summer marked the 35th anniversary of my ordination into ministry, and this fall will mark the beginning of my 20th year here in Concord with you. These months were a good time to look back and to look forward, and to discern what this next chapter of my ministry with you might be like, what retirement might be like.

I read about three dozen books, divided equally between fiction and nonfiction, and if you ask, I'll share the list with you. From some, sermons will emerge; others were mysteries and novels by favorite authors. I saw lots of my grandchildren, especially the newest, Anita Rose, and I can say just holding and snuggling her was renewal in itself. I wrote about spiritual discipline, about the stories of my own life. I scanned old photographs and slides onto my computer. I visited family cemeteries in western Maine.

I traveled: on business for my wider Unitarian Universalist connections, to Houston, to Santa Barbara, to Berkeley, to Portland, Oregon. Elizabeth and I traveled to northern California, to Nashville, to Monhegan Island and to Crescent Lake in Maine. We were in Nashville in May for the Festival of Homiletics, an amazing week of listening to outstanding preachers and teachers and of participating in worship of the highest caliber.

Nashville is where we went to school 35 years ago, so we walked the Vanderbilt campus, found the vacant lot where our rental apartment had been, and reconnected to the small congregation where I had done my field education. A new sunroom has been added to the side of our home. I walked the neighborhood. We sorted out clutter. I gave away clothes and books. What a time! Many thanks.

It will be good to be together. Please join us on Opening Sunday, the ninth of September. We will celebrate our community and all we stand for.

### *Money Matters*

I hope everyone had an enjoyable summer. Here at First Parish, the summer is a transition time as we close the books from one fiscal year and set up the financial information for the next year.

We finished FY'07 with a strong net income of \$46K. We were very fortunate to receive a significant amount of pledge income in the month of June, \$74K as compared to \$42K in June of FY'06. We also received subscription income this year to fulfill pledges from prior years. Income in other areas contributed to our strong net income as well. We received several monetary gifts, and higher interest rates led to higher interest income. The Wright Tavern ended the year with a higher income than projected, while program expenses came in close to budget. The net income from FY'07 will be added to our retained earnings and serve as a reserve for future years to compensate for unexpected negative changes in our income or extraordinary expenses.

Looking forward, as most of you know, our pledges for FY'08 were significantly lower than we had hoped. When we finalized our budget in June, our pledges for FY'08 were actually lower than our pledges were in FY'07. This makes budgeting difficult because certain expenses automatically increase due to inflation. We were fortunate in receiving gifts to help close this gap, but it was still necessary to make budget cuts in each of the program and operational areas. If you have not made a pledge for this year, we hope you will still consider doing so. We appreciate the support of both time and money that you give to First Parish.

### Pastoral Care News

We at First Parish are returning for another church year in the midst of Lughnasadh (pronounced loó nassa), beginning August 1 and ending October 31, which is the Celtic autumnal season of harvesting crops and of harvesting the gifts of spiritual maturity. As we return to be in community, we can give thanks for the gifts we have received and we can apply those gifts to create another dynamic year at First Parish.

Unitarian Universalists often joke that coffee hour is "UU communion." That's not a bad analogy if we think of communion as that time when we "break bread together," becoming one in community. Coffee hour at First Parish is also the time to reconnect with friends or make new ones, and learn about social action initiatives and social functions. Unfortunately it can be a chaotic time, with children and adults moving rapidly in a very crowded area. As a result, coffee hour is not always accessible to everyone, because they may not be steady on their feet due to age, physical disability, pregnancy, etc. In the spirit of "promoting and affirming the inherent dignity of the individual," the Pastoral Care Council (Judy Dembsey, Pam Ressler, Ursula Kristoffy and Dianne Weiss) and I, with the support of the ministers, plan to have a "designated safe space," with a few tables and chairs set up in the Parish Hall. To ensure the appropriate people use the space, Council members will oversee it until people get used to its purpose. Please help us make coffee hour a time for all who would like to attend.

Once a month, on Tuesday afternoons, there will be two new events. "Matinee at First Parish" will show a movie followed by a discussion (see the Sunday News for specifics). In addition, through the Wright Tavern, Lorraine Loviglio and I will host "Tea and Poetry," inviting people to share their favorite poetry and enjoy some tea. Nicole Sheehan is one of our new reception coordinators for memorial services. Over the summer Nicole did a wonderful job, with the support of Rhoda Miller. ### **CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE** September 2007

It's been a productive summer, with many volunteers and staff members meeting regularly.

Our Capital Campaign fundraising total is now a little over \$3,015,000.

The RFP (Request for Proposal) from the Organ Committee went out in June, and proposals are due August 31.

During the summer, work began on some of the routine maintenance issues.

- Most noticeable is the regilded dome, which looks beautiful.
- A new sound system is under way.
- The windows are being reglazed and repainted.

The Massachusetts Architectural Access Board voted unanimously to grant First Parish a variance for the front entrance of the Meeting House, which means we will not have to build a ramp outside the columned entrance.

As we begin getting more details on maintenance and building, we're finding we have quite a complex



site — with overlapping jurisdictions and requirements. For example, the Historic District Commission has already asked for several revisions to our plans. The Natural Resources Commission's concern about vegetation around and run-off into the Mill

Brook will impact site engineering. The Zoning Board plays a role. In addition, because some maintenance items have been delayed for so long, our old electrical and plumbing systems will require substantial work to meet current codes.

A more complete update will be available on Opening Sunday. Hope to see you then.

From the proponents of order, who believed that the only legitimate ruler of a nation state is God, Spiritual Renewal to the defenders of liberty, who believed

that only the separation of church and

state can preserve people's freedom, he offers a new vision of our earliest presidents' beliefs, reshaping assumptions about the debates that still reverberate across our land. Come hear Rev. Dr. Church talk about his critically acclaimed new book on religion and presidential politics in the early republic: So Help Me God.

Rev. Dr. Forrest Church is now Minister of Public Theology of All Souls, NYC, after serving almost three decades there as Senior Minister. Dr. Church has written or edited 23 books. His most recent book, So Help Me *God: The Founding Fathers and the First Great Battle over* Church and State is being published by Harcourt in September 2007.

# SPIRIT PLAY, STORY PLAY AND CAREGIVING FOR ROTATIONS 1, 2 AND 3
