In these weeks leading to spring, in these days that are lengthening — the word "lengthening" giving birth to the word "Lent," — in these days of "not quite," there is hard work to be done. Sometime before the new growth, how shall we clear away what is dead, those last brown and dried plants that must be cleared if the green beneath is to break through. This is the task, Nora Gallagher writes: "to discern what is fantasy and what is reality, what is dead and what is alive, what is a narcotic and what is food. It is dangerous [work], wrenching, and unavoidable."

I was drawn to Frederick Buechner years ago through a little book called *Wishful Thinking*: *An Alphabet of Grace* and his clear and funny and right-to-the-target definitions of words theological. Here is, in part, his definition of "Lent," and it contains some suggestions for the hard work we are invited to do. He asks five questions, not Christian questions, not Jewish or Hindu questions, but five human questions:

"When you look at your face in the mirror, what do you see in it that you most like and what do you see in it that you most deplore?

If you had only one last message to leave to the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in twenty-five words or less?

Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest to remember?

Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for?

If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?"

I invite you to wrestle with any or all of these questions or to make up some of your own questions. And, if you want to share some of the answers and struggles with me, I'd be honored. You can e-mail me, you can write me, you can call me, you can come in and visit with me over the next several weeks. This is the season for such questions, a season of introspection, a season of inventory, a season of cleaning out and making way.

Buechner says that "to hear yourself try to answer questions like these is to begin to hear something not only of who you are but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become. It can be a pretty depressing business all in all, but if sackcloth and ashes are at the start of it, something like Easter may be at the end." I invite your engagement this lengthening season. I invite your stretching, inwardly and also outwardly, toward those who need you. We go deeper. We go out into the world.

ACOUSTICS, CARPETING AND THE SANCTUARY

As part of the upcoming capital improvements to the First Parish Meeting House, the carpeting in the Sanctuary is scheduled to be removed. It will either be replaced with new carpeting, a new hard surface, or a combination of new carpeting and a new hard surface.

A full range of options will be considered when we begin an experiment at the end of April (while our regular services are continuing) by removing the carpeting completely. This will allow us to observe how removal of the carpeting will impact the acoustics in the Sanctuary and affect our worship experience, including hearing the spoken word, our congregational singing and the wonderful music that is so important to our worship services. You as parishioners, the ministers and the staff will have a chance to weigh in on how much of the carpeting should be replaced, or whether it should be replaced at all.

The removal of the carpeting will also assist in the process of refinishing the pews over this coming summer. With the carpeting completely up, the refinishing will proceed faster and we will be able to refinish more of each pew.

This experiment will begin by removing the carpeting during the week of April 21 (school vacation week), and will run through the month of May and into the summer. By September we will have our new floor surface chosen and installed.

We realize that when the carpeting is removed, the aesthetics of the Sanctuary will definitely be affected, and we hope for your patience and thoughtful response to this experiment.

Money Matters

I arrived raring to go on January 2, and I haven't looked back since! I spent most of January acquainting myself with budgets and procedures, which prompted me to send out what I hope was a helpful message about your Annual Statement.

We are not extravagant in our spending here at First Parish. We often find ourselves living by the old Yankee saying, "Use it up, wear it out, make it do, do without." This is not necessarily a bad thing (except when it's your computer that dies in the midst of creating RE curriculum), because it makes us careful about how we use the money you give to First Parish.

Mindful that some income sources will be lost next year (e.g., the Milldam Nursery School) and others will be reduced somewhat (our contribution from the Trustees), we are planning only conservative increases in next year's budget. Your pledge dollars provide about 72 percent of our income. Here in the midst of our Pledge•2008 drive, I ask that you please pledge generously this year so that we can make up for anticipated losses and modest increases. And also please pledge in a timely way so that we can plan effectively.

I am very grateful to be in this position as your Business Manager, and I hope that if you are at the church during the week that you will stop by the Wright Tavern and say hello.

MUSings

Easter comes so early this year! As I write this in mid-February, the snow seems like a permanent frosting on the ground and the temperatures have been at their most frigid.

It is hard to believe that in only a month we will be celebrating spring, renewal and resurrection. And even as we do, that perma-snow may still be with us! Such

is the irony of Eastertide in New England.

Our choral music for this Easter Sunday will be by Boston-based composers of two very different eras who most certainly knew the paradox of springtime in New England. William Billings (1746-1800) was the most important American composer of the 18th century. Born in Boston, he was trained as a tanner and worked widely as a singing master, most notably at the Brattle Street Church and the Old South Church. He was self-taught as a composer, often eschewing the stylistic conventions of the day. Billings published six collections of hymns, anthems, Psalm tunes and fuguing tunes. His *Easter Anthem*, written in 1787, was the mostly widely printed and beloved "Yankee" anthem of its time. The text — by Billings himself, and presumably reflecting his own theological perspective — is a series of questions and statements concerning the resurrection of Jesus.

Randall Thompson (1899-1984) was born in New York just 100 years after Billings' death. He was educated at Harvard and taught at Wellesley College, the University of California at Berkeley, the Curtis Institute and Princeton before coming back to Harvard in 1948, where he stayed until his retirement. Thompson's compositions included symphonic literature and instrumental chamber music, but his favorite medium was choral music. The *Alleluia*, was written for the opening of the Berkshire Music Center at Tanglewood and was first performed by the student body there in July of 1940. It has since become a mainstay of American choral literature. The text is only one celebratory word, "Alleluia," but in five minutes Thompson uses it to express a full range of joy, from intimate awe to full-throated jubilation.

Yes, Easter could easily be grey and wintry this year. But with our voices and with the help of these two "Yankee" composers, we will sing out the promise that this season holds.

Developed in response to many Unitarian Universalist adults' desire to engage in life-giving spiritual practices, the ten workshops of *Spirit in Practice* invites a congregation to reflect, share, and grow together, exploring ways to nurture their connections with the sacred in everyday life. *Spirit in Practice* weaves Unitarian Universalist values, principles, and sources with four "strands" of development: spiritual, ethical, Unitarian Universalist identity, and faith.

Spirit in Practice was created to help Unitarian Universalists develop regular disciplines that support connection with the sacred, however they understand it. The program affirms religious diversity while seeking unity in our communal quest for meaning and wholeness. Whether participants follow a path they identify as Humanist, Jewish, Christian, Pagan, Theist, Agnostic, Mystic, and/or any of the other paths we follow in our diverse congregations, the Spirit in Practice workshops offer a forum for learning that can enrich their faith journeys and deepen their spiritual growth.

Spirit in Practice focuses on eight spheres of holistic and wholehearted spiritual practices:

- 1) Personal spiritual practices March 17
- 2) Communal worship practices March 31
- 3) Spiritual partnerships April 7
- 4) Mind practices April 14

- 5) Body practices May 5
- 6) Soul practices May 12
- 7) Life practices May 19
- 8) Justice practices June 2

Sessions are 90 minutes in length and designed for flexibility. Session I (March 10) introduces this eight-sphere concept; 2 - 9 examine each of the spheres in turn; 10 (June 9) is designed to review and integrate the others. The spheres can be explored as a complete series or as individual sessions. Spirit in Practice is offered as an integrated educational series at a discounted rate, but individual sessions can be attended on a stand-alone basis at the drop-in fee.

Fundraising: To help support these initiatives we are looking at multiple funding sources — the UUPCC, our Social Action Council, individual donors and travelers, the Davis Foundation and two spring fundraising events.
