#### **REVeries**

It's been a long, cold winter and I imagine that many of us are more than ready for spring. Thoreau loved the spring more than any other season. "One attraction in coming to the woods to live," he wrote in Walden, "was that I should have leisure and opportunity to see the spring come in." "I am on the alert," he wrote "for the first signs of spring...Walden is melting apace...it is glorious to behold this ribbon of water sparkling in the sun...such is the contrast between winter and spring. Walden was dead and is alive again."

Knowing what helps you feel more alive is a great gift. For me, the transcendentalists are a group who admonish me to "wake up" and urge me to go toward more "aliveness." They have spiritual vitality that both inspires and challenges me.

Next spring, in March of 2009, **Lillian Anderson** and I will be leading a trip to Italy to retrace the footsteps of Emerson, Margaret Fuller, Theodore Parker, Hawthorne, and others. "Tracing the Transcendentalists in Italy" is our working title, and we are in the very early stages of planning. Come to a meeting on Sunday, May 4, at 7 p.m. if you'd like to learn more.

Although in his later years Emerson could say disparaging things about travel in general, and about Europe in particular, I believe that his first trip to Italy in 1833 was life-changing for him. His marriage over, his career ended, it was as if his life had literally come to pieces around him. He was not yet thirty. Emerson decided to go to the West Indies, seeking warmth for his lungs, but when he heard of a ship leaving for Malta, he suddenly changed his mind. He gave up his house, sold his furniture at auction, moved his mother, and on Christmas Day 1832, Emerson's ship sailed for Italy. He would spend the next five months in Europe.

Emerson first entered Rome on March 26, 1833. We will arrive in Rome in late March of 2009, and retrace his footsteps there, as well as explore where Margaret Fuller lived and worked. We will then travel to Florence, where Nathaniel Hawthorne and his wife Sophia lived for a time, where Emerson visited, where Theodore Parker is buried.

With Thoreau, I will be waiting and watching in these next weeks "to see the spring come in." And I will be continuing to learn and plan for next spring and our "transcendental pilgrimage" to Italy. I hope you will consider joining us.

#### ACOUSTICS, CARPETING AND THE SANCTUARY

As part of the upcoming capital improvements to the First Parish Meeting House, the carpeting in the Sanctuary is scheduled to be removed. It will either be replaced with new carpeting, a new hard surface, or a combination of new carpeting and a new hard surface.

A full range of options will be considered when we begin an experiment at the end of April (while our regular services are continuing) by removing the carpeting completely. This will allow us to observe how removal of the carpeting will impact the acoustics in the Sanctuary and affect our worship experience, including hearing the spoken word, our congregational singing and the wonderful music that is so important to our worship services. You as parishioners, the ministers and the staff will have a chance to weigh in on how much of the carpeting should be replaced, or whether it should be replaced at all.

The removal of the carpeting will also assist in the process of refinishing the pews over this coming summer. With the carpeting completely up, the refinishing will proceed faster and we will be able to refinish more of each pew.

This experiment will begin by removing the carpeting during the week of April 21 (school vacation week), and will run through the month of May and into the summer. By September we will have our new floor surface chosen and installed.

We realize that when the carpeting is removed, the aesthetics of the Sanctuary will definitely be affected, and we hope for your patience and thoughtful response to this experiment.

#### A HANDBELL ROAD TRIP

On March 3, the First Parish Handbell Choir rang for the morning service at First Parish in Bedford. The music director in Bedford, Brad Conner, is a longtime friend. I first spoke with Brad last summer about bringing our ringers to his church, which has no handbell choir of its own.

We rehearsed in Bedford the previous Wednesday afternoon to get used to a different setup (down front, and a rather unusual arrangement of tables to fit the small chancel) and different acoustics. On Sunday morning we were comfortable in the space and ready to go. Substitute ringers filled in for one ringer recovering from knee surgery and another on the mend after a serious respiratory infection. A third open position was covered by Bedford's organist, Carol Hamilton.

Meanwhile, Brad sat in as organist on the hymns (accompanied by the bells) as well the postlude, a bells-and-organ arrangement of Holst's *Andante Maestoso*.

Our Concord ringers rang splendidly and to the obvious enjoyment of the congregation. In fact, the entire event was such a success that we have been invited back next spring!

# **MUSings**

This winter, on a visit to the UUA Bookstore, I picked up a slim volume, a meditation manual by Rev. Barbara Merritt, the senior minister of our congregation in Worcester. The title, *Amethyst Beach*, hints at the many gems of everyday spiritual wisdom and humor contained in its pages.

Throughout this snowy winter and as we anticipate a spring and summer full of changes and challenges here at First Parish, I have been drawn back to a chapter early in the book

entitled "Feeding the Pit." In this short essay, Merritt recalls a conversation she overheard between two workmen constructing an elevator at the Worcester

church. One of them was on a ladder over a three-story elevator pit. The man on the ladder asked the other for four bolts. His companion replied, "I'll give you five; you need to have one to feed the pit."

Being ready to "feed the pit" has been a helpful metaphor for me. Things usually don't go quite as we expect and the idea of having an extra "bolt" in reserve when one drops into the pit is wise counsel. Rev. Merritt goes on to discuss the nature of "the pit" and our various responses to its existence: denial, protest, indignation, paralysis. Despite the slightly superstitious air, it seems so practical to be ready to feed the pit.

Through these weeks, in my own reflection and in conversation with colleagues at First Parish, where we are entering a period promising its share of "pits"— both real and metaphorical — I have wondered, What are the extra "bolts" I am carrying with me up on that ladder? What are the extra bolts I need to ask for from my companions? The answer depends on the day and the situation, but faith, patience, flexibility and a sense of humor are usually high on the list.

I recommend Barbara Merritt's *Amethyst Beach* to you. Read "Feeding the Pit" and the other jewels in this volume. And think about what your extra "bolts" might be.
