Dear Friends,

It was wonderful to see so many of you at Opening Sunday at Kerem Shalom. Gary preached on "exile," the choir sang *By the Rivers of Babylon*," and one person commented, as they were leaving, that they had parked their car in Babylon! Yes, it is a teensy weensy bit inconvenient, but we thank you for hanging in there and for showing up.

Although many things are different, many things are the same. We still welcome your children for Religious Education on Sunday morning, and your teenagers for youth group at night. We still reach out to one another in times of crisis or transition. You help us out when you let one of the ministers know of a pastoral need. We are still a congregation that trains new ministers, and you have welcomed **Angela Herrera** graciously. We still learn together. We welcome special guest Robert Richardson this month with lectures on William James and Emerson. (He is the college professor whose class everybody *had* to take; don't miss it.) Gary still joins with some of you to "listen for God," and I am teaching Transcendentalism again. We are blessed with a spiritual renewal center that brings us some of our old favorites as well as new opportunities to stretch and grow.

We hope that there will be a way this community called First Parish can strengthen your spirit this year. Yes, we are under construction; yes, things are different; and yes, there will be things we miss. No point in denying it. We need as much humor, patience and flexibility as we can muster. I thank the staff, who have had so much added to their plate, and think especially of those crammed into the Parlor (come and see!). Yet I think about those Israelites out there in the wilderness, wandering around, grumbling, as they were sent one test after another. Wherever they went, they took their ark of the covenant with them. When they set up the Tabernacle, they could worship. Wherever they were, they were home. They had their heart, their center, their stillpoint in whatever storm came.

My hope for each one of us is that we can, as one person said to me yesterday, "find the stillness" in the midst of the busyness of our own lives, in the midst of this sometimes-crazy transition year upon which we are so bravely embarking. It remains an honor and a delight for me to be part of a faith community that holds itself to a high standard, that tries to do so much, for one another and for the wider world. See you at Kerem Shalom!

# Our Meeting House Family

On September 20, **Gary Smith** officiated at a memorial service at First Parish in Lincoln for longtime member **Jean Harwood**, who died in California on August 6. Bill Winter, 56-year-old brother of **Anna Winter Rasmussen** and **Susan Frommer**, was stricken suddenly at his Wayland home on August 9 and died August 17; a memorial service was held at the Martha Mary Chapel in Sudbury on August 25. **Pam Schweppe** and her family have suffered yet another loss with the August 23rd death of her father, Peter Smith, following a long illness; a memorial service was held at the Trinitarian Congregational Church on September 5. **Mark Hazel**, age forty-six, husband of **Sarah Hazel** and father of young **Chloe** and **Gwen**, died at home in Concord on August 30 while under hospice care; **Margie King Saphier** officiated at his Kerem Shalom memorial service on September 7.

Former parishioner **Carol Novak** died on September 3 while hospitalized for lung disease; **Becky Blodgett** represented First Parish at a memorial celebration of Carol's life, held September 7 at the New View Community House at the Half Moon Hill community in Acton. Maria Bade, mother of **Chris Bade** and a Holocaust survivor, died in Concord on September 5; **Jenny Rankin** conducted a service in her honor at the Society of Friends Meetinghouse in Cambridge on September 13. Cathryn Bean, daughter of **Cliff** and **Dorrie Bean**, died at Salem Hospital on September 7 after a long illness; no service is planned, and the family requests privacy. **Beth Norton**'s aunt, Helen Henderson McIlwraith, died on September 8 in New Hampshire; "Aunt Honey" had been living with cancer for several years. We remember all these families with deepest sympathy and continue to hold them in our hearts.

Special thoughts go out to **Mary Matheson**, who fell and broke her pelvis in late August; notes would be appreciated at Life Care of Nashoba Valley in Littleton, where she is in rehab. Also to **Dianne Weiss**, who is in New York City with her mother-in-law, Margolith Goldsmith Weiss, now under the care of hospice. And to **Kel Keleher**, whose September 12th gallbladder surgery didn't keep him from Opening Sunday two days later.

We're happy to report two newborns, and send congratulations to the Kemeza and Leopold-Berry families. Liam Robert Kemeza was born to **Charlotte** and **Will Kemeza** on August 14. **Don** and **Dee Leopold** welcomed a grandson on September 9; Quinn Peter Berry was born to their daughter Holly.

On Monday mornings, the staff gathers for one-half hour and we share a highlight of what's coming up for our area that week. I often have trouble coming up with one thing that might summarize what I'll be up to. The scope of this job is broad (something I love about it), and sometimes very deep in detail (filling out forms for the government — not so much love there). In any given week, I will work in all of these areas:

**Capital Campaign:** pledging, construction, loan agreement, logistics, personnel, budget

**Annual Campaign:** pledging, planning, monitoring payments

Annual Budget: reporting, planning, analysis

**Executive Team:** strategy, decision making, work planning, problem solving

**Operations:** insurance, legal matters, interface with the Commonwealth (more frequent than you might think!), infrastructure planning

There are other things too, like working with the wonderful Human Resources Committee, who this year have offered to revamp our personnel policies manual; and attending the Standing Committee monthly meeting. This position does not suffer from a lack of diversity in tasks!

One other note: For those of you who are interested, the monthly financial report is available in hard copy from the Business Office, after it has been approved by the Standing Committee.

#### Pastoral Care News

October is a time for introspection, as well as looking back. The leaves are falling; the light is fading, reminding us that life is finite and precious. Rev. Forrest Church writes in *Death and Love: My Journey through the Valley of the Shadow*, "Religion is our human response to the dual reality of being alive and having to die. Knowing we must die, we question what life means." Forrest goes on to say, "The goal of life is to live in such a way that our lives will prove worth dying for." Freely giving love to others makes life worth living for, as well as dying for. Forrest also believes that "love given away lives on forever."

Giving love away is being in right relationship with one self, with one another, and with all that is. The Jewish High Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are about being in right relationship by atoning for one's sins (or withholding one's love) against oneself, others and God. Divali, or the Festival of Lights, marks the Hindu, Sikh and Jain New Year and is celebrated throughout the Indian subcontinent, Europe and North America. In addition to welcoming the New Year, Divali focuses on hope, friendship and goodwill, or being in right relationship.

At First Parish, as we worship at Kerem Shalom, we are called to be in right relationship with one another in new ways. In addition to being sensitive to the fact that our large congregation adds a lot more wear and tear on their beautiful new sanctuary, we also need to be sensitive to our own members who need to park near the synagogue. Please plan on arriving early so you have plenty of time to let your family off at the synagogue entrance, to park your car on Elm Street and to walk back in time for the service. A word of caution: As cars leave Route 2 and turn right onto Elm Street, they are often driving very fast and are not expecting to meet traffic or pedestrians turning into the Kerem Shalom driveway.

If you are interested in joining a covenant group, also known as Small Group Ministry, call me or talk to me at coffee hour. I am the one walking around with a yellow hard hat, which says, "Ask me about Covenant Groups!" Joining a Covenant Group is another way of cultivating being in right relationship.

### **MUSings**

"Exile" was our community's spiritual theme last month — an appropriate metaphor as we continue to worship away from our church home in this time of transition. In my planning during September and in my personal reflections as we continue to live the day-to-day reality of this construction period, I am drawn back to the words of Psalm 137, the song of a people in exile:

On the willows there
We hung up our harps
For there our captors
Asked us for songs
And our tormentors, asked for mirth, saying
"Sing us one of the songs of Zion!"

How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?

The songs of the captive Israelites were an essential part of their identity in exile. They were demeaned by their captors' insistence that they sing these holy songs as mere entertainment. What a poignant reminder of the importance of music to a culture and a community of faith.

Our worship at Kerem Shalom has been blessed by some wonderful congregational singing. Like the generous congregation that is hosting us, the intimate,

resonant sanctuary seems to embrace us and encourage us to sing the songs of our faith. It is easy to hear one another and feel a part of the whole. How can we keep from singing!

Recently, the First Parish staff gathered to sing hymn number 1020, Woyaya, at the beginning of a meeting:

We are going, heaven knows where we are going, but we know within. And we will get there, heaven knows how we will get there, but we know we will.

It will be hard, we know, and the road will be muddy and rough, But we'll get there, heaven knows how we will get there, but we know we will.

This song's resonance with our current situation is obvious! But I was also struck by the spirit in that room as we raised our voices together in song. Our singing strengthened us and encouraged us to face our daily challenges with faith, optimism and humor.

I feel this when I sing with the choir each Wednesday; when we sing as a congregation each Sunday; when we surround one another in times of sadness or in joy, providing sustenance with the sound of our voices.

What though the tempest 'round me roars, I know the truth, it liveth. What though the darkness 'round me close, songs in the night it giveth. No storm can shake my inmost calm, while to that rock I'm clinging, Since love prevails in heaven and earth, How can I keep from singing?

May we continue to be sustained by the songs of our faith in the weeks and months ahead.

# Going Deeper Spiritually

Monthly Thematic and Theological Queries for the People of the First Parish in Concord

#### SERIES II, 2008-2009

**Note:** Following the lead of All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Unity Church in St. Paul and the First Parish in Weston, we continue this month a series of reflections, each month focusing on a particular theological concept. Worship during the month will include at least one Sunday where this concept is explored. We hope the suggested topic for the month will find its way into our small group gatherings and into our conversations, even at home.

October 2008: **REPENTANCE** — For some of us, depending on our religious background, repentance can be a "heavy" word. But we chose it to honor wisdom from the Jewish High Holy Days and because we think it has a hopeful, human message.

The Hebrew word for repentance is *teshuva* and it means "turning." These ten days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are a time to turn — turn back toward the kind of life you really want to be living but are not. Turn back toward your true self, toward others, toward God.

Repentance here is not useless, agonizing self-flagellation. *Teshuva* is something we *do*. It is positive, constructive, practical. We admit we're human, that we make mistakes, and we try to make amends, reaching out to people we have hurt. These are the days to pick up the phone, send a card, wipe the slate clean, start the new year fresh.

In order to repent, we first have to wake up. Think about how we are living. Or not living. Reflect on our lives.
