#### **REVeries**

According to the late James Luther Adams, Unitarian Universalist theologian, people come to Sunday services seeking "intimacy and ultimacy." Intimacy is finding authentic and meaningful friendship, and ultimacy is finding meaning in our lives by exploring our deepest beliefs. Covenant Groups are one place you can do this.

These two spiritual goals are fostered in an environment where one is listened to with respect and without judgment. It is through listening to one another we are able to broaden our perspectives and deepen our understanding. The Dalai Lama says, "Listening is like a torch that dispels the darkness of ignorance."

The experience of Covenant Groups often reminds me of the words, "Roots hold me close, wings set me free" in the hymn *Spirit of Life*. The safe environment of Covenant Groups provides the roots, while the process of sharing and exploration sets us free.

A few years ago Don Leopold, a facilitator of an ongoing Covenant Group, wrote for the *Meeting House News* "The Top 11 Benefits I Have Received from Small Group Ministry [now Covenant Groups]." Here are five of those benefits that describe the experience of intimacy and ultimacy.

- 1. I have gotten to know people in a wonderfully new way that is "backward" that is, I usually get to know people first based on what they do or where they live or who their children are; through Covenant Group, I've gotten to know some wonderful people based on what's in their hearts and what they think and how they experience the world, and then perhaps, what they do, where they live and who their kids are.
- 2. I get to participate in what often feels like terrific college bull sessions without having to stay up all night or worrying about exams or sprawling around in uncomfortable positions.
- 3. For a person for whom religion and spirituality and frankly, much of life, have always been intensely personal and individual, I get to explore highly intimate and for me important, issues in a small, safe, supportive community.
- 4. I get to hear and consider points of view of others who often come at issues from a very different perspective.
- 5. I get to hear and say and remember these closing words from Wayne Arnason at the end of each session: "Take courage, friends. The way is often hard, the path is never clear, and the stakes are high. Take courage. For deep down there is another truth. You are not alone."

#### TRACING THE TRANSCENDENTALISTS

To Nathaniel Hawthorne, they were a bunch of "queer, strangely dressed, oddly behaved mortals" who had infested the little country village of Concord. Hawthorne thought the transcendentalists who flocked around Emerson took themselves way too seriously and in the end, he said they were "simply bores of a very intense water." Writers, scholars and thinkers since Hawthorne's time have debated fiercely over exactly what and who constituted the transcendentalist movement, but all agree that this intellectual, spiritual and literary flowering, much of it emanating from Concord in the mid-19th century, was to have an unprecedented impact on the still-forming identity of America.

Whether you are part of the group from First Parish that is going to Italy in March of 2009 to trace the transcendentalists, or you are simply interested in learning more right here at home, join **Jenny Rankin** for the class "Transcendentalism: The Dream and the Dreamers," which started October 20. #### Pastoral Care News

Have you noticed how prevalent references to alcohol are in advertisements, the media, our children's education — even the presidential campaign? One recent reference is the appeal to "Joe Six-Pack" as the nomenclature for Every Man from Main Street. On the other hand, The New Yorker magazine regularly has several jokes about alcohol consumption — instead of beer it is a martini or two or three. Most of us know someone with a "drinking problem." Many Unitarian Universalists feel uncomfortable in AA meetings because dependence on a higher power is part of the 12-step program. On Tuesday, November 4, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. and repeated again Wednesday, November 5, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m., Nancy Sweeney, who is a First Parish member, clinical psychologist and instructor with the Harvard Medical School, and who has extensive experience working with addiction, will present "Beyond Craving, Beyond Gratification: Parallels and Paradox in Buddhism and Alcoholics Anonymous." In keeping with the UU tradition of exploring the wisdom derived from various spiritual traditions, this seminar will look at two traditions, one old and one relatively new, that have some surprising similarities. Topics such as craving and gratification, the nature of happiness, and "surrender" as a spiritual practice will be discussed. It is hoped that this discussion will foster a greater appreciation of some simple but powerful ideas that can be a source of strength and serenity during these times of chaos. A minimum of six participants required, so please contact the First Parish office if you plan to attend.

Last spring I attended the Interfaith Clergy Symposium sponsored by Domestic Violence Services Network. Middlesex District Attorney Gerry Leone reported that in Massachusetts, domestic homicides went from 15 in 2005 to 42 in 2007. This is a 270 percent increase. Domestic violence occurs in all socioeconomic levels and all races. Batterers have a need to feel in control. Uncertain financial times can increase this felt need. If you are being emotionally or physically battered, you can call the Domestic Violence Victim Assistance Program at 888-399-6111, where you will receive unconditional support. This number is toll-free and will not appear on your phone bill. I also want to stress that the ministers are here to support you.

Grieving is also exacerbated at times of uncertainty as well as during the holiday season. After experiencing a major loss, whether it is the death of a loved one, a job loss, or a divorce, the holiday expectation of family warmth, togetherness and joy can increase one's sense of aloneness. If you find the holiday season difficult, you may want to attend "Good Grief for the Holidays," presented by Allene Riley Kussin, MA, LPC, on November 17, from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. in the Trinitarian Congregation Church parish hall.

## Going Deeper Spiritually

Monthly Thematic and Theological Queries for the People of the First Parish in Concord

#### SERIES III, 2008-2009

**Note:** Following the lead of All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Unity Church in St. Paul and the First Parish in Weston, we continue this month a series of reflections, each month focusing on a particular theological concept. Worship during the month will include at least one Sunday where this concept is explored. We hope the suggested topic for the month will find its way into our small group gatherings and into our conversations, even at home.

November 2008: **GRATITUDE** — We take it for granted that Thanksgiving's timing at the end of November makes sense. It seems natural to give thanks in autumn, after the harvest is done. It is a time of storing up and taking stock of our blessings.

On the other hand, in some ways it's rather an extraordinary time to give thanks. After all, how many of us — when our life's most bountiful and most comfortable time winds to a close — look toward a long period of darkness and cold barreling toward us and naturally think, "Thank you!" Yet that is precisely the reality of all but the most recent North American Thanksgivings.

Winter isn't the risky proposition it used to be, with indoor heating, high-tech winter wear, and (if we're lucky) trips to warmer places. But while modern comforts and conveniences take the edge off, we are like our forebears in the sense that we too are subject to life's seasons of abundance and barrenness — sometimes material, sometimes spiritual. A perspective of gratitude gives us strength and hope. In order to adopt this perspective, we must acknowledge our interdependence.

Humility is a virtue integral to gratitude. We cannot recognize the need for gratitude without it. People who are puffed up with their own accomplishments and who do not see how dependent they are on other people and (economic) systems which have favored them are rarely grateful."

Right now, our plan is to return to First Parish on November 30. This is an intergenerational service, so we will not have regular RE that day for our K-6th graders. The following week, December 7, we will have our regularly scheduled RE classes.

Due to the construction project, we will not be able to host our traditional Holiday Craft Workshop on December 6. Because of this, we are planning for the December 7 RE program to be a special RE Sunday that will be set up as our traditional Holiday Craft Workshop. We will not have as many choices as our regular craft workshop, but **Susan Ward** and **Liz Davis-Chaffin** are working hard to bring the same gift-making spirit to this special holiday tradition at First Parish.

Just to give you an idea of how RE will look when we return to First Parish in its still unfinished state, we will have our Spirit Play (K–1st) program in the Wright Tavern, our Babies-4-year-olds in the First Parish Parlor, and our 2nd-6th graders in the Parish Hall. We have created a curriculum that is easily transferable from the Kerem Shalom space to our transitional space here at First Parish. The program will remain pretty much the same as the experience at Kerem Shalom. Many people have commented how calm and engaged our 2nd-6th graders have been with this new curriculum. And despite the weekly modifications in our physical environment, once we prepare the chalice and set our sacred space, the kids don't even seem to notice the changes.

Thank you for all of the support, patience and willingness to jump in and help each Sunday morning, so many offers of help from so many people. It truly has been its own gift.
