Dear Friends,

One of the things I love to do is collect words. Words that matter to me. Words that are beautiful or true (for me). They are words that take my breath away or make my eyes fill up with tears, or they are funny or they make me think. Words about courage or hope or the holy in the midst of ordinary things like flowers on the kitchen table.

I have collected words in haphazard ways probably all my life. Now I'm trying to put them in one place. One day I hope to give some of the words that I treasure to my children.

So I was interested a few years ago to read about Emerson and his "commonplace book." That's what he called the book where he collected poems, quotations, scraps from books or the newspaper or everyday conversation, as well as his own work, drafts of letters or essays.

He started the book when he was 17 years old, and this is what he wrote on the first page:

"These pages are intended at their commencement to contain a record of new thoughts (when they occur); a receptacle of all the old ideas that partial but peculiar peepings at antiquity can furnish or furbish; for tablet to save the wear and tear of weak memory, and in short, for all the various purposes and utility, real or imaginary, which are usually comprehended under that comprehensive title Common Place book."

I know that some of you have favorite "sayings" or poems or prayers. Words that you return to for courage or hope, to help you get through a rough time, or simply the rhythm of the day to day. I'm wondering if you would be willing to share some of these "favorite words" with me. We could make a First Parish "Commonplace Book," if you will, of words that matter to us, as a community. It could be a spiritual resource for us all.

From the Intern Minister

I'll bet you wouldn't guess that I spent nearly a year in a prison. Well, to be exact, I wasn't there all the time. Just about four hours per day. It was a nine-month internship at a maximum-security men's prison with their Buddhist chaplain, a young mother like me, named Karuna. I remember driving to the prison for the first time, filled with anxiety. "Inherent worth and dignity," I repeated to myself. I wondered to what degree my principles would be tested.

Despite my nervousness, I wanted to be there. With over a million people incarcerated, I knew a significant percentage of our country's population was invisible to me, and I wanted to see them. But I soon learned that inmates aren't the only invisible ones. Incarceration also stigmatizes and undermines families, producing a voiceless, despairing class of people all around us who must also be brought into view.

There were many other surprises too. I was as shocked by the poetry and dreams of the prisoners as I was by the violence that broke into their days. (It's one thing to hear about this in the media, and another thing entirely to sit in the room, or stairwell, or dining hall where it happened yesterday and could happen again at any moment. Then you start to get a glimpse of what it is like to live with no safe space.)

But what stands out the most is the day Karuna asked a circle of ten men to name a time they felt loved. I wondered if some would say they never had. But that's not what happened. Instead, all of the men named a time, and more than half of the men identified a time they felt loved inside the prison, by their fellow inmates. When they were sick, or had lost a loved one on the outside, or had been harmed, someone had been there for them. Some of the men were even attending hospice training, so they could care for dying prisoners, who up until that point would simply have died alone in the "sick unit."

I was and still am amazed at the places love can spring up in this world. Where love dominates, hate cannot get a foothold. But where hate is pervasive, love can still show up at any time.

May we take the spirit of love into all the corners of our lives, and may love be yours this spring in both familiar and unexpected places.

In the Jewish tradition, visiting the sick with an open heart and mind is a *mitzvah* or good deed, which brings balance to the one visited and the one doing the visiting. But there are many ways to be with another in the journey of life. Below are upcoming opportunities.

Cancer Support Group: On February 10, we'll be starting a drop-in group for First Parish members and friends who have been diagnosed with cancer. Participants will have an opportunity for reflection, sharing experiences, and exploring common concerns with other members of the First Parish community. Money Matters

Each year the Trustees make a contribution to the annual operating budget. The contribution is based on a formula adopted by the Trustees in FY02, although for at least the past two years the contribution has exceeded the amount calculated using the formula. The Trustees very kindly gave us one year's notice that this coming fiscal year's contribution (for FY10, July 2009 through June 2010) will be reduced by at least \$30,000. This was before the economic downturn.

How do we use the Trustees' contribution to the operating budget? The Trustees are responsible for managing not only the endowment, but also the real estate First Parish owns, and their contribution goes directly to the stewardship of our physical plant — i.e., the Meeting House. The contribution from the Trustees for this year was \$180,000; the budget for all of our property, plant and equipment line items (including personnel) for this year is \$188,594. As you may recall, the annual budget for maintenance does not cover the total maintenance requirements of the Meeting House; hence the accumulated deferred maintenance items included in the Capital Campaign. We hope to build the maintenance endowment up to a level where it will offset at least maintenance requirements, but in the meantime, we will be challenged this year in our Annual Campaign to make up the difference between the Trustees' contribution and our property, plant and equipment expenses. Your gift to our Building Maintenance Fund is welcome. Please contact me for details.

MUSings

As I write here to update you on the organ project progress, the bright sunshine is reflecting off the beautiful white blanket of snow that spread over our region just yesterday, and we are at the beginning of a new year where much hope abounds for change and a fresh outlook and approach to solving the world's myriad challenges.

It's hard to believe that it's been a year now since the contract was signed with Russell & Company organ builders of Vermont. Many of you are asking if the organ work was completed while all the construction work was being done downstairs. Quite the contrary . . . Although we were able to fend off inflation by purchasing many custom parts and supplies for the new organ during 2008, no actual construction work has begun yet. This is

because Russell & Company is a small New England organ builder with a handful of full-time employees. They take great pride in giving attention to all the details that go

into creating a beautiful musical instrument, one at a time. When the contract was signed, we were in line for construction to begin this year on the new chassis for the organ, with new independent wind chests for each individual division. These tonal divisions are small, complete organs in themselves, corresponding to each keyboard of the organ. They will combine and blend to make one beautiful choir of sounds to more adequately and beautifully support the congregational singing of our hymns and the performance of the larger works of the organ repertoire.

Everything is basically on schedule as I write this; we will most likely have our old organ through the spring. During the summer months, all the pipes that will be saved will be removed to the builder's shop for rescaling, rebuilding and voicing. The space will then be prepared during the early summer, with the individual divisions and ranks of pipes being gradually installed during the late summer and continuing on through the autumn. We hope to have quite a bit of the organ playable by Christmas, but fine tonal finishing of the pipes will proceed until everything is musically adjusted to fit the acoustical space of the Sanctuary.

So, while much remains that seems uncertain in the world at large in this new year, you can rest assured that much good is in store for organ lovers at First Parish in Concord and the community. Due to your steadfast support of this musical vision, we can look forward to seeing and hearing this new musical incarnation unfold and come to fruition during the last quarter of the year.

Going Deeper Spiritually

Monthly Thematic and Theological Queries for the People of the First Parish in Concord

SERIES VI, 2008-2009

Note: Following the lead of All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Unity Church in St. Paul and the First Parish in Weston, we continue this month a series of reflections, each month of the year focusing on a particular theological concept. Worship during the month will include at least one Sunday where this concept is explored. We hope the suggested topic for the month will find its way into our small group gatherings and into our conversations, even at home.

February 2009: **LOVE** — We are accustomed to thinking about images of romantic love in February, but this time of year is also an opportunity to think more broadly about love. It is a paradoxical word, in that it can be thrown around casually as in, "I love chocolate!" just as easily as it can become the topic of sincere spiritual reflection. "Love your neighbor," Jesus said, and some have said that God is love. Meanwhile, we receive mixed messages about what it means to love. Consider the following quotations:

Love is an act of the will, not a warm feeling or a clever expression of experience. True love requires you to deny yourself and seek to meet your beloved's needs.

For one human being to love another; that is perhaps the most difficult of all our tasks, the ultimate, the last test and proof, the work for which all other work is but preparation.

—Rainer Maria Rilke

But I always think that the best way to know God is to love many things.

—Vincent van Gogh

Questions:

- What is your reaction to the first quote? How has self-denying love been depicted in your experience? What problems does it pose? Could it be a helpful concept in an age and culture that emphasizes individuality?
- How does our experience of love change over the course of our lives? Do you think it will continue to change for you?
- How does the concept of love fit into your spirituality? Is it a spiritual practice? What does it look like to practice loving one another?

REflection and RE News

"Dad, why do we go to church?" Is this a familiar question in your family? It was in ours.

I have been thinking about that question a lot lately and I probably would have answered it differently a month ago.

My family has been coming to First Parish for ten years. We were drawn here. We were drawn to its vision of peace and diversity, to its commitment to a covenant based on principles and social action, to its request that we live out our faith in the wider world. These values spoke to us then and we hold them dearly now.

We came to First Parish because we wanted a strong religious education for our children. We were looking for a program that instilled a sense of personal integrity while growing a connection to a wider loving community. Life is more than work, school and sports. The driving force behind the things that we do comes from our inner resource, our unique and evergrowing sense of self and soul. We wanted to belong to a place that touched those places in ourselves and our family.

We came to First Parish because we loved the people who also came here. We felt we could offer something to our congregation and that this congregation needed us in ways that were different from our "weekday" lives. And so, it was a surprise to us when I realized that we would, suddenly, need First Parish just as much as it needed us.

When my husband **Mark Howell** was injured last month, we felt held by our First Parish community. Cards, well wishes, meals and rides for teens — all were deeds of love and care for our family. It was a stressful time, but to be cared for by those we love filled our hearts at a time when life fell upon us in an unwelcomed way. Despite the gravity of the injury, I am happy to report Mark is making a full recovery.

"Why do we come to church?" Well, I come because of the awe-inspiring interdependent web of humanity it creates. I come because I want to be present for you, just as you all were present for our family in our time of darkness and uncertainty.

Telling Our Social Action Stories — A Worship Service on March 15

So often at First Parish we hear stories of some of the interesting things our parishioners are doing outside the walls of our church. Some are big, but many are small acts of kindness that make a difference in the everyday lives of people around us. We have been celebrating several of these stories in our religious education program this year. We have also included some of these stories in our Sunday morning message to children. Perhaps some of you will remember the Wheelchair Mission with **Nico Calabria** and **Emmanuel**, or the **Aley** family and their work for The Heifer Project, or our Youth Service trip to New Orleans.

Faith Bade, our Social Action Program Director, and I were talking last year and thought it would be interesting to offer the congregation an opportunity to share some of their stories of their own social action work and its impact on others and themselves.
