ANNUAL APPEAL 2009

Hopefully by the time you read this you will have sent in your pledge card for the Annual Appeal. If for some reason yours got lost at the bottom of a pile somewhere, please call the church office and we will send you another. It is important that you make your pledge now, so that we can put together the budget for the coming year for the Annual Meeting in June.

We realize that family budgets may be especially tight this year, so we are tightening our belts at First Parish. Even though we are facing increasing costs — for example, health insurance — we are not going to increase our budget. Our goal for this year is the same as the amount we raised last year, \$924,000. Pledges support the annual budget of the parish, which provides worship and music, religious education, social justice programs, pastoral care and community events. Pledge income pays the salaries of the ministers and staff, and pays for the operation and maintenance of our beautiful building. An average pledge of \$1680 per family is necessary in order for us to maintain our basic operations and programs.

Please consider what First Parish means to you and your family and pledge an amount that reflects your commitment to our community and our mission. Thank you for helping to keep our doors wide open.

Money Matters

SCHOLARSHIPS/FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE POLICY

First Parish has always offered financial assistance for program and retreat participation to those who request it, with no requirement to prove hardship. That policy remains in effect. However, given the current economic climate, we anticipate that requests for financial assistance will increase, and our ability to meet needs will most likely be strained. Therefore, we thought it would be helpful to clarify the policies and guidelines the ministers use when offering financial assistance.

Both adults and youth may ask for financial help.

For activities such as weekend retreats, Ferry Beach, YRUU fall and winter retreats, snow tubing, Coming of Age, etc., First Parish can offer assistance up to 50 percent of the cost of the activity.

For youth service trips, or adult trips like the ones to Transylvania or Italy, assistance might be available above the 50 percent level, but First Parish cannot pay 100 percent of the cost.

Any youth requesting financial assistance will be asked to earn money to make a contribution toward the cost of the retreat, activity or trip.

If you or your family has experienced a significant change in income due to job loss or medical expenses, please, do not hesitate to ask **Gary Smith** or **Jenny Rankin** for financial assistance. Just call or e-mail and make an appointment. Be assured that your request and discussion with a minister is confidential, and that First Parish will always do its best to meet the needs of its pledging members.



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MUSings

Through this harsh winter and the general anxiety that seems to have prolonged it, I have been looking forward to Easter and the message of renewal, hope and resurrection it brings. A perennial highlight for me is our traditional singing of the *Hallelujah Chorus* from Handel's *Messiah*. I love to look into the congregation during the final hymn on Easter Sunday and see people making their way to the balcony, some clutching well-thumbed *Messiah* scores, to join the choir in the loft.



of this work, but I think it ranks right up there with the most joyous.

The *Hallelujah Chorus* is surrounded by tradition and legend. Most people have learned that the audience should stand for this chorus whenever it is sung. The origins of this tradition are not documented historically. But one story goes that during an early performance of the *Messiah*, King George II stood for the *Hallelujah Chorus*, and since custom dictated that when the king stood, everyone stood, the audience followed suit. The reasons for George II's actions have been variously attributed: he might have been arriving late, as was evidently his custom, and all rose to greet him; he may have been standing to relieve his gout or he may have been so moved that he stood to honor the music. It doesn't matter so much why he stood — or even if he stood. The tradition remains strong.

It is a matter of some debate among conductors whether this tradition is one to be endorsed or discouraged. Some feel it is part of the *Messiah* tradition and that each audience deserves this chance to be part of the tradition. Others feel it is disruptive to the performance. For several seasons, I sang an annual *Messiah* performance in New York with a conductor who would actually turn to the audience as the *Hallelujah Chorus* began and motion them — quite adamantly — to be seated! Hard to say which part of that tradition would be more distracting!

Standing or seated, the *Hallelujah Chorus* is one of the great expressions of joy and triumph in Western music. I am glad that it is part of our Easter celebration and that we are all able to join in the tradition.

Going Deeper Spiritually

Monthly Thematic and Theological Queries for the People of First Parish in Concord

SERIES VIII, 2008-2009

Note: Following the lead of All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Unity Church in St. Paul, and the First Parish in Weston, we continue this month a series of reflections, each focusing on a particular theological concept. Worship during the month will include at least one Sunday where this concept is explored. We hope the suggested topic for the month will find its way into our small group gatherings and into our conversations, even at home.

April 2009: SALVATION — We don't use the word *salvation* very often in UU circles. It's a dusty old word, thrown around for so many hundreds of years. It brings up images of a God who would damn some, save others. Salvation sounds like heaven and hell, hard rules and repentance. Reality feels much more nuanced than that.

But salvation also carries a sense of restoration. And who among us has not felt broken, unfulfilled, hopeless or loveless at one time or another? Our journeys include long and short stretches of "dark woods"; of danger, uncertainty and yearning for wholeness. We get hurt. At times we harm others. We must look beyond ourselves, whether this means entering more deeply into our place in "the interconnected web of all existence," drawing closer to God, or finding the Spirit of Love in relationship with others. The truth is two-fold: we are beautiful and imperfect, strong and dependent, breakable and sometimes broken. We need wholeness. We need restoration. We need salvation.

Senior Youth News

Youth tell me that of all the things they have done at First Parish, service trips have had the biggest impact on them. Therefore, Faith Bade and I have been working hard to plan three service trips this year, and we are beginning to plan another one — to Honduras for February 2010. Over April vacation there are 12 youth/chaperones heading to New Orleans to rebuild houses that are still in disrepair after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Another group of 17 youth/chaperones will be going to El Salvador over April vacation to help rebuild an art center for peace. Then in July another 24 will be going to Transylvania to rebuild a community center. And now we are working with Dave and Diane **Clapp** to plan a February vacation trip to Honduras through the Heifer Project. We are fortunate to have so many wonderful adults chaperoning and planning these trips and a committed group of youth willing to give up precious vacation time to serve others. Over my five years here as Youth Director, I've seen youth come back from these trips forever changed by the experience of helping others. Not only are these experiences personally meaningful, but they help our youth feel connected to each other and the First Parish community.

Beyond service trips, Sunday night Youth Group offers youth a chance to check in, grow spiritually and build community on a weekly basis. There aren't many Sunday nights in April, but the YAC has planned a few fun events:

red apron to become an elf for a day, helping our children make crafts to keep or to give as gifts to family and friends.
