Dear Friends,

I could have used this column to beseech each and every one of you to participate generously in this year's Annual Appeal, and to thank all of you who have. It is a tight year. You will hear soon of some of the necessary reductions in expenses we have needed to make just to hold even this year (see the Budget Status Report insert included with this *Meeting House News*). So your participation on the income side matters more than ever.

But I write instead of staff and decision making and some changes that many of you may not have noticed. Several years ago, the Standing Committee challenged Jenny and me to hire a strong business manager and to consider forming an Executive Team consisting of the three of us, moving from a more "corporate" model of having a Head of Staff (me) to a less hierarchical model of a team, with the Business Manager taking on operational matters and leaving Jenny and me to focus on our ministry to you. Once we hired **Melissa Gallo** in early 2008, we began working toward this goal and have now settled into this new model.

The Executive Team meets regularly and often, each of us making decisions in our own areas of expertise but bringing greater policy and strategic questions back to the team. We work closely with the Standing Committee to shape our dreams for First Parish out over the next several years and we report to them on our progress. We are sharing the responsibilities of leading this large and important institution. It is a model for now, recognizing that the three of us have a certain chemistry and combination of talents that make this model work.

At the latest Standing Committee meeting, we were thanked for the work we do together, which we truly appreciated, and I wanted you to know about it. Any of us welcome your comments and questions.

Pastoral Care News

At the recent Alzheimer's workshop, Rev. Jade Angelica cited two quotes about hope. The first quote was from Martin Luther, "Even if I knew the world would end tomorrow, I would still plant an apple tree today." The second was by Vaclav Havel, "Hope is not believing you can change things; hope is believing you can make a difference."

When a loved one has Alzheimer's, it often seems like the end of the world, but we can make a difference by entering his or her reality. Because of the on-going changes in the brain, the Alzheimer's brain interprets what is being seen or experienced differently from how you and I see or experience the same thing. The paradox is, if we insist on our reality as truth, the loved one with Alzheimer's will likely stonewall, become belligerent, and be very upset. We can make a positive difference by being curious about what they see, hear or are experiencing. Our responses can honor their experience and also offer a sense of safety.

Being curious about another person's perspective is a good way to affirm and promote the inherent dignity of all individuals, not just those with Alzheimer's. When we truly listen to another with curiosity, he or she is more likely to listen to us. This transition of returned curiosity does not happen with a loved one with Alzheimer's; instead the bonus is a loved one who feels safe and understood. This is not easy work. It requires that we remain open while we grieve the daily mental and physical diminishments of our loved one. The Alzheimer's Association (800-272-3900) is a wonderful resource for families looking for education and support groups, as is the Concord Council on Aging. Olivia Ames Hoblitzelle, author of The Majesty of Your Loving: A Couple's Journey through Alzheimer's, addresses how to have an open heart and mind in the midst of grief.

A special thanks to the RE staff and children who decorated paper bags to deliver meals to parishioners by Caring Connection. The children also decorated note cards. Starting in September, Pastoral Care will have a table in the Parish Hall so you can write "Thinking of you" or "Congratulations" notes to a parishioner who was mentioned that day prior to silent meditation. In this way we all have the opportunity to show our care, concern and joy for one another.

Money Matters

2009 Annual Appeal Update — Give to Your Values

By the time you read this, the "official" portion of the 2009 Annual Appeal will be over, and the budgeting process for our 2009-2010 fiscal year will have begun. Many thanks to those of you who have already pledged. As of today (April 17), we are at nearly 70% of our target pledge goal. As you may recall from our earlier communications, this year's pledge target of \$924,000 represents a reduction of our current year's budget by nearly 12%, based on our realization of the challenging financial times that all of us are facing. Even so, we still have a long way to go in order to meet this goal, as only slightly more than half of our church members have pledged thus far. In any fundraising campaign, the last 20% is always the most difficult, so the Annual Appeal team is working hard to ensure that we meet this pledge goal in a timely manner.

There is a certain sense of urgency in achieving this goal. For example, reaching only 90% of the \$924,000 target would represent a reduction of \$92,000 in our budget for next year. What many members of First Parish don't realize is that because so many of our costs are fixed, a shortfall of this magnitude would necessarily result in a significant reduction in existing programs offered by First Parish. And late pledges will negatively impact the budgeting process for next year, as the Executive Team (**Gary Smith**, **Jenny Rankin** and **Melissa Gallo**) needs to plan the church's expenditures based on committed pledges at the time that they develop the budget, which is well in advance of the July 1 start of the next fiscal year.

So while we acknowledge that all of us are facing difficult times ahead, we ask that those members of First Parish who have not yet pledged to reflect on what they value about First Parish, and to make a commitment to pledge this week. If there is significant economic uncertainty in your future, then pledge an amount with which you feel comfortable. You can always choose to increase your pledge later if there is an improvement in your personal situation. If you can't find your pledge form, call First Parish and leave a message with the amount that you will be pledging. (We're flexible.) But please pledge something, as it demonstrates your commitment to a community of caring friends and staff who are there, and will continue to be there, when you need them.

Give to Your Values — *Community, Generosity, Hope.* The theme of our 2009 Annual Appeal sums up what being a part of First Parish represents to us. MUSings

"Could a Mass celebrate the whole earth as a sacred place?"

This question was the creative genesis of the Missa Gaia, or Earth Mass. In 1980, while serving with the Paul Winter Consort as artists in residence at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City, jazz saxophonist Paul Winter was challenged by the dean of the cathedral to "create twentieth century music for the Mass."



Unfamiliar with the Mass liturgy and ritual, Winter set about learning the history of the Mass. He discovered that the Mass has been the cradle of

western art music for most of a millennium. He also learned that the themes of many Masses from the Middle Ages and Renaissance were drawn from folk and popular tunes.

What if the themes for an Earth Mass could come from the songs of nature? What if the Kyrie — a prayer for mercy was based on the ethereal howl of the tundra wolf, an animal traditionally feared and reviled by humans?

What if the mysterious and joyous song of the humpback whale, "a symbol of the Great Mother," provided the melody of the Sanctus? "Holy is the Lord God of Hosts. Heaven and Earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest!"

What if the Agnus Dei, the "lamb of God," was a harp seal pup, whose plaintive voice would mingle with that of human beings in an ancient prayer for reconciliation and peace?

Winter decided to dedicate this Earth Mass to St. Francis, the patron saint of animals and the environment; and he composed, with Jim Scott, the wonderful Canticle of Brother Sun, based on the saint's famous prayer to begin and end the Mass.

The title Missa Gaia combines the Latin name for the Mass (missa) and the Greek goddess of the earth, Gaia. Mixing the sacred and the scientific, it evokes the "Gaia Hypothesis: that the entire range of living matter on earth ... could be regarded as constituting a single living entity ... endowed with faculties and power far beyond its constituent parts."

The Missa Gaia is an extraordinary liturgical and musical creation combining animal and human voices, Gregorian chant, ancient prayers, Latin rhythms and the ethereal song of the soprano saxophone in a synergistic worship experience. The First Parish Choir and Children's Choirs, along with guests musicians — including the wolf, the whale and the seal — look forward to sharing it with you on Sunday morning, May 3, at both services. Come prepared to join in "grateful hymns of praise."

In place of my monthly column I would like to present a report from our SAC cochair Claudia Nimar, on the work of a new SAC Grant recipient. Some of you may remember that

visit with our youth group made an incredible impression, showing them what a young First Parishioner can do to change the world.

The SAC Grants committee selected Camino Verde's Basic Agroforestry: Baltimori Project/Peru as a 2009 grant recipient. The project's focus is the installation of agroforestry systems (sustainable, tree-based agricultural plots) on the farmlands of all willing participants within the rural community of Baltimori, in the buffer zone of the Tambopata National Reserve. Our SAC Grant funded the purchase and delivery of 700 tree saplings, benefiting 10 farmers in the first round of planting, completed in early February. The project's aims include a second year of expansion, in which each farmer, having received 70 trees each in the first year, will be offered the opportunity to reforest further territory. UUSC CONTINUES WORK IN SUDAN

The UUSC humanitarian efforts in Sudan continue despite recent setbacks. In a major victory for antigenocide activists, TIAA-CREF announced it will pressure portfolio companies to help end the genocide in the Darfur region, and it will divest from companies

that fail to take meaningful steps. UUSC's Drumbeat for Darfur was an early major participant in the Sudan divestment movement, and TIAA-CREF is UUSC's pension-fund provider. Member contributions make up about 60 percent of UUSC's annual budget. Join today at uusc.org.

Going Deeper Spiritually

Monthly Thematic and Theological Queries for the People of First Parish in Concord

SERIES IX, 2008-2009

Note: Following the lead of All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Unity Church in St. Paul, and the First Parish in Weston, we continue a series of reflections, each focusing on a particular theological concept. Worship during the month will include at least one Sunday where this concept is explored. We hope the suggested topic for the month will find its way into our small group gatherings and into our conversations, even at home.

May 2009: **VISION** — There are times in our lives when we pick up our heads, look far out into the future, and have a vision of who we want to become, where we want to head.

There are other times when we go day to day, our eyes focused on the ground, on the road in front of us. We attend to the day-to-day, taking care of children, parents, work, bills, whatever needs our attention.

We chose "vision" as our theme this month to encourage us all to pick our eyes up from the day-to-day, the immediate, the urgent — and gaze, if only for a moment, toward the far horizon. It is easy to get focused on the short term and lose sight of the long view.

So what are some "vision questions" we might ask? I think of questions Gary raised in his Easter sermon. What matters most in your life? Who do you want to become? As Margaret Fuller put it long ago: "What were we born to do? How are we going to do it?" These are vision questions. These are questions that take us away from the details and lift us up to the larger horizon.

The following words by Dana McLean Greeley seem right on point when it comes to vision.

"We need vision and courage and faith in the future," Dana wrote. "Even if our charts are wrong, at times we have to trust them, and not stay at home in the old world. The new world waits to be discovered and to be realized by us. Impatience and even radicalism fare better than complacency and indifference, and bravery are better than fear. ...I would like to have us train our children to climb mountains and to sail the open seas, but likewise to take risks for democracy and for brotherhood and for peace. And if we would train them, we must be examples ourselves. Something of the spirit that was in Columbus should be in us. We need new ideas and bold action in science and in social ethics and in the church and in life."

Tracing the Transcendentalists in Italy

Living in Concord and worshiping at First Parish means that we are surrounded continually by a remarkable history of truly American philosophers and writers. They are part of the fabric of Unitarian Universalism. Emerson, Thoreau, Fuller, Hawthorne and Alcott, as well as many others in the mid=nineteenth century, struggled to create a uniquely American philosophy. They traveled abroad, saw many amazing cultural icons, and used their travel experience to more fully understand their own culture.

Jenny Rankin inspired us to follow their footsteps, see what they saw, and try to conceive of their lives as they thought, wrote, communicated and returned home. What an amazingly rich experience it was for all of us to be together and participate in this trip - Lillian Anderson, Sara Ballard, Laura and Mel Bernstein, Lillian Braden, Steph Chiha, Doris Goldthwaite, Bob Harper, Kate and Kel Keleher, Rhoda Miller, Mary Morgan, Claudia Nimar, Maura Perkins, Donna Peterson, Kitsy and Terry Rothermel, Dorothy Schecter, Bozena Smith and Darien Smith. We visited Rome and the antiquities, Florence and the Renaissance, and the Tuscan countryside in between, just as the transcendentalists did. Emerson arrived broken in spirit from the death of his first wife, Ellen; Margaret Fuller created a new life for herself, marrying and giving birth to a son while helping to fight for the Italian revolution. They were changed by their experience.

Together we walked, learned, ate, walked, shared, read, talked, walked, drank, heard, saw — and finally understood why we went. Traveling as a First Parish group, whether it is to Transylvania or Italy, in search of a connection to our partner church village or to our heritage as transcendentalists, means that we return transformed because we have done this together as a faith community.

This group of First Parish Transcendentalists have stories to share and some additional work to do to bring the spirit of Emerson, Fuller and their friends back to First Parish. We are in the process of forming an ongoing committee that will serve as a coordinating body for all of the interesting events in the next several years — e.g., the Emerson Forum, Margaret Fuller's Bicentennial, etc. Our first meeting will be on Tuesday, May 19, at 7:30 p.m., and anyone interested in participating should plan to attend. —**Lillian Anderson**, **Steph Chiha, Kate Keleher**, Planning Committee
