"Yes, we can!" is our slogan here in these weeks as we try to pull together as a community and come through as strong and intact as we can be.

Thank you for your presence here and for all you are and do to make this spiritual community so vibrant.

From the Intern Minister

Dear Friends,

This is my last newsletter as your student intern minister. On Sunday, June 14, I will say good-bye. Last month I shared that this fall I'll be returning to school for my last few classes, seeing the Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC), and "going into search" (for work as a minister). Now I have something exciting to add — Recently the First Parish Standing Committee voted unanimously for the congregation of First Parish to ordain me toward the end of this year (provided I pass my interview with the MFC, of course). I am deeply honored.

There is much to be grateful for as my internship comes to a close. It seems impossible to list all the learning and examples of First Parish members' wisdom, generosity and hospitality this year. So I'll leave you with some stand-out snapshots. These are just a few of the moments I'll carry forward as sources of continuing inspiration and gratitude.

It's my first time leading worship during the regular church year. **Gary Smith**, **Jenny Rankin** and **Margie King Saphier** are away, and have entrusted both services to me — a sure sign of their confidence, but I'm unbelievably nervous! A cool fall day, and **Margie King Saphier** and I are on a pastoral visit together. We sit by the side of a dear old parishioner in his last hours. We sing off-key but heartfelt renditions of *Spirit of Life* and *Find a Stillness*, a capella. He squeezes my hand.

Christmas Eve. Planning has been somber, as we realize construction delays will keep us from using our beautiful Sanctuary. To make matters worse, it has been raining on top of a foot of snow. But here we are, gathered around the front steps. Amazingly, the rain has stopped. Hot cocoa is served, and the candles are lit. Our voices rise up, up, up to the clock tower, where the brass is playing. I imagine the sound surrounding the church building. This year maybe we are sheltering it. In the shelter of each other. Rain begins again as I'm driving home.

Easter. As usual, **Jenny Rankin** leads the congregation in prayer, but this time she does something different. She invites you to speak the names you carry in your heart. Names pepper the Sanctuary in the front, back, sides, both balconies; an invisible congregation of loved ones we have brought in spirit. Truly we walk this journey together, with losses, worries, loves and celebrations. We are one.

And though we will part ways soon, the people of First Parish in Concord will always be present in my ministry, because you have helped make me into the minister I am. Thank you for a wonderful year.

Pastoral Care News

Did you know the average person experiences 100 fight/flight responses per day? The Pastoral Care Lay Ministers and Parish Visitors learned this during a presentation by **Pamela Katz Ressler**, a member of the Pastoral Care Council and founder of www.stressresources.com. One of Pam's recommendations for living in the "mess and mystery of life" is not to try to change the outcome of an event, but to work to change the way we experience it. One way to do this, she says, is to choose to S.T.O.P. (S – stop; T – take a breath; O – observe your mind and body; P – proceed with your day) for one to three minutes every hour of the workday. Become aware of your breathing, allow your mind to settle and regroup, thereby reducing or eliminating the anxiety that can be produced by the racing mind.

First Parish has been going through a lot of changes this year. Because change often pushes us out of our comfort zone, it can elicit the fight-or-flight response. In September, we will experience the benefits of the many changes of the past year — an elevator giving access to all levels; two handicap entrances, one at the Chapel and the other at the side entrance; and of course more space. The Parlor will have its furniture back and Sunday coffee hours can again spread out. In addition to the new RE classrooms, there also will be a new all-purpose room.

But change will continue. Because of the downturn in the economy, there are new changes First Parish is implementing to economize. By now most of you have read that starting next year the *Meeting House News* will be available to members on the website. This will result in savings, as well as being ecologically sound, since no paper is involved. But we want to make sure those of you who do not have access to a computer receive a paper copy. In early June, members will receive a letter advising them about this change and how to receive a paper subscription. If this is a financial hardship, please speak to **Gary Smith**, **Jenny Rankin** or me.

The Pastoral Care Council and the ministers want to hear from you — letting us know what is working and what is problematical — so we can be creative in problem solving. It is also important to remember that all change is an example of the Buddha's Law of Impermanence. So to reduce anxiety, remember to "S.T.O.P."

I will be taking short trips this summer but I am here most of the time, so please call if you have questions or concerns, or just want to talk.

Pipeworks

A NEW COLUMN TO KEEP YOU INFORMED ABOUT THE FIRST PARISH ORGAN PROJECT

Our organ renovation has begun! This winter and spring Steve Russell, our organ builder, has been working on the design and doing prep work in his shop in Vermont. During the month of May, pipes were removed from the Swell division (right side) of the organ. This was the first work on site here at First Parish. The pipes were lifted out individually, laid on trays and placed in the "pipemobile," Steve's van, to be taken to Vermont. About a third of the organ's pipes have now been removed. The rest will be taken to Vermont over the next few weeks. Once the pipes are removed, the rest of the organ will be dismantled and the organ chamber will be refinished. By late summer, installation of the rebuilt and reconfigured organ will have started, with pipes being added back in throughout the fall.

The organ is a cornerstone of our music program — accompanying congregational singing and all the different choirs and soloists, as well as performing as a solo instrument for preludes, offertories, postludes and special occasions. This project to rebuild and reconfigure our organ includes a significant amount of repair and replacement, as well as upgrading the instrument to create a more coherent, cohesive sound. We anticipate these changes with great excitement!

MUSings

"Was that really this year?" I say that a lot these days. It's almost overwhelming to list the many changes we have experienced at First Parish in the last twelve months of construction.

Our choirs and music leaders have been intrepid leaders during this tumultuous year, constantly and cheerfully adapting to new circumstances and venues. For me, the defining image from this past fall is that of our adult choir members with their

white shirts and blue stoles surrounding the congregation each Sunday as they sang. They became living walls for our nomadic congregation, helping us to create sacred space wherever we were. Through

every transition they maintained their sense of humor and their strong dedication to one another and to the music we create together.

Weekly rehearsals in a construction site offer unique challenges. Martha Goodman's First Parish ringers set up shop in our multi-use Parish Hall, surrounded by boxes and tools and accompanied the occasional hydraulic drill. They creatively adapted their configuration and their repertoire to the worship space at Kerem Shalom. I fondly remember the dramatic introit they offered one Sunday with bells positioned throughout the Kerem Shalom sanctuary.

Anderson Manuel and Rob Castillo guided the Gospel Choir through the multiple space transitions with grace and humor. Whether they were singing in a classroom at Kerem Shalom, the Icy Cave room of the Wright Tavern or leading worship, this choir of junior high and high school youth inspired us and lifted us up with their unique voice and perspective.

Our youngest singers in the children's choirs adjusted to construction and a new director! **Gail Carey** guided her choristers with patience, understanding and humor through the many transitions they faced this year. The group has at least doubled in size and they have moved us deeply with their singing. They have even recorded a CD! Watch for more information on how you can get a copy in the near future.

Eric Huenneke, our organist, continued to tie our worship services together with carefully chosen service music. He introduced us to some lovely new piano repertoire while we were at Kerem Shalom and prepared us well for the prospect of several months without the organ, now that the work on our new instrument has begun (see "Pipeworks").

Yes, it has been an extraordinary and challenging year; I am deeply grateful for the dedicated parishioners and staff who have so creatively sustained and invigorated the music ministry through it all.

During April vacation, 60 elementary school children descended on the First Church in Roxbury to participate in the UU Urban Ministry's second annual April Vacation Camp. The camp was planned and conducted by 30 youth from the UUUM's Roxbury Youth Program and the Youth Group of the Winchester Unitarian Society. With several adults in attendance, the total number of people was right at 100. Through the generosity of your donations, First Parish in Concord provided 1,000 bottles of water and more than 300 individual and bulk-packaged snacks. The peace of mind offered to those childrens' parents was priceless.

THE ADVOCACY NETWORK TO END FAMILY HOMELESSNESS

The Advocacy Network to End Family Homelessness (SAC grant recipient) is excited about two legislative victories. First, the Mass. Rental Voucher Program, which benefits 5,100 families, has been level-funded for next year, after being threatened with a 45 percent cut for FY2010. Second, basic shelter eligibility protections have been included in the House budget. The Senate budget process will be more challenging. The Advocacy Network, which started five years ago, now has 120 people who will make calls and write letters on behalf of the state's poorest families. We need your voice! SOCIAL ACTION GRANTS

The Social Action Grants committee reviewed 12 grant proposals sponsored by pledging First Parish members to support a variety of local, regional and international social justice projects. A total of \$34,500 was awarded to 10 proposals, and grant funds continue to support the position of First Parish's Social Action Program Director on a transitional basis. Grantees in the Concord area include: Communities for Restorative Justice: the Concord Area Pre-School Association; Concord Carlisle High School's Be the Change program; Concord Climate Action; Household Goods Recycling of Massachusetts; and the Restoration Project. Grantees serving the broader region include the UU Mass Action Network and the programs of the UU Urban Ministries program. In addition, support was awarded for the community house of First Parish's partner church in Székelykeresztúr, and an education program, Head to Head, Inc., in Haiti.

NEW SOCIAL ACTION GRANTS PROCEDURES

The Social Action Grants Committee, working with Faith Bade, recently revised grant submission guidelines to ensure clarity for applicants and fairness in grant making. The guidelines specifically prohibit committee members from sponsoring grant applications and continue the policy that committee members recuse themselves from discussion and voting on grants to organizations with which they are directly involved. The next grant application deadline is October 15.

INGREDIENTS FOR A SUNDAY SCHOOL WHERE CHILDREN WANT TO GO:

1 RE Administrator: **Jane Barnes** is the organizational wizard behind all of the RE programs. Jane juggles space needs, curriculum, volunteers, registration, our Story Play curriculum, meetings, our moves during the transition and much more

1 Youth Director: **Mary-Wren vanderWilden** works passionately with our teens to create a supportive, vibrant youth community at First Parish.

1 Workshop Rotation Coordinator: **Liz Davis- Chaffin** breathes life into our 2nd-6th grade program. Liz coordinates with our parent community to bring the unique resources our parish members have to offer our children.

1 Young Children's Coordinator: **Carol Duane** ensures that our young children and new parents transition easily into our First Parish community. Carol also coordinates our Teen Assistant program, a program that is just one more way our teens can stay connected to First Parish.

1 RE Council Chair: **Gretchen Nelson** has calmly and enthusiastically led our RE community through several transitions over this last year. As chair, she and the council explored many possible iterations of what RE could look like this year, and I think we have all benefited from a relatively seamless year despite having to create a new program in two new spaces, Kerem Shalom and the Parish Hall.


