PASTORAL CARE NEWS

During this time of transition, the pastoral care office has also seen changes as far as its location is concerned. I have left my office in "the quad" and I'm now in Jenny Rankin's office until May 1, when I make my final move to Gary Smith's former office in the Wright Tavern. I am looking forward to settling into my own office space, and do feel free to drop by in May. Until then, you will find me in the ministers' suite.

Pastoral Care is beginning a new tradition during coffee hour, providing parishioners the opportunity to write notes to the individuals who are on the pastoral list. With the help of Kate Keleher, Thinking of You cards have been made, using the drawing of First Parish by "Nina and Kate" that is framed and hangs on the wall to the left of the Parish Hall entrance. There will be a pastoral care table and chairs in the Parlor, with note cards available so you can seize the moment. It is so easy to intend to write a note, but when we get home the busyness of the day can thwart our best intentions. Now you will be able to write a note, put it in an envelope, seal and address it. Welcoming new babies: In addition to bringing a Caring Connection meal delivered in a bag made by the children in RE and a baby blanket made by Kitsy Rothermel, our new baby welcomers, Bridget Neale Paris and Louisa Paushter, will also offer the choice of one of two books: The Gift of Faith: Tending to the Spiritual Lives of Children, by Jeanne Harrison Nieuwejaar; and Nurturing Children and Youth: A Developmental Guidebook, by Tracey L. Hurd (First Parish member), which includes spiritual development.

Pastoral Care programs: In February, I offered the program The Rest of Your Life and Beyond, a foursession program preparing for the end of life. The program was cancelled due to lack of interest. in activities and committees. The budget is crafted to realisti-

· cally reflect as best as possible our aspirations for fulfilling our

• collective vision. As we learned painfully last year, this is not

always an easy task.

Talking about Slavery in Concord

When the Reverend William Emerson departed Concord in 1776 to serve as chaplain to the Continental Army, he left the Manse in the hands of his slave man Frank. What was life like for slaves at the Manse? Join us on Saturday, March 20, at 7 p.m. in the Parish Hall, to hear author Elise Lemire draw on William's diary and letters, recreating the lives of the Manse's free and enslaved occupants. She recounts from the time the Emersons first moved in until their slaves and their descendents, enacting their own revolution, claimed the right to live as free men and women in Concord. A reception follows, where Ms. Lemire will sign copies of her book *Black Walden: Slavery and Its Aftermath in Concord, Massachusetts.* Cosponsored by the First Parish Transcendentalism Council and the Old Manse.

MUSINGS AND MUSIC NOTES

"From this house to the world we will go hand in hand."

"Building bridges between our divisions; I reach out to you. Will you reach out to me? With all of our voices and all of our visions, Friends, we can make such sweet harmony."

These songs will be featured in our worship services in March. *From this House*, a powerful anthem in South African style, by Ben Allaway, gives musical voice to the theme of our Annual Campaign — "Our community: At home — in the world — at home in the world." It is a dynamic expression of who we are as a

congregation.

Rev. Bill Sinkford and Rev. Susan Chorley from the UU Urban Ministry will be our guest preachers on March 14. They have requested that we sing *Building Bridges* at that service. By coming to Concord, they hope to build bridges between Roxbury and Concord, between volunteers and opportunities to serve — bridges that join us to other UU congregations.

This year **Gail Carey**, our Children's Choir director, laid the foundations for a new musical bridge to the UU Urban Ministry in Roxbury. In December, Gail led a music workshop for children who attend the Saturday "Explorers' Club" of the UUUM. She has since returned to make more music with the children; and on March 14, children and adults from First Parish choirs will travel that bridge to Roxbury to sing at the installation of Rev. Catherine Senghas as Minister and Executive Director of the UUUM.

Bridge building is central to the First Parish music ministry. Through our musical pilgrimages we have built strong connections to our partner congregation in Transylvania. We'll return to Székelykeresztúr in October for a music and culture pilgrimage to reinforce that bridge, which has been well-travelled through our youth service projects and other visits (see story on page 7).

Our musical bridges take us places as far away as Romania and as close as our own hearts. As we sing together in worship, we connect with one another and with the greater Love that holds us all; with our history and the sources of our living tradition; with our faith and our yearning to express it in the wider community.

PIPEWORK

- Final designs for retrofitting the balcony organ
 - console have been completed in the Russell shop
- in Vermont and the remaining parts ordered. The refurbished and enhanced console should now
- · closely resemble the new console, which will be
- closely resemble the new console, which will
- installed in the front of the Sanctuary. The
- rebuilding and retrofitting should be completed
- by the end of March, and the balcony console on its way back to First Parish.
- About two ranks of pipes (Diapasons, which form
- the core warm sounds of the main organ) have
 - now been rebuilt. This is meticulous work. For some ranks of pipes, the organ builder has to cre-
- ate and install new metal languids inside the
- mouth of each flue pipe. A languid is like a tongue
- in relation to pipe speech and is formed by a piece
- of metal soldered inside the mouth of each pipe.
- . The condition and angle of the languid is very
- important in tonal voicing of each flue pipe to
- create a pleasing and natural tone. The old lan-
- guids in many of our pipes suffered from lead
- fatigue and would no longer permit the kind of
- tonal adjustments necessary for a beautiful sound.
- This painstaking work on the original organ pipes
- that will be included in the new installation will
- continue for many months. Once this restoration
- . work is complete, each pipe will be put on a spe-
- cial voicing machine that allows its tone and
- speech to be adjusted in relation to the pipe before
- it. When the pipes are on their wind chest within
- the organ, final refinements and voicing will be
- repeated within our Sanctuary space.
- Having overseen the restoration of three antique
 - houses, I could identify with Steve Russell when
- he described how much he enjoyed restoring good
- quality old pipework the results are rewarding,
- and with the fluctuating cost of alloys, the cost
- savings are notable. The work is labor intensive
- and usually takes longer than manufacturing
 - brand new pipes. But it will be worth the wait.

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REFLECTION AND RE NEWS

Reflection from a 7th Grade Neighboring Faiths Leader

Forty years ago I was a seventh grader at the Unitarian Church West in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, participating in the Neighboring Faiths Program. Uncertain as to the nature of Unitarianism, I was unsure how studying other faiths would help me figure out what a Unitarian was.

However, now I know that Neighboring Faiths is not just learning about other faiths; it is the very act of being a Unitarian as embodied in our fourth principle: a free and responsible search for truth and meaning. Starting in February, **Del Friedman**, **Melita Teichart**, **Dan Trinkle**, **Deb Kupka** and I have had the pleasure and responsibility of accompanying our seventh graders on this same journey.

While religion is often shrouded with mystery, the practice of religion is very much a human concern. In our visits to Holy Family Parish and Temple Beth El, questions asked already include: "Who would run the church if the Pope is ill?" "Can a priest get married?" "If the Sabbath begins at sundown, do you meet at a different time every week?" "Do all synagogues allow women to be rabbis?" "How do your children get a religious education?"

At First Parish, Neighboring Faiths is also a step along the path to the expression of a personal credo, the culmination of our ninth grade Coming of Age program. **Gary Smith** has pointed out that we are a covenantal, not a creedal, faith. Yet each of us must have a personal system of belief to guide our lives and our actions. Fortunately, we and our children may draw on all of human experience as we develop and refine our personal beliefs.

Music & Arts Pilgrimage to Székelykeresztúr October 24 – November 3, 2010

The First Parish Choir and the Partner Church Committee are planning a return visit to our partner church next fall! The purpose of this pilgrimage is to deepen our understanding of one another's culture and faith through the sharing of music, art, crafts and dance.

Due to limitations on accommodations and the longer stay with our friends in Székelykeresztúr, we are planning for this group to be smaller than past musical pilgrimages — probably no more than 25 in all. **Gary** and **Eliz Smith** will be joining us in Keresztúr for part of our time there.

The core of the pilgrimage group will be a choir of singers who will have an exchange with the Keresztúr choir. There will also be opportunities for nonsinging pilgrims to learn Szekély crafts and experience life in the village. The entire group will take day trips to visit significant Unitarian sites, led by **Rodger Mattlage**.

We will be based in Székelykeresztúr for the entire visit. Our main accommodations will be in the new Community House dormitories. Each room has between two and four single beds and a three-quarter bath (sink, commode, shower). There will also be home stays and home visits with our friends in Székelykeresztúr. We are planning to fly into Kolosvar (Cluj Napoca), and will spend one night in a hotel and do some sightseeing.

Cost estimate: \$1500–\$1700 will include airfare, medical insurance, ground transportation, accommodations and meals, plus a fee to offset the costs incurred by our hosts while we are visiting. Pilgrims should be aware that these trips usually require a fair amount of walking, and there are no provisions for physical accessibility in Romania.

If you have never been to visit our partner church in Transylvania, we encourage you to let us know of your interest in traveling with us. "The Five Wishes"

Fives Wishes is a document that walks us through the decisions we need to make *now* so in the event we are not able to articulate our wishes at end of life, our designated person (Power of Attorney) who can do so and honor our wishes.
