Good Wishes From the Jericho Road Project

The Jericho Road Project wishes Jodi DeLibertis, Lowell Program Director, the best as she transitions to a new position at Simmons College as Director of Clinical Coordination for the rapidly growing Nursing Program, and advances her education by pursuing a graduate degree.

It's May 25, and the staff members deeply involved in fundraising are working to reach out to those who have yet to pledge for next year (**Pamela Hathaway**), analyzing the data (**Jane Barnes**), and creating budget scenarios to match our projected income (me). We are far from our goal. The Executive Team has agreed with the Standing Committee that we will have a balanced budget next year. We are prepared to make any necessary reductions. The gap between our pledge goal — \$875,000, which is what we raised last year — and what we ultimately attain in pledges will determine the extent of the reductions. If I had to present the budget today, the reductions would be severe. I am maintaining my faith that this community can at least meet the challenge to provide us with the same level of funding that we received last year.

Many of you stretched to give us thoughtful pledges this year, and we are grateful for your generosity. Many of you told us why you were not able to pledge at a level you wished you could, and we are grateful to know that too, because it allows us to have a fuller picture of what is going on in the community as well as to provide support to you. And many of you will receive a letter next week asking if you would reconsider your pledge and increase it to help us reach our goal.

The Executive Team is committed to having First Parish on a solid financial foundation as we enter a period of ministerial transition. Our expenses for next year (if we achieve \$875,000 in pledges) are only 1 percent higher than last year, despite increases in the cost of simply running the facility. We are committed to being wise stewards of your pledge dollars. If we are able to raise an additional \$70,000 in this last phase of the appeal, we will be able to maintain programming at its current level. Please help us by increasing your pledge as you are able. •

June is the first month of summer abundance as we begin to enjoy locally grown fruits and vegetables. On June 11, 2010, I will be quietly but joyfully celebrating the tenth anniversary of my ordination to ministry. These have been an abundantly rich 10 years. Also, the spirit of abundance

is evident in the number of pastoral care

"thinking of you" cards sent to parishioners who are grieving or recovering from a hospitalization. Al Armenti asked that I thank all those who sent him notes, especially "Violet," who did not sign her last name and is probably in elementary school.

In celebrating the abundance of life, it may seem odd that the rest of pastoral news

will be about abuse, but life and ministry are abundant in "the mess and the mystery." At the end of April and in early May I attended two symposiums about abuse: elder abuse and abuse in teen relationships.

Not all elder abuse occurs through physical/sexual/emotional violence or financial exploitation. There is also "neglect," which may be unintentional but can lead to unsafe conditions, i.e. — when the caregiver is no longer able to physically care for his or her loved one. The Protective Services Department at Minuteman Senior Services has been designated by the Executive Office of Elder Affairs to investigate all reports of elder abuse within 24 hours in its 16 service-area towns. At her presentation at First Parish on April 29, Tobe Conway stressed how caring and sensitive the staff of Protective Services is to the needs of elders, and how they work to balance the mandate to protect elders with an elder's right to self-determination. What impressed me most was the wisdom and compassion expressed in the delivery of their services. If you are concerned about an elder at risk, call 1-800-922-2275.

On May 5, the Domestic Violence Services Network (DVSN) sponsored a symposium for clergy and youth directors about Engaging Youth and Building Healthy Relationships. The youth of today (ages 12 to 24) face challenges caused by an over-sexualized society that also glorifies violence in advertisements, movies, TV shows and video games, but does not give young people the tools to discern what healthy, respectful relationships entail.

The joint UCC-UUA curriculum "Our Whole Lives (OWL)" was presented by the DRE of First Parish of Bedford. She stressed that OWL provides young people a safe forum to learn and explore mutuality, equality, respect, trust and love, and how that looks in terms of boundaries. Although I was proud that First Parish annually offers OWL to our eighth graders, I did not feel comfortable resting on our laurels. In a survey conducted by the National Teen Dating Violence Prevention Initiative in 2006, one in five female

- high school students reported being physically or sexually
- · abused by a dating partner; in a study of gay, lesbian and
- . bisexual adolescents involved in same-sex dating, they are
- just as likely to experience dating violence as youths
- involved in opposite-sex dating. It was very troubling to learn that 81 percent of parents surveyed believe either teen
- · dating violence is not an issue or admit they don't know if
- it is an issue, and 54 percent of parents admit they have not
- spoken to their child about dating violence. The DVSN
- helpline is 888-399-6111.
- **Doug Hardy** extends an invitation to First Parish members and friends to spread the word about a new web commu-
- nity focused on post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and
- other effects of trauma at http://traumanation.com. As many of you know, **Doug** and his wife **Roselyn** adopted
- three severely traumatized children from Russia in 1998.

MUSINGS AND MUSIC NOTES

Before we slip into summer mode, I would like to sing the praises of the leaders in our music ministry, and to express

> my own deep gratitude for their work with this parish.

Eric Huenneke, our organist, has provided patient and steady leadership of our organ project, monitoring its deliberate progress and making regular reports to our leadership and membership. He has also continued to provide fine service music on our Steinway baby grand, exploring new sources of piano music and adapting some

organ music for use in the services.

Gail Carey's nurturing leadership of our Children's Choirs encourages our youngest singers to grow musically and to live our Benediction. Gail built a musical bridge to the UU Urban ministry this year with her workshops in the Saturday Explorers Program, and successfully combined the children's choirs of Concord with her singers from Roxbury to sing at Rev. Catherine Senghas' installation service at First Church in Roxbury.

Our Gospel Choir continued to deepen and enliven worship under Anderson Manuel's direction. The group made a study of the works of composer Jim Papoulis this year and provided moving presentations of many of his songs during our worship services. Anderson was ably assisted by Rob Castillo at keyboard and Mark Weltner on guitar. Special thanks to Stephanie Chiha, the "Gospel Choir Mama" for the past four years, for her essential assistance.

Our new Threshold Choir was established this year with the initiative and vision of my coleader Laurie Corelle. Partnering with our pastoral care ministry, this group offered comfort and healing support through singing to one another and to parishioners in homes, hospice beds and beyond.

The Transylvania Troubadours, anchored by parishioners Bob Goodearl, Rick Moore and Rex Morrill, have brought their smooth close harmonies to our worship on two Sundays this year and to the wider community through services at area congregations and performance at the Mass Bay Choir festival.

And there's Rise Up Singing, our monthly folk singing group, which just seems to grow in vitality and harmony, drawing more singers from the congregation and the wider community. Their fourth-Friday meetings provide a musical exclamation point at the end of every month.

I am deeply grateful for our dedicated and intrepid First Parish Choir. Our Wednesday night accompanist, Grace Choi, provides invaluable support as we rehearse our varied and abundant repertoire. Through the miraculous alchemy of "choiring," this collection of more than 50 individuals

comes together each week to do what none of us could do on our own.

The organ console wiring has been completed and tested, and we should see the newly updated and rebuilt console back in the balcony very soon. The leathering of all the various wind reservoirs for the new instrument are being completed in the Russell shop, and the builders will soon be turning themselves to the task of constructing the organ from the bottom up. This work will start in the basement of the church with a new static wind reservoir being built above the blower motor. This will create a buffering to the wind rush up the main trunk and ensure a near silent operation of the winding system in the church. After that, they will begin constructing and assembling the wind system in the organ loft with all its trunks, which will go to each area and division of the instrument. The wind reservoirs/bellows, most of which are coming along nicely now, will go above the wind lines, which will run along the loft floor, and sit just below those pipe chests still waiting patiently on their sides in the loft.

Significant progress will be made during the summer months, with the expectation of being able to play some organ music for opening Sunday in September. •

Let your child take her own solo sojourns and find the voice of her unique inner spirit. When we are open to our selves, when we know our inner landscape, wonder will be everywhere for us to enjoy.

Service trips are a critical component of the First Parish Social Action experience. We continue to build these transformative experiences into the tradition of social action for our children and youth. Plus chaperones always describe how they receive so much more from these trips than what they give. These trips are a win for everyone!

Since joining the staff at First Parish I have had the pleasure of partnering with **Mary-Wren vanderWilden** on a number of service trips — to

International in western Massachusetts. Mary-Wren has also worked with youth and adults on service trips to Transylvania with our Partner Church and our Coming of Age youth recently participated in City Reach, another Ecclesia Ministries program for the unhoused in Boston like Common Cathedral. (If you were able to worship with the Coming of Age youth in May, you will know how profoundly impacted they were by this "mini service trip".)



From the Development Director

Four months have passed since I started my job as Development Director. The Annual Appeal, which has been my focus during this period, provided a great opportunity to work with many of you, and to take part in many inspiring conversations about hopes and plans, community and generosity. Your statements about what you value about First Parish, some of which I shared in my last *Meeting House News* column, helped orient me and teach me about this amazing congregation. Moving General Assembly 2012 Out of Phoenix?

With the passage in Arizona of anti-immigrant legislation that challenges our UU principles, the UUA Board of Directors has asked General Assembly 2010 to consider removing General Assembly 2012 from its scheduled venue in

Phoenix. The board resolution reads, in part: Whereas the state of Arizona has recently enacted a law — SB 1070 — that runs counter to our first principle, affirming the worth and dignity of every person, Whereas the Association stands in solidarity with allies using a widespread economic boycott of Arizona as leverage for Love against this hateful legislation; Be it resolved: we will not meet in a state of fear.

The costs of moving GA at such short notice must be born by the member congregations so that UUA programming is not impacted. This issue will come up for a vote at this year's General Assembly. Deductive Reasoning

The study team is in the midst of coding, summarizing and sorting the *Listening Session* and *Survey* data under the extensive guidance of Susan Beaumont of the Alban Institute. While the confidential *Listening Sessions* have provided us with qualitative information (offering an understanding of the passions and emotions that underlie the "why" of our congregation's attitudes and behaviors), the *Survey* information has provided us with solid, quantitative data.

For example, it may come as no surprise that nearly 97 percent of respondents viewed social action as somewhat, very or extremely important, while over half have children in RE, and 78 percent are married. With apologies to Edna St. Vincent Millay, "we are very tired, we are very married." All of this data, along with a census-based Ministry Profile of the community that First Parish serves, is helping us to gain a full picture of who we are as a congregation and allowing us to create the most accurate ministerial profile possible.

Here's what will happen next:

11, 12 June There will be a meeting of the study team, the standing committee and key First Parish staff members to discuss these findings and how they relate to the next chapter of our ministerial leadership and to chart out what needs to be done for our congregation to move forward.

13 June The Transitional Study Team will make a presentation at the Annual Meeting and will release the survey and census data to our congregation.

Mid-June Using this information an initial conversation will be held between the study team and Jenny Rankin to discuss her potential interest in the senior minister's position.

July/August A First Parish profile will be prepared in the event that we need to begin a search process.

Mid-August Jenny will communicate her interest in the senior minister's position to the standing committee.

Formed to begin the process of determining our ministerial leadership, once Senior Minister Gary Smith retires, it is our mandate to keep everyone informed throughout the process and we invite you to watch for updates in *The Meetinghouse News, The Sunday News, FP Announce* and at our table during coffee hours.
