

REVERIES

In the Middle

As an interim minister I accompany congregations through their middles. These are the times between ministries, between sizes, between buildings or identities. Middles are marked by change, an alteration, a variation, or modification that leaves something or someone different. Middles are usually not the most comfortable places to be whether we are there by choice or by chance. Human beings enjoy pre-

dictability, competence, clarity and closure, all of which are distinctly absent in most middles. This is what can make a middle feel bad. Being in a place that feels bad does not mean anyone did anything wrong. It does not mean we are incompetent. Middles are unpredictable and create a distinct lack of clarity — not exactly a feel-good kind of place.

Being in any middle requires patience, awareness and appreciation for not knowing. This is where I come in. I am here to walk with you, be your witness, your confidant, your cheerleader, and your advocate. I will not tell First Parish what to do. I will listen. I will offer feedback when asked. I will be a resource and a comfort. I will probably tell you things you

do not really want to hear. When I do you can trust that I have no agenda other than your success and well-being. Anything that I tell you is public information, while anything you tell me will be held in confidence unless you instruct me otherwise. The most important things to remember about our interim middle are:

- It absolutely feels like it will be like this forever.
- It absolutely will not.
- We have to be in the middle until we are not.

So, we begin. Like the cream in the Oreo, this is a very rich time. Sandwiched between a beginning and an ending, it comes, like most middles, with a wide range of individual and communal reactions. Together we will stay in the excitement, the disappointment, the anger, the confusion, the hurt and the hope, right smack in the middle, until you are not.

October Marks 375th Anniversary of First Parish A Community-Wide Celebration in Concord

October approaches and our grand celebration for First Parish's 375th Anniversary is quickly coming into view. A series of wonderful events is planned October 14-23, and we invite you all to attend! We hope the congregation comes out in full to honor the unique place that First Parish holds in American history.

All events are open to the public with the exception of Saturday evening, October 22,

when the Grand Dinner for the First Parish community will take place, along with a wonderful retrospective of congregational stories that span the years 1940 to 1990. Get your tickets early! (**Attention!** If you are a member from these years, please read the 375th Memory insert in this newsletter with details about coming to church on September 23 to share your First Parish stories!)

We have a special website, <u>www.fp375.firstparish.org</u>, where you will find detailed information on events, speakers, tours, reservations and ticket information. Tickets will go on sale at coffee hour on Opening Sunday, September 11.

Also, please see the 375th program schedule in the insert at the end of this edition of *Meeting House News*.

We say thank-you in advance to the Concord organizations that are sponsoring 375th events with First Parish: Concord Free Public Library, Concord Museum, Emerson House, the Old Manse and the Thoreau Society. Special thanks also to First Parish sponsors, the Transcendentalism Council and the Women's Parish Association.

375th Program Highlights

October 1-23, Concord Free Public Library will host a display of First Parish historic documents and artifacts. October 14-23, Concord Museum is featuring an exhibit of rarely seen First Parish artifacts from the museum collection.

Events begin Friday evening, October 14, at the Concord Library with a keynote address from Concord resident and distinguished professor Ronald Bosco from SUNY Albany, N.Y., on the Puritan influence in the 1600's, when Concord and First Parish were founded.

Saturday, October 15, there are special guided tours of the Old Manse, Emerson House and Concord Museum. Saturday evening, Henry David Thoreau visits First Parish to deliver excerpts from three of his major anti-slavery speeches. Reenactor Professor Kevin Radaker, from Anderson University, presents Thoreau in dramatic monologue.

Thursday evening, October 20, there are two candlelight tours of the Old Manse, with special focus on Ezra Ripley's 63-year ministry at First Parish. A social hour follows at the Colonial Inn with Professor Robert Gross, from the University of Connecticut, speaking on when Concord and First Parish were one in 1825, and the emerging new era of religious diversity and forthcoming schism.

Friday evening, October 21, at First Parish, the

pace revs up with a delightful fashion tableaux, "No One Wore Prada: An Evening of Living History and Fashion." The event features a cavalcade of historical figures from First Parish's rich cultural past such as John Hancock, Sam Adams, Merry Merrick Brooks and Cynthia Thoreau to name just a few.

Saturday, October 22, begins with a morning panel presentation led by **Rev. Jenny Rankin** of First Parish;

- Rev. Mark Harris of First Parish in Watertown, MA;
- and Prof. Ronald Bosco of SUNY, Albany, NY, fol-
- lowed by short sessions on our church's impact on
- American history, led by Tom Potter, President of the
- Thoreau Society, and other historians.

Saturday evening, October 22, is the Grand Dinner for First Parish members, families and children and a special program, "The Way We Were"— a 1940-1990 First Parish retrospective.

October 23, Sunday morning services at First Parish mark the close of our anniversary celebration, led by

- Rev. Dr. Elaine Beth Peresluha and Rev. Jenny M.
- Rankin on the meaning of our 375 years of history as
- we move forward as a congregation. There will be special music and a special story/activity for children.

Anne Fortier and Bruce Blumberg are chairs of the 375th Anniversary Committee. ◆

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MONEY MATTERS

The summer months are the time when the Business Office closes out the fiscal year and begins anew. We tidy our files, work through the stack of noncritical items that built up during April, May and June, and generally prepare for the coming church year.

Thank you all for your pledges and gifts toward the annual appeal! We ended our pledge drive with \$823,779 in pledges and gifts, including the gap appeal. The budget presented at the Annual Meeting included a \$7800 planned deficit; we received enough pledges after the Annual Meeting to both erase that planned deficit and allow us to do two additional things — not tap the special funds for \$7,000, and allocate funds to hire an Assistant to the Ministers.

This summer we also published our new Building Use Policy. If you haven't read it yet, you can find it under "Church Life" on the website. This policy represents the work of a group of staff members to create a simple and consistent set of guidelines for using our space.

Cassy Bosworth moved to the front office as the new office manager, and she has spent the summer learning the ropes of her new job. She and I have been working with our new database company to complete our data conversion. We had hoped to be up and running before the church year began, but that hope proved to be overly optimistic. We will continue working with our team from the new company, and in the meantime we will continue using the old database.

Finally, this summer, with the help of **Lillian Anderson**, I formed an Operations Committee. This committee will provide parishioner input on topics and issues that fall into my areas of responsibility. The committee members are **Gary Clayton**, **Jane Fisher**, **Russ Herndon**, and **Alane Wallis**. I am very grateful that they all agreed to serve on this new committee!

Starting in Budapest, where we were met by a contingent from Keresztúr, including Réka Gagyi, Réka Balogh and Sipos Laszlo, we toured the city and languished at the Gellert Spa before taking the long bus ride across the Great Hungarian Plain to the Romanian frontier and up into Transylvania. After spending the night in the city of Kolozsvar, we had a delightful meeting with Rev. Ferenc Bálint Benczédi, Bishop of the Transylvanian Unitarian Church.

From there we were Keresztúr-bound and, in typical fashion, were met at the steps of the new Friendship Community House by Rev. József Szombatfalvi and the Keresztúr Youth Group, who serenaded us with song. The next 12 days whizzed by in a flash, with (much appreciated) service work accomplished in the forests and fields, with long hikes and a camping trip in the hills, with area tours, and especially with numerous opportunities to bond with our Keresztúri brothers and sisters.

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MUSINGS

This was an extraordinary summer. It was certainly not restful, but it was inspiring and energizing. I had the privilege of connecting with Unitarians and Unitarian Universalists from all over the world. I returned home with a fresh perspective on our faith and heritage.



Can it be only two months since General Assembly in Charlotte, North Carolina? This celebration of 50 years since the merger of the UUA and the AUA offered many opportunities for reflection on our history and future as a religious movement. It was delightful to share the experience with a number of Concord folks who had never attended GA. More of you should come! It was particularly moving to publicly honor Gary Smith on his retirement and to recognize Gail Carey as a Credentialed UU Music Leader.

Both Gail and I attended the July UU Musicians Network (UUMN) Conference in Arlington, Virginia — the annual infusion of inspiration and energy for UU musicians. I presented a workshop on Concord's musical pilgrimages to Transylvania. There was keen interest in our experience and I was proud to share the programs that our Partner Church Committee has designed and supported over the years. Gail served as a panelist for a workshop on Children's Choirs that was very well received.

During August I spent two wonderful weeks in Transylvania conducting the UU Partner Church Council Festival Choir — a totally new venture by the travel group of the UUPCC. It was a huge success. The choir was comprised of twenty-eight UU singers from all over the USA, plus six young basses from the choir of the Unitarian High School in Kolozsvar. Creating a choir and making music with this multigenerational and international group was deeply rewarding, as was experiencing Transylvania with a wide range of UU's. I spent one lovely day in Székelykeresztúr visiting with the Szombatfalvis, the Demeters and the Mikos. I held beautiful new babies. I heard stories of our Youth Pilgrimage. I deepened my own knowledge of our Unitarian history and my connection to these dear friends on the other side of the world.

I return to Concord this fall with a wider vision and deeper understanding of our faith. I look forward to this period of interim ministry. May it be for our congregation a time of discovery that renews our commitment to and deepens our understanding of our place in the wider Unitarian Universalist movement.

PIPEWORK

Over the summer much progress has been made on the new organ. The remaining pipe chests for Great and Pedal organs have been installed and several ranks of pipes installed in those divisions. Extensive wiring to make these chests playable is now also nearly complete. On this day of writing, the first ranks of the Great division and the higher notes of the Pedal organ are being reracked and regulated. The trumpet pipes for the Great division may also be installed by opening Sunday, September 11.

flank and form the exterior of the new instrument. These pipes were first restored with dowels and inserts replacing and cracks, languids checked and then, completely cosmetically stripped of old stains and shellac and three new coats of shellac applied during the summer. So the inside and outside of the instrument is now equally pristine and ready for the next century. It's worth a look up close if you care to venture up the balconv stairs.

Creation of new and remanufactured pipes continues at a steady pace at the Russell shop in Vermont.

Puritans: Saints or Scoundrels?
