I want to express my respect and appreciation to the First Parish staff, Standing Committee and Parish Interim Team. They have all worked tirelessly since August, engaging in their interim roles, learning and practicing effective communication skills. They have been enthusiastically *going direct*.

> Going direct is the choice to speak directly, honestly and respectfully to the person with whom you have an issue. Going direct is polite, and scary. It takes courage, when we are absolutely certain we are right about anything, to act with integrity and maturity and intentionally choose to be in relationship rather than to be right. It takes humility to leave our small selves (the ones that love to be right and love attention) at home, and instead, put our big selves in charge of our behaviors. None of us goes direct naturally, or easily. Going direct is a practice. Practicing is choosing, as often as we are able to suck it up, swallow our fear, our pride, and our certainty, to invite discovery.

Jenny Rankin has worked honestly and directly with me to define her ministry with First Parish. She is going direct with the members of this congregation to communicate her understanding of her future here with a letter to the congregation (see page 5). The PIT is offering First Parish members and friends the opportunity to go direct during the February Blitz, so that nothing of import is lost or distorted as we move into the ministerial settlement process.

Your Standing Committee needs and wants your feedback to inform their charge to the Ministerial Search Committee to find your next senior minister. Your Senior Minister Search Committee needs and wants direct communication to fulfill their charge. Indirect or anonymous communication invites distortions and untruths. It can be misdirected, misinterpreted, or manipulated. All our communications are about what we believe and are important enough to communicate directly so that nothing of import is lost.

- · Go direct whenever you are confused, disappointed, enthusiastic, dismayed or outraged.
- Listen appreciatively to anyone who is confused, disappointed, enthusiastic, dismayed or outraged.
- Believe in everyone's best intentions.
- Believe in what is important to you enough to communicate it directly, patiently and repeatedly.

We all deserve to give and receive direct communications. We all need repeated practice at being our best selves, and that is exactly what churches are for, practice.

The British Romantics and Their Influence on the American Transcendentalists — Sunday, February 12 at 7:30 p.m.

The Transcendentalism Council is pleased to have the opportunity to welcome the noted author and editor the Rev. Dr. Barry Andrews to discuss the relationships between the British Romantics, including Coleridge, Wordsworth and Carlyle, and the Transcendentalist movement in America.

These writers are key figures in a transnational movement in Europe, England and America that affected almost every area of intellectual and creative activity. In the most general terms, this movement, and Romanticism is the most encompassing name for it, was a reaction to many aspects of modern life then, and to some extent, even today — tyranny, materialism, industrialism, skepticism, conventionality, formalism, and the despoiling of the natural environment. Dr. Andrews is Minister Emeritus of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Shelter Rock, Long Island, NY, where he served for 18 years prior to his retirement in 2011. Now living on Bainbridge Island, WA, he continues his interest in the literature and spirituality of the Transcendentalist movement in America. Author and editor of five books on Emerson, Thoreau and Margaret Fuller, Andrews has also lectured extensively and led workshops on these and other writers. He currently serves on the board of the Thoreau Society.

Dear Members and Friends of First Parish:

William Wordsworth wrote of those rare moments when we are able to go deeper and see, as he put it, "into the life of things." I had a moment like that on a recent Sunday when our Sanctuary, chock full of people, rang with a rousing chorus of "This Land Is Your Land." I leaned over to Elaine and whispered, "*This* is First Parish!" For me, it was an image of this community at its best — strong, alive, vital, singing its heart out, caring deeply about the world.

We've been through a lot in the last 18 months. The process wasn't always easy. I believe there are new and fresh winds blowing through this place. With Elaine's leadership, the congregation is doing critical interim work — listening to one another's voices, discerning mission, dreaming about the future.

Elaine asked me to update the Standing Committee on my goals, and I wanted to share that with you. My intention is to remain in my current role. It remains a great honor to serve as one of your ministers. I appreciate the ways you are showing up, speaking up, giving of your energy and integrity.

When the next Senior Minister is called, I look forward to building a creative and collegial ministry together. My hope and expectation is that this will be possible. If however it turns out that the skills and talents we bring are not a good fit with one another, or there is not sufficient compatibility, I will plan to remain at First Parish for the first year to help with transition and then leave in June 2014.

By June of 2012, I will have accrued 6 months of sabbatical time. In consultation with the Standing Committee, I plan to take sabbatical during the interim period: one month in July 2012, and three months in January, February and March of 2013.

This is an exciting time as you do important work to get ready to call a new leader. In my mind's eye, I carry that picture of you in the Sanctuary — a strong and gathered community, people who are trying to be their best selves, people who are trying to give something back to this beautiful and broken world in which we live.

Reflections on the Caring Connection

The task of providing a ride for a congregation member seemed simple, so I was surprised when it wasn't. I arrived in the right place; we met, and fastened seatbelts. We drove, chatting for a while, and then entered the driveway to the medical building. It was then I realized that I didn't know what to do. Should I park and walk her into the building? Do I offer? What is supportive and what is too much? I drove slowly into the lot. I thought about my parents who are around the age of the person I was driving. What would they want? It would be hard for my mother to ask for a ride. Even in dire need she could make a case for why a two-mile walk might "do her good." If she did accept a ride, she would likely prefer a driver akin to a discreet chauffeur. That wasn't happening; I went on to imagine my father. He would want the driver to park, take his arm, walk with him into the office, and maybe even stay in the waiting room. If that person were to offer him an old candy from the bottom of her purse, he would accept it and call her a "gem." Our car was now near the entrance of the building and I was still without a plan. I glanced over at my fellow parishioner in the front seat and she said, "This is your first time doing this, isn't it, dear?" Kindly she gave me simple directions about how to proceed. I hadn't thought to just ask for her help, but was so grateful to receive it.

It can be so difficult to need help and harder still to ask for it. Rev. Gary Smith sometimes talked about this as an issue particularly for New Englanders, but maybe it's universal. If we've been lucky, we experienced receiving help and know how powerful simple acts of care and support can be. This fall a congregant wrote to the Caring Connection, "Each meal has been delicious, but more than that, they have been such visible reminders of First Parish, my spiritual home. I feel nourished, body and soul!" First Parish is our shared home and when one of us is in need, we help out. That is how I think about my involvement in the Caring Connection. We deliver a meal, provide a ride, or mail a note of care. It's that simple. I find it deeply comforting that our congregation is ready to offer this to anyone who comes through our doors. This puts our Unitarian Universalist principle "affirming and promoting the inherent worth of each individual" into practice, and I am honored to be a part of it. -Tracey Hurd, Caring Connection team leader

MUSINGS

In January, our choirs were invited to join in the "Hope Out Loud" concert at the Unitarian Universalist Urban Ministry in Roxbury, capping a day of program celebrating the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King.

We were honored to be asked back to the historic sanctuary in Roxbury where many of us had presented the UU Cantata "Sources" to benefit the Urban Ministry last January. Last year, we brought our music and our own agenda to Roxbury. This time, the program belonged to the Urban Ministry. Our children's choirs, led by **Gail Carey**, were invited to share their

music; our adult singers went along to sing "back up" and to join with other UU singers as guests of the Boston Community Chorus, an interracial Gospel Choir based in Roxbury.

This invitation called us to stretch outside our comfort zone musically, theologically, culturally and, as it happened, physically. The heating system was not quite up to the task. It was VERY cold in that sanctuary!

During our brief rehearsal and the concert with the BCC we were challenged to listen carefully, to quickly learn by ear, to move, to sing with more "skank." Brother Dennis Slaughter, the BCC's amazing director taught us three new songs in no time. No time to develop competence; we would need to trust the BCC singers to support us through the performance.

For me, the defining moment of the day came during Psalm 27, a challenging setting of one of the more unsettling passages of

the psalms. Brother Dennis asked if there was a soprano who could sing a high "C" at the end of the song. I vol-

unteered — I often add an extra high note to a chord.

That felt well within my "comfort zone." I was asked to watch for the cue.

When it came, it was instantly clear that I would sing during a grand pause — all alone in the silence, without the support of the choral harmony below me — at least not until after I'd committed to that high note.

- Talk about exposed!! Would I have stepped forward so
- cavalierly had I known what was really being asked of

- But it worked.

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Going out in the world to work for justice and partner

- with diverse communities and cultures can be like
- singing that high "C." We bring our resources, our skills

and our own expectations, but we need to listen for

- what is being asked of us. We might be called to step outside of our comfort zone, relinquishing our confi-
- dence or our sense of what should be done to do what is needed.

In answering that call with grace, trust and humility,

we may find ourselves capable of more than we'd
imagined.

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The First Parish interim process is kicking into high gear with **First Parish Listens**, your opportunity to say what you have yet to say. The Parish Interim Team (PIT) has worked hard to understand the process and our team's objectives. The Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) has joined our efforts so they can better apply what we learn to finding the best candidate to help First Parish realize its vision. We have conducted preliminary sessions to gain a sense of the things that are important to you, the congregation. Now we are ready to dive deeper into what is on the mind of our fellow parishioners.

Share Your Innermost Thoughts

Our plan is to listen to as many of you as possible, to hear the things that you have always wanted to say but have not yet said. The hope is that by bringing our innermost thoughts into public discussion, in a way that is safe and supporting, we will be better able to connect our history to the vision for our future. We cannot do this without you.

Join a February Listening Session

In February, the PIT will be sponsoring several facilitated **Listening Sessions** that we hope you can participate in. Four of them will be in conjunction with Terrific Tuesdays. Others will be scheduled at times so that everyone will have a chance to participate. In addition, we will facilitate sessions at regularly scheduled committee and group meetings. Our expectation is that each meeting will last about two hours. *Our goal is to meet with at least three hundred of you*. Once these sessions have been completed, and all who wish to be heard have been heard, we will bring this discovery phase of the process to completion.

Won't you please make time to contribute? Sign up for a listening session either at coffee hour or during the week at the office. If you serve on a committee, invite our facilitators to your February meeting. Or invite 10-15 of your friends to your home and we will come to you. Even if you think you have nothing to say, your listening will lend support to those who do.

The culmination of the first phase of the interim process will be a **Parish-wide retreat** to take all that we have learned and craft a vision and a mission for First Parish in Concord. FROM THE INTERN MINISTER

Dear Friends,

Maybe it's all the Republican primary coverage I've been watching or listening to lately, but I've been thinking a lot about choices over the last several weeks ... the choices we

face and the choices we make. Choice and the freedom to choose is the hallmark of a free society and a free religion.




Charles Darwin will visit with us, reminisce about his life and times, and mingle. Enjoy a light lunch, and of course, birthday cake!



T'ai Chi and Qi Gong

T'ai chi is a gentle flowing exercise that will help you build and circulate energy. Based on teachings from China, we will do Qi Gong movements that help you retain flexibility in all your joints. Students will also learn the Hwa Yu tai chi form, a series of connected movement that is like a slow-motion dance. Research shows that tai chi and qi gong improve stability, improve immune function, and create many of the benefits of meditation. If you've tried meditation, but find it hard to sit still, tai chi and qi gong may be the way to give yourself those benefits while gently moving your body. No past experience is necessary. Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction Program (MBSR)

Cultivating mindfulness, or awareness of the present moment, creates the framework for this popular course modeled after the internationally-recognized program established by Jon Kabat-Zinn at UMass Medical School. Research continues to suggest positive benefits from the practice of mindfulness-based stress reduction to the immune system, chronic illness, hypertension and chronic pain, as well as to the daily stresses of our busy lives. This interactive course consists of eight weekly two-hour group classes, where participants will be introduced to and practice guided mindfulness meditation, relaxation techniques, gentle yoga stretches, and self-inquiry exercises. Participants commonly report a reduction of stress-related symptoms, increased awareness and concentration, and improvement of positive coping skills at home and in the workplace. Instructor: *Pamela Katz Ressler*, RN, MS, HN-BC.

Turner and the Transcendentalists — The Impact of Visual Artists on Thinkers"

Margaret Fuller, Emerson, James Freeman Clarke, May Alcott all had opinions about the visual artists of their time. We will explore what they had to say and what others, such as the art critic, John Ruskin, thought about J. M. W. Turner's modern painting. Ruskin argued that "the principal role of the artist is truth to nature" and the heart of Transcendentalism is its relation to nature. We will also look at the Hudson River School, amid 19th century American art movement which was influenced by Turner.

The class will be led by *Lillian Anderson* and *Donna Peterson*. They are in the process of learning about Turner themselves, and will lead a thought-provoking discussion of this "painter of light," as Turner was known.

Adventure in Learning — Thomas Carlyle and American Transcendentalism

Emerson was just thirty years old when he first met Thomas Carlyle in 1833, after travelling over moor and field to reach Carlyle's remote farm in the Scottish countryside. Their minds clicked instantly, the connection so powerful that Emerson would call it later "a white day in my years." He was taken with Carlyle's restless energy and intellectual faculties. When Margaret Fuller met Carlyle, she took to him at first sight, but on her second or third visit to his London home, found him tendentious, wordy, and quite simply, unable to stop talking!

Carlyle's essays in the 1830s profoundly influenced New England Transcendentalists, so much so that one scholar has called Carlyle's work the "call-to-arms of transcendentalism."

Join *Jenny Rankin* and others for another "adventure in learning" as we delve into the life and thought of this European thinker who so influenced our own American culture, literature and spirituality.
