There are new initiatives rippling through this community! Small task forces, out of the April 1 weekend, are working to follow up on ideas. This is a broad grassroots effort; we want as many members and friends engaged as possible.

May brings many new opportunities. On May 5, we will have the chance to mix and mingle at the Auction. It's a great way for us to gather as a community, meet someone new, share food and fellowship, and "give something back" to this institution. On May 6,

we are celebrating our evolving new organ and enjoying special music in worship. On May 20, we'll listen to our teenagers reflect on what it means to "come of age" as a Unitarian Universalist. And, at month's end, we'll gather "off campus" for the treasured intergenerational retreat at Ferry Beach.

Also in May, I will be leading a group to the United Kingdom to explore our roots. We will walk in the footsteps of Unitarians and Transcendentalists like Channing, Parker, Emerson, Fuller, Clarke and the Alcotts; listen to their stories; consider their ideas; and seek to connect with these spiritual ancestors who helped create our modern-day Unitarian Universalism. We'll meet with congregations in Edinburgh and London. We hope to bring some of the spiritual energy and power of touching these "roots" back to the congregation. "Roots hold us close, wings set us free."

Being part of a spiritual community can mean so many things to different people. For some, it is a chance to slip into a pew, listen to music, sink into a few precious moments of silence. For others, it's a chance to "go deeper" by trying a spiritual practice. Or your children are grown and gone and you want to teach religious education. You'd like to visit elders. You've recently moved here and just want to belong somewhere. You've always wanted to be more of an activist but need a way to get connected. You have a child or teen and want them to have a moral compass. Or a hundred other reasons.

In a world that moves quickly, where cynicism and materialism are powerful forces, it is quite a thing to belong to a community that has lasted for over 300 years, a community that even now is looking ahead, imagining all it could be.

We are glad you are here.

MUSINGS

Over the past two years, this congregation has listened as a new church organ comes to life, rank by rank, in our Sanctuary. As our organ builder, Steve Russell, skillfully constructs this new instrument, we have heard the expanding palette of sounds expertly woven into preludes, offertories and postludes by our Parish Organist, **Erick Huenneke**.

The story of this instrument is much longer than these two years of building. The journey began in 1999, when we considered how best to address issues of maintenance,

deterioration and sound quality in our centu-

ry-old Austin/Skinner pipe organ. The road to engaging Russell & Co. Organ Builders to construct this instrument was long and at times quite rocky. We sometimes disagreed about what direction to take; we took some detours — even hit a few dead ends along the way. Now, as we approach the final destination — a new instrument that incorporates salvageable pipework from the former instrument

— it is clear that Russell & Co. is building an exceptional organ that fulfills the goals of the project and will support our music ministry for generations to come.

On Sunday, May 6, we will celebrate this developing instrument, though it still some months from completion, with the presentation of Hungarian composer Zoltán Kodály's breathtaking *Laudes Organi: Fantasia on a XIIth Century Sequence* for organ and choir. Kodály wrote this unusual piece on commission from the American Guild of Organists in 1964. The Latin poetry of the 12th century sequence, or chant, upon which the work is based invites us to appreciate the variety of sounds that are possible on the organ. The choir sings the descriptive text as it is vividly illustrated by the virtuoso organ solo.

The word *organi* had multiple meanings in the 12th century. It could refer to organs of the human body or any musical instrument — not just the emerging pipe organ. *Organum* was a specific type of polyphonic singing. After considering several titles for his fantasia, Kodály chose *Laudes Organi* (Praise of the organ) to celebrate the full range of music and musicians — singers and players — in body and spirit.

Kodály's *Laudes Organi* combines several themes for First Parish — Our connection to Hungarian culture through our Partner Church in Transylvania; our stewardship, over the centuries of several pipe organs; and our strong support of music as a vehicle for expression, praise and community.

We look forward to sharing the *Laudes Organi* with you on May 6, celebrating our rich musical heritage and our stewardship of a beautiful new pipe organ. •

"Social action is about hope. Hope that change can happen. Hope that one person can make a change happen.

Hope is seen on a local level: in the 120+ meals served each week by Open Table in Concord and Maynard; in the safety provided to the women and children at the Urban Ministries domestic violence shelter; and in our rising awareness of water as a human right during our water worship.

Hope is seen on a national level — as changes are made to immigration laws impacting both documented and undocumented immigrants; with housing policies retained and changed for, or budget money allocated to, the homeless through advocacy phone calls and lobbying.

Hope is seen on the international level — in the release of, or improvement of conditions for, prisoners advocated by Amnesty International; in the empowerment of Guatemalan women through the teachings of Maya Skills; and in our teens as they learn and share the stories of El Salvador while visiting the Art Center for Peace.

FROM THE INTERN MINISTER

Few things are as difficult to do as leaving people one has come to know and love. May is my last month at First Parish as your intern minister. Though it is hard to believe, it is time to say good-bye.

"I want to appreciate you without judging. Join you without invading. Invite you without demanding. Leave you without

guilt." In many ways, these words by Virginia
Satir reflect both my experience and current

state of mind as I prepare to depart from this community. For the past two years I have been a part of First Parish, and in that time First Parish has become a part of me. It has not always been an easy time, but your commitment to First Parish and to each other has allowed me to appreciate you without judgment.

Through planning and participation in Sunday worship, community activist vespers, pastoral care, adult and children's religious education and so much more, I have joined you on your journey and come to know many of you and something of your lives. We have walked this journey together in a spirit of mutuality, even as we pursued personal goals.

Before I arrived for my first day at First Parish, I was told First Parish was about to enter a period of transition. Now, as the end of my internship approaches, First Parish continues that process of transition. It is an exciting time, and I must admit there is a part of me that wishes I could remain to see the blossom that emerges from the bud so carefully tended during this time, through a consistent, yet patient, invitation to recognize and be our best selves.
