We will continue to practice. We may not always get it right, but we have learned to say, "Go direct," to ask "Do you want to be right, or do you want to be in relationship?" and to remind each other, "We don't do that anymore." We are practicing how to hold one another to a new relational standard, a covenant of behavior, for decision-making and engagement that will assure a sustainable future for First Parish. I am honored and inspired to walk this walk with you.

From the New First Parish Subcommittee on Congregational Discernment

This September is an exciting transition time at First Parish. By establishing a subcommittee on congregational discernment, the Standing Committee is building on the work our congregation did last year in our Listening Sessions and our Spring Forward Retreat.

Four Listening Sessions will be offered early this fall to provide a forum for feedback and discussion of critical areas of church functioning, and to encourage continued involvement as we go forward. We hope you will be able to attend one of them.

These sessions will focus on essential interrelated topics, all of which look toward our future:

Strategic ends: "What are those?" you ask. These are the statements that will give us the direction we need to turn our vision for First Parish — a vision we put into words last spring — into goals. These will be drafted at our Standing Committee retreat in early September, and presented for your review.

Structure and Budget: Our Organizational Structure Review Team, led by the Rev. Elaine Peresluha as part of our interim process, is drafting a revised First Parish organizational structure to help us achieve those ends, targeted for implementation in the 2013-2014 church year. This plan will be presented and discussed at the Standing Committee retreat, and then offered for your reflection at our listening sessions. In addition, you will have an opportunity to consider the connection between our vision, our strategic ends, our organizational structure, and the budget recommendations for 2013-2014 that flow from these.

MONEY MATTERS

Thanks to the auction proceeds, we ended FY12 only \$1500 short of our income goal — despite the fact that for the first time in five years we did not receive 95 percent (or more) of our pledged dollars before the fiscal year closed.

Because of the mild winter, some personnel departures, and Wright Tavern adjustments, our expenses were below budget by nearly 6 percent, enabling us to put \$60,000 into retained earnings, bringing the total in that account to \$253,000.

First Parish financial policies call for us to have 20 percent of the total annual budget in retained earnings. With our budget at \$1.123M for the new year, we have not only reached the retained earnings goal but exceeded it.

As of today, August 24, we have received 480 pledges for a total of \$808,972 against a pledge goal of \$906,000. We want to make up the \$97,000 remaining to our goal this fall, as we discussed at the Annual Meeting. Planning is beginning for an event to be held Saturday, November 10. Details will be announced in the coming weeks.

And, as we do each summer, we "cleaned" the database. We currently have 798 members, 257 friends, and 625 pledge units (households).

Speaking of the database, Cassy Bosworth and Tina Storey have been diligently testing our new database (with me pitching in as I am able) throughout the summer. We are looking to go live probably sometime in early September. We will be maintaining our old database during the ramp-up to ensure we have accurate data. I am excited about this project; it will take a while for us to fully use the power in this new database, but all of us are looking forward to better tracking, thank-you notes to you, our donors, and improved ease-of-use pledge statements.

Here's the kind of news that gets the Business Office excited: we got new copiers this summer! We were approached by Ricoh to replace our existing copiers, whose leases were set to expire at the end of 2012. We have gotten faster, better copiers for the same price as our previous copiers. •

Pausing here, in the relative quiet between an eventful summer and a dynamic new church year, I've been listening for a musical theme that would weave the two seasons together. This round from the 1983 Greenham Common Peace Occupation floated into my head.

Building bridges between our divisions I reach out to you, will you reach out to me? With all of our voices and all of our visions Friends, we can make such sweet harmony.

Building bridges; reaching out. This is what we do through this First Parish music ministry, and in the music of our wider association. In June,

> at General Assembly in Phoenix, I led a workshop on social justice music that highlighted the bridge-building wrought with the songs of the American labor and civil rights movements. Singing those songs together built palpable connections! I also witnessed with pride, as our Unitarian Universalist Association reached out to local part-

ners in Phoenix and the United Church of Christ to raise our voices together for immigrant rights at our Justice GA.

During the UU Musicians Network conference at All Souls in Tulsa, Oklahoma, I was inspired by music's role in uniting two diverse congregations and cultures. This large UU congregation answered the call to live its values by opening its sanctuary to members of a local Pentecostal congregation that had embraced Universalism — and been shunned by their wider denomination. The faith and trust that this requires of both congregations is astonishing. And music — inspiring, eclectic music — is an essential element in this partnership.

In September, we will welcome friends from our partner congregation in Székelykeresztúr and strengthen the bond of faith and friendship that has connected us over the past two decades. Music has been an important part of our relationship, bridging chasms of culture and language when we come together.

And in October, we will welcome the choir of Jefferson Unitarian Church in Golden, Colorado, for their Unitarian Heritage pilgrimage. Our collaboration with other UU choirs in a Saturday night concert, and our revival of movements from *Missa Gaia* on Sunday morning, will forge new connections with our fellow American UU's.

This year we hope to strengthen our ties with the UU Urban Ministry through musical collaboration; we will gather for Rise Up Singing on a regular basis; we will sing together in worship, at bedsides, in living rooms; we will

be led by our children and youth. There are so many musical ways for us to reach out to one another.

With all of our voices and all of our visions, friends, we can make such sweet harmony. ◆

Lawrence Lessig: How Money Corrupts Congress






