Meditation on Covenant

Our Puritan forbears living in a land that was far harsher and more demanding than it is now, saw within themselves all that they needed to create beloved community.

Inside their circles of kinship, all were called, all were holy. Congregations of "saints," as they called themselves, not too big and not too small, harkened back to the original free churches: the church of Abraham and Sarah, the new Christian communities seeded by Paul and the apostles.

The form of each church was the "visible covenant," the consent among equals to join together in right relation with one another and to something greater than themselves. There was no need to bow to any other power but God, with whom every woman and man professed a personal connection. No presbytery, no bishop, no pope would have dominion over these saints. If and when their community needed help, they would call on their neighboring churches to offer wisdom or support.

When we walk through the doors of our Sanctuary, we come seeking something similar to that beloved community the Puritans believed they could achieve. We may not be as confident as they that we

will find it, but why else would we come? Whether we claim to be Humanist, Christian, Buddhist, Pagan, or anything else, we seek that communion of souls that will help us to deepen as individuals, because we sense — we know — it can't be done in solitude.

We feel a need for connection, but we have a hard time giving up our individualism. We have taken the concept of individual freedom and, to our peril, have separated it from the idea of responsibility one to the other.

What we lack, perhaps, is the humility of those early settlers who knew that the world was too harsh to go it alone, who felt unworthy to join themselves into a church but pursued the ideal anyway by covenanting with one another, "to cleave each to the other as fellow members of one body in brotherly love." Early in February, as a response to the great work done by both the Governance Task Force and the Our Whole Congregation group, both **Elaine Peresluha** and Stefan Jonasson spoke to the value of making a more formal commitment to one another.

So let us consider a new covenant.

Let us, together, find language that will inspire that commitment to beloved community that transcends the desires of the individual. Let us truly learn how to live in right relation and walk together in love.

May it be so.


The Transcendentalism Council of First Parish will sponsor Pulitzer finalist Megan Marshall's presentation,

account of Fuller's years in revolutionary Rome.



Connection. People are all about connection. Being in relationship is probably the most important part of what it means to be human. When something happens to jeopardize this fundamental piece of our human nature, we can feel "out of control" and vulnerable.

People of all ages feel this way. When we communicate with someone and there is no response, it shakes us. "What did I say?" "Did she take it the wrong way?" "He must be mad at me." Even a bad response is almost always better than no response at all. It is the "not knowing" that is painful.

I have heard of times when teens will stop talking to parents. It is amazing how unsettling

it is to a person to be ignored.

This is a method that has even used as a form of torture. To be ignored is to be unseen.

I am focused on this because of my recent e-mail disaster.
My e-communication world collapsed on Monday morning,
March 18. I have had my First
Parish e-mail address for over eight

years now. It is my primary way of communicating and serving you, my Parish family. When the reality started to set in that I was going to be "locked out" for 8 hours, then 24 hours, then 48 hours and then ... for-ever hours, I truly felt a sense of panic. The fact that here was no way to set a bounce-back message was inconceivable to me. The thought that people I care about were e-mailing me and wondering why I was ignoring them was very upsetting to me.

In this age of uber-networking, of LinkedIN, of FaceBook friends, of Listservs and twittering, a sudden "dis-connection" from e-worlds can put us all at risk of becoming a Miss Manner's poster child of

virtual impropriety: perceived, but not real, unresponsiveness.

How will this turn out? I'm not sure just yet. But, as always, I reached out to my fellow parishioners, and some were able to help. What does this Parish mean to me, during this Annual Campaign? Well, when I need a hand, this is always where I turn. These are the people I trust. Priceless.

I know you have been waiting for our new minister. At the time of this writing, he has not yet been named. [Ed note: candidate named 3/24 is Howard

Jubilation! One of My Favorite Words

I was blessed with a feeling of jubilee *twice* this month: once when our candidate for senior minister, Howard Dana, was announced; and prior to that, when the Social Action Community board and Grants groups voted to become a single Social Action Council. You can read more about the new structure in the article below.

In the Jewish tradition, the "jubilee" is the 50th year of a cycle. It is a sacred year, "a time of freedom and of cele-

> bration when everyone will receive back their original property, and slaves will return home to their families" (Lev. 25:10). After unpacking my feelings of jubilation a bit more, a deeper meaning rose to the surface: hope ushers us through times of change. We hope for that 50th year, the time for jubilation, when all of our regenerated hopes are realized and we take a breath of

fresh air.

In social justice work, work and hope, hand-in-hand, bring jubilee. In Massachusetts, we worked and hoped for the equal marriage rights, and that hope was realized! Jubilation! Now, that hope is spreading — to other states and the Supreme Court, with fibers of LGBTQ equality sneaking into our army's policies and some right-of-center political platforms. Jubilation came before that, too, with the Civil Rights Act, the 19th Amendment, the Emancipation Proclamation and so many more. Looking back at hopes that have been realized, we see that jubilee is a time for rejoicing, but also a time to look forward to the next jubilee and to the work we must do in the next 50 years to achieve a more perfect world.

We have formed a new Social Action Council, but what will be our next horizon? What justice shall we seek? Who will come with us on this journey? •

Our March 10 Standing Committee (SC) meeting ran opposite one of the final rehearsals of the Church Musical, so we found ourselves missing some of our dramatically inclined members.

Elaine Peresluha reported this month in a format that was organized around our Strategic Ends, making it faster and easier to see how church activities were organized in service to our Mission and our Strategic Ends. In addition, the presentation of a chronology of this year's budget's special increases and decreases showed how we have arrived in positive territory. Since September, the very busy Rev. Elaine Peresluha has raised an additional \$105,000!

The Standing Committee salutes her extraordinary efforts on behalf of our finances and extends a warm "Thank you" to all who contributed so generously.

In our monthly discussion of a governing policy, we focused on the second-level governing policy on committees. After reviewing the four kinds of committees described in the policy, the SC agreed that we would begin a review of this policy by forming a working group later in the spring, incorporating the Executive Team (ET), the Nominating Committee and the new minister, and returning recommendations for revisions in the fall of the year. Mark Russell Prior volunteered to chair the working group.

The 2012-13 annual goals for the ET and the SC (many of which have already been achieved) were finally approved.

Alec Walker reported that the Ministerial Search Committee has made its choice and the results will be revealed on March 24. [See page 7 for all that info.]

The SC also heard reports from **Gretchen Nelson** about the preparations for Candidating Week, from **Jack Nevison** reporting for **Suzanne Lowe** on the February
Trustees meeting, from **Mark Russell Prior** on Suzanne and Mark's report on Membership at FP, from **Patty Popov** on the bylaw revision committee, and from **Laurie Van Loon** and **Jack Nevison** on the SC Report on
Governance at FP and the congregational discussion about the report. (Both of these reports were sent out on FP
Announce and are available on the Church website.)


