The most important things to remember about being in the middle are:


It absolutely feels like it will be like this forever.

Still basking in the glow of our vote to call **Rev. Howard Dana**, the Standing Committee (SC) held its May meeting on Monday, May 13, at **Alec Walker**'s house (because the church is closed on Mondays). It was our eleventh monthly meeting of the year.

First order of business was the introduction of our new Director of Operations, **Fifi Ball**, who began work on the May 13. Fifi will hit the ground running as she handles the final stages of next year's budgeting, being coordinated with the late stages of the annual pledge drive. We all extended a hearty welcome to her. (*See box on this page for an introduction to Fifi.*)

We heard from two groups of parishioners who wanted to inform the SC about their proposals for RE staffing and Wright Tavern operations. We thanked the parishioners for giving the SC some useful background and assuring us that the proposals are aligned with our mission and strategic ends. They will continue to work with **Elaine Peresluha** so that concerns may be addressed in the coming year.

Treasurer **Suzanne Lowe** reported on the feedback of the May 7 and 11 congregational discussions on the budget and on additional meetings with Elaine and Fifi. She emphasized that the goal was a balanced budget to be completed by June 2 for consideration at the June 9 Annual Meeting (see page 2 for meeting notice). Discussion emphasized the importance of building a "sustainable" budget that would allow us to live within our means, with an additional ranked list of items available if our revenues exceeded our plan.

The current five basic assumptions in the budget are:

- 1. A 5 percent increase in health care costs
- 2. The Trustees' level revenue funding
- 3. A \$30K fundraising event occuring in the fall
- 4. All other expenses, the same
- 5. Revenue at the conservative projection of the Treasurer's Advisory Committee

The current top three new priorities in the budget remain:

- 1. An increase in Senior Minister's salary to the contracted amount
- 2. An increase in staff salaries toward midpoints for Large Church One
- 3. A beginning of a process to reestablish UUA fair share

The stewardship drive is going well and there is UU evidence that a first year with a new minister will see a "bump" in pledging. The stewardship groups are working to ensure that we benefit from this opportunity.

Mindfulness ls . .

"Mindfulness" seems to be the word of the day according to the media. But what is "mindfulness"? In its simplest form, mindfulness is bringing awareness to the present moment. How easy that sounds, but how difficult it is! Much of the time our thoughts are ruminating over the past or projecting into the future; very little of lives are actually spent noticing the present moment. Watch a small child completely transfixed by a puddle on the sidewalk and you will have a glimpse of mindfulness. As we age, mindfulness is often trained out of us because we think we need to be more practical, or we feel we are too busy, or too stressed, or we tell ourselves we just don't have the time. However, as we learn more about the inner workings of the brain and the mind, mindfulness is now recommended as an antidote for the busyness and stress of modern life. It soothes and balances our emotions, and it helps to build self-compassion and empathy for others. Mindfulness helps us to slow down and navigate life's joys and challenges with a bit more awareness. One of Concord's own, Henry David Thoreau, spoke of mindfulness when he wrote, " I went to the woods because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not, when I came to die, discover that I had not lived." As the longer days of summer beckon, grant yourself permission to once again experience mindfulness — ask a child to be your teacher. Wishing you a mindful summer,

MINISTERIAL INTERN

A minister friend of mine recently said that after deep, serious reflection, she had determined

that the call to ministry she felt so

long ago must have really been the result of sleep deprivation from a youth weekend retreat and the concomitant coffee jag. After four years and many long hours of hard and difficult work building up trust in a church still dealing with a previous failed ministry, my friend was obviously having

trouble connecting to her true, original call.

I offer this up as a precautionary tale. Most of us who participate regularly in the various programs and missions of First Parish have followed a call of sorts. We are here for a reason — many reasons actually. To borrow and adapt the chalice lighting words from Mel Harkrader-Pine I used back in March:

Some of us come here looking for solace.
Some of us come here and gave it to them.
Some of us come here seeking music.
Some of us come here and gave it, joyfully.
Some of us come here seeking learning, growth.
Some of us come here and provided it.
Some of us come here looking for a sense of security, a safe haven.

Some of us come here and provided it.

Some of us come here seeking the joy of community.

Some of us come here and created that.

Some of us come here wanting to serve.

Some of us come here and made it possible for them.

It is true that our call to be here might shift back and forth from seeker to provider, and it is also true that with all things there is a continuum of dedication, a range of passion attached to our sense of belonging; but we are here, together, nonetheless, because some energy has moved us to come.

You'll note that nowhere in the reading above does it say, "Some of us come here to engage in long, arduous

committee meetings," or "Some of us come here to go over the line-item budget 20 times to be sure the allocation of funds is as fair as possible." Of course it occasionally becomes necessary to engage in the sometimes tough work of doing church, but my long-arrived-at point is that to stay balanced, to be all that we can be together, we need to continually reconnect to our own church calling clearly and faithfully, even as we go about the day-to-day work that makes this place possible.

In seminary we are taught that in order to stay connected to our call, we need to maintain a healthy spiritual practice. And so what is good for the minister should also be good for the congregation. It is truly beneficial to take the time to remember why we arrived here in the first place, and our reasons for staying. It's also a good practice to share our story with others in the community and to be reminded that they too are here following a call, that their gifts and needs complement our own. Finally, it is important to remember that we are here to take care of each other, to celebrate those individual callings, and rejoice in the often-incredible things that result in our coming together as one.

With our "regular" church year coming to a close, I wanted to remind you that we're really still here during the summer, and the opportunity for reflection and connection is still available to you. There are still interesting services every Sunday and there is still good fellowship to be had afterward. If you should want to show up during the week for a conversation, I'd be happy to oblige. Tuesday through Thursday mornings are good. Just give me a call!

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

What a year it has been in the life of the congregation!

I arrived in September into the middle of the interim process. I heard from many of you about your excitement for the future. I heard about your passion for building a deep sense of belonging within this faith-full community. The last nine months we have looked at our governance structure and membership policies. We have considered the routes of communication within the congregation. We have discussed the meaning of right relationships and how we want to be together in community.

The new Congregational Life Council (CLC), like a phoenix, emerged out of the dying embers of the long-standing Membership Committee. Under the expansive Congregational Life umbrella, we have experimented with different ways of sharing food during coffee hour and where to place the First Parish Connections and Welcome Table. We have modernized some communications with visitors, and streamlined the New to Unitarian Universalism classes and "path to community." And most recently we have launched the successful Ambassador Program, where members of the congregation engage fellow members in appreciative inquiry about First Parish.

Candidating Week introduced me to the fun-loving and motivated congregation that the entire Unitarian Universalist Association looks to for inspiration. What a joy it was to be present during your meetings with Rev. Howard Dana and at the vote to call him as your next senior minister. I look forward to the coming year to see what we will all do together. It is a true blessing to be here with you.

In the past, the position of Membership Director was a tenmonth agreement; but with the expanded hours and role of the Director of Congregational Life, I will be working through the summer. I will be working with other staff to gain the skills I need to work proficiently with the new database. I hope to develop, with members of both the Congregational Life Council (CLC) and the Nominating/ Leadership Development Committee, an effective method

to gather useful and usable data from individual members and friends of First Parish, in order to facilitate the community building programs and volunteer needs of the congregation. Because the Ambassador Program is a separate initiative from the Visiting Stewards program of the financial stewardship campaign, the ambassador conversations will continue throughout the summer. (Please let me know if you would like to have a conversation sooner rather than later.) This summer there will be summer picnics, like last summer. Information about the picnics will be e-mailed out on FP Announce, or you may send me an e-mail to double-check the date, time, and location.





Alan became an amateur astronomer in 1965 and a *Sky* & *Telescope* subscriber in 1966. He joined the editorial staff in 1982 and is now a senior editor. Over the years he has played a role in practically every part of the magazine, especially upcoming celestial events, amateur observing projects, equipment tests, and news articles. He also has a big hand in *Night Sky* and its Web site.

Among his most popular articles have been the Star-Hopping series of 28 deep-sky tours, which he scouted using the 6-inch reflecting telescope he built at age 15. Many of these are collected in his book *Star-Hopping for Backyard Astronomers*. More than a decade ago he built an observatory for his 12.5-inch f/6 reflector, shown here. Before joining *Sky* & *Telescope* Alan worked as a reporter and editor for alternative newspapers. His physics degree is from Cornell University in 1972. He has contributed to *Not Necessarily the New Age*, *The Fringes of Reason*, and many other books and magazines. He makes radio and TV appearances, writes an astronomy column for the *Boston Globe*, and speaks at amateur astronomy gatherings. In 2003 the asteroid (10373) MacRobert was named in his honor.
