#### REVERIES

I want to thank all of you who have offered me a warm welcome to First Parish in Concord. It is good to be among you and I am eager for our work together. It is clear to me that you all have done a tremendous amount of work during the interim years. You are clearly a healthier institution for your work with Rev. Elaine Peresluha. And there is much more work to be done in bringing First Parish to a place where it can fully function as the large church that it is.

During my first month as your minister, many people made appointments to talk with me privately. Some people were eager to meet me and to let me know what

is going on in the church. These and other conversations have

been eye opening. I have learned things about your history I did not know. I have become acquainted with various sides of various issues. I have heard stories of betrayal and hurt feelings. I have seen tears. And all of this was to be expected.

First Parish in Concord has been through some tough times in the last five years. I am not surprised by the grief, anger, frustration, and resentment that shows itself here. The healing of the congregation will take a few more years at least.

And this healing is the good work to which we must all attend. Money is the other factor that seems to overshadow every conversation I have had this first month. Money is a huge issue for our congregation — how much money is needed, how it is raised, how it is spent, who gets to spend it, and how trustworthy are those handling it. Moving First Parish from a mentality of scarcity to a place of abundance will not come easily either. And it is good work too.

As we all settle in together this first year, I hope we will continue the good work started in the interim. I hope we will attend to the healing work that can bring a fragmented congregation back together. Then I hope we start thinking about what our future might look like. It will be years before First Parish is ready to live out a larger mission, but we can begin imagining what that mission might look like right now. And that is exciting. See you in church.

Yes! The Standing Committee (SC) do meet during the summer! Our First Parish Standing Committee calendar begins in June. Here are a few high points from our August 11 meeting.

We continue working with our organizing template of areas to be covered; some of these are reviewed each month, and some are slotted for special attention once a year. We add other items to our agenda as issues arise. Our summer areas of focus have been to look back at unfinished business, and to begin preparations and brainstorming for the upcoming church year. We will meet for a retreat to deepen this work, beginning August 21. We'll reassess our end statements (linked to our mission) and our goals.

Our August 11 meeting was made special by the presence of our new minister **Howard Dana**. We welcomed him with enthusiasm, and appreciated his input. He encouraged us to continue to expand our role to provide warm facilitation for congregational initiatives, and to clarify the appropriate levels of support to a diversity of groups and committees.

Howard underscored the expectation that the work of the SC include more than our regular monthly meetings — for example, subgroups the SC organizes for specific purposes, and collaborations with other groups in the church. At this meeting, several established sub-committees were reconfirmed, and several proposed ones discussed.

Our new clerk, **Kristin Haddad**, has taken on the Herculean task of recording our proceedings so you can all see what takes place at each meeting. (Note: *The Standing Committee meets monthly at First Parish on the second Sunday of the month from 6:30-9:00 p.m.*)

**Fifi Ball**, our new Director of Operations, and **Suzanne Lowe**, our Treasurer, presented updated information on First Parish's financial picture. They are working hard to streamline and clarify our budget and our stewardship efforts.

We voted to give **Rev. Elaine Peresluha** a special payment of \$20,000 in recognition of her extraordinary efforts during her tenure as Interim Minister at First Parish.

Stay tuned for the more complete and formal minutes from this meeting. Minutes are posted on the website and the bulletin board at First Parish every month after the SC has had a chance to review and approve them.

Having taken over the duties of the Youth Program Director, my mind is buzzing with excitement at the idea of further integrating youth programming and social action.

I love these words from UU composer Elizabeth Alexander's anthem. They express, for me, what First Parish can be at its best. And as we begin a new era with our new minister, my hope is that welcome, forgiveness and transformation will be at the heart of our music and arts ministry.

This year, as a "seasoned" UU music leader, I am pursuing UUA Music Leader Certification following

the "Portfolio Path" for musicians of long tenure. Through my portfolio, I will demonstrate that I have fulfilled the requirements for UUA certification in three general areas of competency: Music Skills and Resources, Unitarian Universalist Heritage and Theology, and Leadership and Interpersonal Skills. In this, my 20th year at First Parish, I

welcome this opportunity to reflect on the music ministry at First Parish, how I have shaped it over the years, and how it has shaped me.

Candidates for certification must express their philosophy of music ministry. Some prompts for reflection are: "How is music in your congregation a ministry?" "How does music change lives, nurture healing and inspire hope?" Here is part of my answer.

In my experience, music can bring comfort to the grieving and release to the dying; music can nurture confidence in the timid and awe the skeptic. Music can calm an anxious meeting or invigorate an exhausted work group. In times of upheaval and transition, we can embrace one another through music, remembering our capacity for harmony in the midst of conflict.

This answer comes directly from my experience with this remarkable congregation. I hope it reflects some of your experience as well.

Fall is a great time to join in the ministry of music and arts at First Parish. There are many open doors to enter: choirs for singers of all ages, play reading, Rise Up Singing, photography, art exhibits, theatrical productions,

concerts, Arts Council, Music Events Committee. The possibilities are limited only by the creativity, aspirations and resources of our members.




