# REVERIES

At their meeting on Sunday, November 10, 2013, the First Parish Standing Committee took a historic vote. They voted to change the way our congregation raises money. In addition to the annual pledge drive, First Parish will also accept special fundraisers and designated gifts to supplement its programs and projects. This shift fits with fundraising in the 21st century.

Ever since the economic downturn of 2008 and 2009, fundraising for not-for-profits has changed. It has changed for houses of worship too. To fulfill their mission in the world,

churches, synagogues and temples must seek funds from a variety of sources. No longer is it possible to succeed by having one pledge drive a year. Other fundraisers and gifts throughout the year must augment this crucial pledge drive. First Parish in Concord is no exception to this rule. To fund our mission we must raise more money from more sources; otherwise we unnecessarily hobble ourselves.

While I do not fear a rush of First Parish members who will now want to raise money for various projects, I do think that the first couple of years of this new policy will find us asking some interesting questions. This change will allow generous people who may have had gifts turned away in the past the opportunity to offer those gifts again. This

change may result in new gifts being offered. And it will surely result in special fundraising by groups within the church. These efforts will need to be coordinated, but we will seriously consider all offers of fundraising, large and small. While I will ultimately be in charge of approving these fundraisers or not, I will rely on congregational leaders and church staff to help me determine whether a gift or fundraiser is appropriate for First Parish. I look forward to the creative chaos this change could bring.

The secondary matter the Standing Committee did not take up at its meeting, but which also needs to be discussed widely, is whether or not a designated gift or project-oriented fundraiser should include a percentage for the First Parish operating budget to cover overhead. Individuals and groups in the congregation enjoy the use of the church's buildings, its staff hours and other administrative capabilities, and its various modes of publicity. I think it is perfectly reasonable that 15 percent or 20 percent of a gift or fundraiser should go to defray these costs. I am sure there are various opinions about this percentage, and I look forward to a wider conversation about it.

One of the clearest things that I have learned in my short time as your minister is that no issue looms larger for First Parish in Concord than money! Money arises in almost every conversation. How it is raised. How it is spent. Who controls it before it is spent. And what priorities go into its allocation. Money is a huge issue for us. All this gives us all the more reason to talk about it. In itself, money is neither good nor bad. We have the opportunity to use it for good. Imagine what First Parish might do in the world if it saw fundraising as an opportunity to further its mission. Imagine how that shift could change everything.

Two major currents flow through our Standing Committee (SC) activities this year. First, the continued refinement of our evolutionary path from Mission, to Strategic Ends, to Annual Goals. Second, coordination and collaboration with our brand new minister **Howard Dana** — including expanded discussions of church governance.

The first current saw the late September formation of the SC Annual Goals for the year:

- Model healthy communication and transparency among, to and from the congregation.
- Enable the congregation to participate more fully in congregational life and decision making.
- Develop systems that foster increased financial stewardship as a congregational norm.
- Model shared ministry and spiritual leadership; support and collaborate with **Reverend Dana**.

As part of achieving Goal #3, stewardship, we have sponsored two congregational discussions of budget priorities for 2014-15 (with one more to come) in the areas of both income and expenditure: fundraising and brainstorming for the future. This month and next we will group and prioritize suggestions from those meetings and pass the budgeting ideas to **Howard Dana** and **Fifi Ball** to begin the draft of the 2014-15 budget.

Goal #2, increased congregational participation, led to coordination between the Standing Committee and the Environmental Leadership Team to set up the Congregational Meeting on November 10, which voted unanimously to support installation of solar panels on the First Parish roof.

A third effort is to improve shared participation is the SC Task Force on Committee Formation and Function. This task force has made real progress on revising the present policy and looks forward to reporting back by January. A revised policy will clarify committee formation and oversight. One outcome will be to enable the Standing Committee to consider in more detail the Congregation's request for a Finance Committee.

The other major current — collaborating with **Howard Dana** in his first year of ministry — has meant a significant policy change in the way programs can raise funds to support special efforts. The background for this change has been eight years in the making as major fundraising professionals in many churches have opened up the opportunity for donors to target their gifts and groups within the church to engage in project-specific

- fund drives. Howard reported that research to date shows that
- special giving does not cannibalize regular giving when well
- managed. After a lively discussion, the Standing Committee
- passed the following motion:
- "We adopt a policy of accepting dedicated funds subject to
- the minister's approval and oversight. We direct the senior
- minister to minimize any adverse impact on the annual
- campaign." 🔶

# CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

I am a member of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Membership Professionals. UUAMP formed a few years ago when a number of membership professionals across the country found that they could be more effective in their congregations if they reached out and shared best practices with others doing similar work.

One of my colleagues has been working with her congregation to transition from the "Welcome Table" model, where one, two or three trained members welcome visitors and answer questions, to a model where a larger and larger percentage of the congregation take personal responsibility for approaching people they don't know or recognize.

This model empowers all members, friends and visitors to participate in an intentional ministry of welcome in the whole church: at coffee hour, in the vestibule, in the Sanctuary, in the religious education classrooms, in the stairwells, and in the parking lots.

Some questions to keep in mind if you would like to help First Parish in Concord build an intentional ministry of welcome include the following:

What did you think of the service today?

I don't think we have met, my name is...

What brought you here today?

Tell me about yourself.

Can I introduce you to my friend? ♦

# Special Note: You Can Help First Parish Become More Sustainable

During this holiday season, why not give First Parish the gift of solar? On November 10, our congregation voted unanimously to add 70 solar panels to our south facing roof. These panels will generate enough electricity to cover 25 percent of the cost of what our church building uses, and will reduce our carbon footprint by 194 tons over the next 20 years.

Hoping to avoid a loan for the cost of installation, we are offering parishioners the opportunity to adopt a full or partial panel (each panel costs \$1200) and give a gift to the church that keeps on giving. Fund an entire panel yourself or go in with friends, fellow committee members, or extended family. You can name a panel in honor of a loved one. Or dedicate it to the future of your children.

This effort also acts as a pilot fundraising program, because we are allowing individual parishioners to contribute to a specific program, rather than our traditional policy of accepting contributions only into the general fund. If all 70 panels are adopted, we will not only cover the full cost of installation but also make a \$16,800 donation to the general operating budget.

On my commute to and from church, there are worn paths along each edge of the traffic islands that create order in a five-way intersection. There are a dozen or so people, most of them homeless, who walk these paths morning until dusk, seeking money, food and connection. As I've made this commute, sometimes six times a week, it's made me reconsider how generous I can be.

Initially, I was challenged. I was reminded of my travels in



India, when I didn't give money to children who were begging because I knew most of them were part of begging "rings." These rings funneled money to leaders who took a large portion of daily earnings from these small children. It sounded like a type of modern slavery to me. I'm not aware of systems like this in Boston, but the reminder preventing me from seeing the traffic island walkers.

After a few weeks, I pushed myself. I turned off the radio so I couldn't be distracted. I put my window down (until it got too cold). I smiled. I had quick conversations. In one of these conversations, I asked one woman what her favorite snack was. "Chocolate and coffee," she answered.

I saw an opening. I started buying bags of chocolate, keeping them in the passenger seat of my car, ready to hand out on my commute. I went to Dunkin' Donuts and got \$5 gift cards. These small steps freed me of my hopelessness. There was something I could do to alleviate a small morsel of human suffering.

When I hear people talk about social action, they are often scared by the enormity of suffering in our world. "Where do we start?" is a common question. I think the answer to this question is always the same. "See. Ask. Do." See that suffering exists — in Lowell, Dorchester, and Concord, too. Ask those who are suffering what they need. Do whatever you can to fill that need. No good-faith action is too small, just as no dream is too big.

A year like no other this was, Testing us beyond what we'd ever imagined.

Day after day, week after week, we found ourselves growing and becoming sturdy because there was no other choice.

And the Solstice fire was lit and the candles passed and the light of the new year's dawning lifted our heavy hearts and brought us brightness and hope.\*

"I've noticed that EVERY year is, in some way, a year like no other," says Julie Forest Middleton, author of this beautiful poem. And of course, she's right. But I also think of

Dylan Thomas' famous lines from "A Child's Christmas in Wales:" "One Christmas was so much like another ... that I can never remember whether it snowed for six days and six nights when I was twelve or whether it snowed for twelve days and twelve nights when I was six."

> For me, both writers capture the essence of late December in our hemisphere, when the earth begins to tilt back toward the sun. Through the ages, humans

have enacted rituals expressing this primal knowledge, lighting Solstice fires, Advent candles and Hanukkah menorahs; telling ancient stories, singing carols by heart. One power of ritual is timelessness. Celebrations merge in memory from year to year. But by observing them, at the appointed time and with well-known custom, we honor the uniqueness of what is fading in the darkness and anticipate what will be born anew with the return of the sun.

I look forward to celebrating the winter holidays and revisiting our well-known rituals: Rise Up Caroling, the Holiday Loss Wreath, the candlelit Christmas Eve services. To these gatherings, I will bring the particularities of this "year like no other," and offer them to the immutability of custom. I also look forward to the new light and new customs that this season will bring.

The choir will sing UU composer Jason Shelton's haunting setting of Julie Forest Middleton's poem on December 22, when we celebrate the Solstice in our worship. May the coming year, which will surely be like no other, bring us all brightness and hope.

# Is the Organ Finished Yet?

- This is a valid question, especially for parishioners who
- have been around awhile and were part of the vote to
- finance the organ project as part of our Capital Campaign.
- Here's the answer, as of early December 2013 ...

The organ is now roughly 90 percent complete. When completed, it will have 70 stops and 46 ranks of pipes. We now have 42 complete ranks of pipes, and two reed stops that are 50 to 70 percent complete. A beautiful new bench of solid walnut, meant to go with the new console, has been delivered and has been in use for many months with the balcony console. A special Kurzweil rack module of orchestral sounds, along with audio speakers, was gifted by the organist to the church for incorporation into the organ's new midi system. This adds another dimension of high quality sampled sounds, in addition to the pipes, available to the organist. (You may remember hearing the strings and piano in a recent prelude).

The pipework remaining to be built consists mostly of reed ranks, which are the most challenging pipes to complete, stabilize and voice. The completed project will also include a new organ console located downstairs, to the left of the pulpit.

The organ project has taken longer than initially projected for several reasons. Much of the existing pipework that Steve Russell, our builder, had planned to reuse turned out to be unsuitable, either in terms of quality or tonal characteristics. So, new pipework has been fabricated or other vintage pipework rebuilt to make up the new instrument. This change required increased time and labor but has not impacted the cost of the organ. Also, Steve had to cope with a serious health issue in 2012 and the recent death of his father. Steve has recovered well, and we offer our deepest sympathy to him and his family on his loss.

Russell & Co. hopes to complete the pipework in the first quarter of 2014. The new console will take longer. But, as you can hear, the 90 percent now installed represents the truly special organ that First Parish will have upon completion. It will take its place as one of the significant pipe organs in the greater Boston area.
