

MUsings

Our Unitarian Universalist principles call us to recognize the inherent worth and dignity of every person; and to promote justice, equity and compassion in human relationships.

Through the "Standing on the Side of Love" campaign, UU's have created a progressive, visible and vocal presence in the struggle for marriage equality and equal rights for LGBTQ people.

Contemporary UU music reflects these values, notably the music of Rev. Jason Shelton, Minister for Music at First Unitarian Universalist in Nashville, Tennessee. Jason's song, "Standing on the Side of Love" was written as the Massachusetts legislature voted to legalize same-sex marriage. Jason is a prolific composer who continues to create inspiring music that expresses our faith and values to the world.

So it was very exciting to learn at last summer's UUMN Conference in San Diego that Jason had written a new piece, "Suite Progress," to celebrate the tenth anniversary of "Nashville in Harmony," an LGBTQ and friends chorus, which was founded by the Nashville UU congregation as an outreach

program.

This three-movement work starts by looking back at the hope that such a chorus could even exist in Nashville, or anywhere (The Dream). Then there's a "right-now piece" (Asking), which poignantly questions whether life will ever get any better. And finally, after a brief interlude, there's an exuberant expression of hope that the dream might be fulfilled in a time not too far off (Shameless).

Our choirs' offering of "Suite Progress" in worship on May 31 will be a family affair: David Ballard, a child of First Parish (son of Sara and Stoney Ballard) and an alumnus of our youth choirs, will return from his professional acting pursuits in New York to sing the opening solo; Siri Smedvig and daughter Iman will play in the string quartet, as will Norma Floyd; Michael Madera, father of two Chalice Choir members will play bass; John Bigay will be our drummer; and our Children's choirs and Gospel Singers will join the First Parish Choir for the hopeful and rousing final chorus.

It will be a Sunday to celebrate "sweet progress" in the struggle for LGBTQ rights, and to voice our hopes for a future "Where the beauty of each story, the beauty of each face, is honored in a circle made of song. Where our voices joined in laughter, our voices joined in grace, are lifted, showing all of us belong." (The Dream, Jason Shelton)

Standing Committee

The Standing Committee evaluation of Rev. Howard Dana has been completed. This essential annual practice, designed to ensure the success of First Parish's partnership with Howard, was embraced by Howard and the Standing Committee when Howard was called as our Senior Minister and Head-of-Staff two years ago.

The Standing Committee Evaluation Group, consisting of three Standing Committee members, developed five open-ended questions encompassing the goals that Howard and the Standing Committee agreed upon in the beginning of the year. The group obtained feedback from all eleven Standing Committee members and an additional 12 people chosen from among First Parish leaders. Feedback was then compiled into a summary evaluation report, presented to Howard, and discussed with Howard at the April 12 Standing Committee meeting.

Feedback was very positive and highlighted Howard's strengths and achievements over the past year. Recommendations for improvements were also provided in a number of areas. The summary evaluation report is available on the <u>Standing Committee Reports web page</u> on the First Parish website.

FY16 Budget: At our next Standing Committee meeting on May 10, Howard and Director of Operations Fifi Ball will present the first draft of the Fiscal Year 2016 budget. This budget will be based on revenue projections generated from the Annual Pledge Campaign 2015-2016. If you haven't yet pledged to support the programs and operations of our church, I encourage you to do so. And please consider your pledge amount carefully. We have a lot to preserve and much more to accomplish.

Annual Meeting 2015: The First Parish Annual Meeting is scheduled for June 14. At the meeting, the congregation will receive reports from staff and committees, vote on officers and committee members, approve delegates to General Assembly, approve the budget for next year, and more. Who can vote at our Annual Meeting? Our bylaws state that First Parish members who have signed the Membership Book at least 30 days prior to the Annual Meeting may vote. So, if you are considering joining our community and would like to participate and vote, you must sign the book soon! Annual Pledge Campaign

The Campaign Ends Sunday, May 3!

Thank you to all who have pledged generously this year. After two months of effort, the 2015 Annual Pledge Campaign is drawing to a close. Although we will happily receive pledges throughout the year, the total pledges received as of May 3 will determine the amount of the FY 2016 budget and the amount available to allocate to important priorities such as pastoral care, the RE program, and staff salaries, not to mention ongoing facilities maintenance and paying our fair share toward UUA dues.

In order to be successful, First Parish needs to increase the number of pledging households and the amount of each pledge, and it looks like we are starting to do just that. Analysis of pledging through mid-April revealed some interesting and encouraging facts:

- 42% of pledging households have increased their pledge over last year
- 28% of pledging households have increased their pledge 11% over last year
- The median pledge has risen by 7% from \$1,000 to \$1,070
- 25 households pledged for the first time this year

However, we need to do more. As of this writing in mid-April, we have not yet met our lowest target of \$998K. We need everyone who has not yet pledged to step up and make a financial commitment that can help to achieve the 7% increase in pledging over last year that will enable First Parish to maintain programs and services at current levels, and continue to make a difference in our community and the world.

We are very grateful to all who have pledged. If you haven't pledged and want your pledge to count toward the FY2016 budget, please pledge by May 3. Let's keep the momentum going!

The author of <u>Prison Baby</u> and founder of the unPrison Project, Deborah Jiang-Stein was born in prison, and spent the first year of her life in solitary confinement with her mother before being adopted into a middle-class Jewish family. Her realization of her beginnings led to a tumultuous adolescence and beyond. She is a dynamic speaker who travels around the United States to present to women in prisons, colleges and other large venues, promoting awareness of the issues surrounding women and incarceration. Proceeds will benefit the unPrison Project, her nonprofit that educates and empowers women in prison. As movements build to confront such racialized injustices as police brutality, immigrant deportation, mass incarceration and threats to voting rights, UU congregations committed to racial justice are asking how to respond meaningfully, wondering if they are ready to respond and asking what readiness looks like.
