

A few Sundays ago in church, I made the observation that we are all on the Membership Committee. The remark got a little bit of a laugh, but it also made the point that people will come to First Parish and stay only if they experience us as welcoming and friendly. So, yes, we are all on the Membership Committee at First Parish in Concord. It is up to each of us to be friendly and kind to one another.

Now that Rachel Baker has started her ministry in Las Vegas, I propose we do membership work somewhat differently at First Parish. As a large congregation, we will attract people who are



interested in joining a large congregation. This means that they have different expectations about how quickly they will move into membership, and then into leadership within the congregation. Some people seek out a larger church precisely so that they can stay more anonymous than a smaller church allows. My vision of a path to membership at First Parish features three things that are especially important as people find and join a large church such as ours. With the help of a newly forming Membership Committee, we would all work to:

- 1. Be friendlier on Sunday mornings-to new people and everyone else
- 2. Offer a clear way to join the church and become involved
- 3. Follow up with new members to help them become part of our church community

The good news is that we can all do Step 1 right away. If you see someone at church that you don't know, introduce yourself. It might be their first Sunday in church or they may have been attending First Parish for years. The point is that you don't know them yet. It makes us all feel good to have someone else take a sincere interest in us. Friendliness and kindliness can be cultivated. See you in church.

Small Group Ministry 2015 – 2016

Facilitated Small Group Ministry (SGM) groups provide the opportunity for spiritual growth, and for people to get to know others on a deeper level. This year we will experiment with a variety of ways of doing Small Group Ministry.

Small Group Ministry experiences include:

- 1. **Topic-specific, short-term SGM groups** of 4 to 8 sessions. ("What I Believe," "Finding Meaning and Purpose in Retirement," "Dream Work," etc.)
- Cohort SGM groups for populations most likely to participate in a SGM group (i.e. newer members, those approaching retirement, seniors, parents, etc.). Topic-specific and cohort groups are usually limited to 8 to 12 participants. If you are interested in a group, sign - up quickly.
- 3. **Drop-In SGM sessions** on select Sundays following worship. Drop-in groups introduce folks to SGM and help connect those who can't commit to a multi-session group. Drop-in SGM sessions are scheduled for Sundays September 20, October 4 and November 8, all from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

At our September 13, 2015 meeting, Standing Committee members began developing goals for the coming year. This annual ritual helps us keep an eye on the future, and function in the most effective manner possible. Using sources such as our annual evaluation and input from Rev. Howard Dana and congregation members, the committee reviews where we have been, discusses what we want to accomplish, and identifies overarching goals for the coming year. At the September meeting we also identified Standing Committee liaisons to a number of First Parish groups such as Social Action, Religious Education, Denominational Affairs, and others. As part of our effort to better inform ourselves about the many activities under way at First Parish, Standing Committee members will connect with the leaders of these groups and learn about the major program activities in which parishioners are engaged.

The Standing Committee also began its first-year review of the Finance Committee charter. Led by Treasurer Tom Wilson, this subgroup of the Standing Committee met all of its goals in its first year, gathering input from congregation members on spending priorities, facilitating discussions about the budget, and creating presentation materials for the Annual Meeting. In addition to providing technical assistance to Howard and the Director of Finance and Operations, Fifi Ball, throughout the year, the committee also developed a number of helpful documents that are available on the Finance Committee Web page at http://www.firstparish.org/cms/committees/finance-committee. The Finance Committee charter is scheduled to be finalized at our October meeting.

Led by Rev. Howard N. Dana, Social Action Director Bethany Lowe, and First Parish social action leaders, congregational discussions about the social action programs at First Parish have begun! Keep your eye out for future meetings, and join the conversation as we examine where we have been and explore options for the future.

Sunday Service Kindergarten – Grade 7

Kindergarten through Grade 7 begin in the Sanctuary with their families. Following the Message to Children, teachers accompany children to their classrooms. All groups will meet until 11:15 a.m. this year to allow for an hour-long session. Parents of infants to 3rd graders are asked to pick up their children in the classrooms at 11:15 a.m.. Older kids will be dismissed to coffee hour.



Little RE

Our Grades 2 and 3 classes are both using the same resources, based on a UU curriculum called Moral Tales, which through story, activities and games provides children with the spiritual and ethical tools to make choices and take actions based on Unitarian Universalist values.

During the first session, each class wrote a Covenant, or set of promises, for the group, made a web together, and learned about the 7th UU Principle: *"respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part."* On September 27, the classes explored through a story and related activities how to hear and follow their inner voices, also known as a conscience.

In October, Grades 2 and 3 will begin a project called "Gems of Goodness." The children will be asked to reflect on and share times when they did something good. Parents and guardians will also be encouraged to notice and affirm actions that are kind, helpful, honest, inclusive, responsible, or just plain good! By enacting scenarios, the two groups will explore how it is possible for people to see and experience the world differently and treat one another with kindness and respect.


The Race Dance Project


