

MUUsings

"For unto us a child is born . . ."

I first sang Handel's *Messiah* when I was thirteen years old. With my sister and some of her high school chorus friends, I joined an adult church choir in the western part of our state as a young "ringer" to swell their ranks for a Christmas concert. I still recall the challenge of navigating the long melismatic runs in some of the choruses for the first time. I remember the kindness and encouragement of the adult singers and the excitement of sharing this great oratorio with an enthusiastic audience.



Later, for several years during the 1980's, I sang annual *Messiah* performances in Carnegie Hall with a large community choir. Singing in that historic hall, with its amazing acoustics was awe inspiring. The conductor usually hired a few "ringers" to beef up that chorus. One year I was appalled to notice the hired soprano next to me reading a magazine (on stage!) during the solo passages. I vowed never to adopt such a blasé attitude in any musical performance. I have sung the *Messiah* and conducted portions of it—especially the *Hallelujah Chorus*—countless times since that first Christmas. Familiarity only deepens my respect for the composer and his work.

George Frederick Handel [1685-1759] composed *The Messiah* for the Easter season in 1749. He knew that his oratorio was unorthodox. His other oratorios had strong, dramatic plot lines based on stories and characters from the Bible and classical mythology. For *The Messiah*, Handel's librettist drew from Biblical prophesies, Psalms and Epistles to reflect on the birth, death and resurrection of Jesus. Only a few movements include narrative about Jesus' life from the Gospels. Yet the work creates an unforgettable musical portrait of the one named by Christians as the Messiah.

On Sunday morning, December 6, the First Parish Choir and Festival Strings will offer several movements from the Christmas section of Handel's *Messiah*. You will hear the majestic "Overture," the decorative and celebratory "For Unto Us a Child is Born," the serene "Pastoral Symphony" and, one of my favorites, the dramatic announcement of Jesus' birth sung by soprano soloist and chorus. Some choir members have been singing these movements for years. Others are exploring Handel's choruses for the very first time. All of us look forward to sharing the wonder of this music and this season with you.

Seven Ways to Savor the Holidays

Especially for Families with Children

1. Enjoy Traditional Foods

Social Action Community Movement Moment

Last month, I wrote to you about "movement moments." This is a term used in the social action world to refer to a time when a certain issue is getting a lot of attention over a prolonged period of time.

When we are in movement moments, we can learn much more quickly than when we are not in movement moments. Think: the Civil Rights Movement, the AIDS crisis in the 1990's, marriage equality in the 2000's. Our current movement moment—the Black Lives Matter movement—is one that is changing the way we think about racial justice and power in our country.



In the past few months, I have felt us shift as a congregation. In early October, we started wearing Black Lives Matter buttons. By November, we were handing out yard signs. In December, the Standing Committee will vote on whether the church should hang a Black Lives Matter banner on the church property (see article in this MHN). In the course of just three months, we have taken a leap into this movement moment. Now we hang on for the ride.

Things are moving fast these days. There is too much information for us to absorb it all. And there is so much we can learn from each other in this movement moment. If you have any questions about the Black Lives Matter movement, or what it means to support this movement as a congregation, I am always happy to chat. If you have concerns about hanging a banner on our church, I am all ears.


Website Wonder
